Summer Scorchers for Games Day

Swelteringly hot weather welcomed thousands of visitors and locals alike to enjoy the spectacle of the long-delayed 368th staging of the Burntisland Highland Games. The crowds thronged to the games arena, the supporting fairground and to the beach, pleasantly cooled by a gentle sea breeze.

The traditional "Exiles Reception", hosted by the Community Council and featuring local dignitaries, the Summer King & Queen, former Community Award winners and invited guests, took place in the Burgh Chambers earlier in the morning. This was attended by former Burntisland residents from as far afield as Australia, Canada, England, Germany, and even Kirkcaldy. Following the

reception, participants took part in a parade along the High Street, lined by hundreds of spectators, to the games arena, behind the impressive Burntisland & District Pipe Band.

At 12 noon the games were officially opened by the Honorary Chieftain, Tom Courts and throughout the afternoon spectators were able to enjoy sporting events including athletics, cycling and traditional Highland Games heavy events. The more sophisticated Highland Dancing also took place continuously on the stage.

Disappointingly only two local runners entered the Binn Race at 3 pm, however it is understandable given the heat on the day. The event was won by first time

entrant John Henderson, in a time of just under 32 minutes, a commendable effort in the conditions.

(On a personal note, my younger brother Jack would have welcomed such an entry in the 1967 Race, as he would have been able to boast forever that he had come second in the Binn Race!)

Throughout the day, vast numbers enjoyed the unique experience of the wide variety of activities and attractions of Burntisland Games Day.

Finally, a huge vote of thanks must go to the organising committee and to the volunteers who managed to successfully revive this event, the second oldest Highland Games in the world.

Community Council Bullets.....

The Community Council holds its regular meetings on the second Friday of each month, at 7.00pm in Burrtisland's Burgh Chambers. **The dates for the next three meetings are 12th August, 9th September, and 14th October.**

Members of the public are welcome to attend or to raise matters of interest to them. A summary of issues raised during the last two meetings is set out below. Full minutes can also be found on the Community Council website.

- We have welcomed our newly-elected members of Fife Council and look forward to working with all of them to get the best possible outcomes for Burrtisland.
- We are awaiting confirmation of progress made in seeking funding from the Levelling Up Fund for the restoration and conservation of the Burgh Chambers, with 10th July having been a critical date.
- All but 3% of the Community Council's total assets are now committed to local projects, including Christmas lights, environmental work and civic events such as the Exiles Reception, Remembrance Parade, Scots Verse competition and Community Award.
- We have attended the Big Green Market in order to help make the Community Council more accessible to members of the public. That is a practice which we are likely to continue for the foreseeable future.
- Work has started with the Community Development Trust to review the hugely successful Community Action Plan. Over time, the plan will be updated and complemented by a Local Place Plan, so that local views on all our futures will be taken into account in strategic decisions.
- A most welcome initiative from Scott Pallets enabled a community litter-pick to go ahead on 14th July, covering the Links, prom, beach and Lammerlaws.
- It's early days, but discussions are now underway about the possibility of funding from Paths for All for improved lighting and / or accessibility in the vicinity of Meadowfield path.
- NHS Fife have refused an application to open a second pharmacy in Burrtisland - the third time that such an application has been refused. Given the huge support for a second pharmacy in the relevant consultation exercise, an appeal has been submitted and we await the outcome.
- The water feature on the Links has proven to be exceptionally popular - and indeed it is unique in Fife. However, it was installed in 2004 and is rapidly approaching its end of life. A short-life working group has been set up to seek input from local people to help decide on its future replacement. Google "Burrtisland Splash Survey" and follow the link.
- The onset of the tourist season means that parking has again become a critical issue. We are concerned that Fife Council have been reactive rather than pro-active. We will try to identify additional parking options - including locations, restrictions and privileges - but it's a long and arduous task.

Meet your newly-elected Fife Councillors

Having been your elected Councillor for the last five years, I am pleased to report that I have managed to change policy on housing, specifically using the Buy Back Subsidy provided by Scot Gov to buy back over 200 ex-council houses across Fife. The policy was originally aimed at helping homelessness but in discussion with officers and my own caseload the overcrowding of families in Burntisland and Kinghorn was very apparent. In 2019 I tweaked the policy to include buy backs of larger family homes and although we have only managed to secure two in Burntisland so far it has helped two families that were overcrowded.

I have supported a number of individuals by giving encouragement and being positive about their contribution to society. Also encouraged a number of unemployed individuals into work. Supported local business by being a regular customer and promoting them through social media and personal recommendations.



I believe that we all need to strive to make the community better by playing an active role rather than just walking by. Pick up empty bottles or cans from our public places and put them in the recycling bins. Phone Fife Council when noticing dog poo on the pavement. They work for you. Don't denigrate the efforts of others but challenge constructively that which you consider wrong and offer positive alternatives.

My top priorities are:

Adequate housing – ensuring that empty properties and plots of land provide the housing that is desperately needed in Burntisland Kinghorn & Western Kirkcaldy.

Social care that is truly joined up and follows the individual not just satisfying the provider.

Accessibility improvements at our Train stations and Beaches to encourage additional tourism and businesses into our towns.

I welcome and support all our Fife Council workers and volunteer organisations and want to get everyone working together to make here better for everyone that lives here.

Burntisland has at least 10 public-access defibrillators, but where are they and what do they do?

The bottom line is that they save lives, but only if they are found and used quickly. In a nutshell, your heart is managed by electricity, which comes from some specialised tissue in one part of the heart. When someone's heart stops, most commonly it's an electrical problem – and it's one that can be resolved only by a defibrillator.

As an added twist, your heart is electrically active only if there is enough oxygen in it. So the whole point of doing CPR is that it gets fresh oxygen to the heart, keeping it electrically active for longer. It's then more likely that the defibrillator will work once it's brought to the scene. Basically, CPR buys time.

How much time? All the evidence from around the world shows that survival from cardiac arrest drops by 10% with every minute's delay in delivering a shock from a defibrillator. So, after 10 minutes the chances of survival are about 10%. CPR can extend that significantly, but only if it's performed early and continuously.



Speed is of the essence. Statistics from Australia are very helpful. They show that the overall survival rate from cardiac arrest was 29% when the first shock was given by a paramedic answering an emergency call. However, when the first shock was given by a bystander who used a public-access defibrillator, the survival rate nearly doubled to 56%.

So what can you do? Firstly, it's vital to learn the essentials of CPR. Any kind of CPR is better than none, but anyone who is trained and able should certainly do both chest compressions and ventilations if they know how and if there is no risk from Covid-19. Secondly, know where your nearest defibrillator is. Using it is easy. If there's a green button then press it to switch it on. The machine will then talk you through what to do if you're at all uncertain. But whilst you're listening, keep up the chest compressions – it just buys that little bit extra time.

Where are these life-saving machines? Most of them are shown on the map, with those in green available 24/7. There's one outside the High Street Co-op – the first of five which were placed in the local area by our organisation.

The others were placed by different organisations, all with public benefit in mind. Those for which we are responsible include: LDL Gas (High Street), the Sands Hotel, the Primary School, and the Kirkton (opposite the Jubilee Tavern).

There are others at the Sailing Club, inside the Beacon Leisure Centre, the Parish Church Halls, the Golf Clubhouse, Amanda's Podiatry, and an additional one inside the High Street Co-op. The RNLI Lifeguards also have one when on duty at the beach.

Perhaps there are more that I don't know of? If there are then I would strongly urge the owners to register their defibrillator with The Circuit at www.thecircuit.uk, so that Scottish Ambulance Service call handlers can direct someone there in an emergency. Once registered, you'll receive a prompt every month asking you to confirm that the battery and pads are all in good order.

Even when you're out and about, it's reassuring to know that others have your interests literally at heart. Every ASDA and Tesco has a defibrillator, as do an increasing number of other shops and offices. However, do remember that the first (and essential) step is effective CPR. If you need tuition, then my colleagues and I will be happy to help.

We are seeing an increase in youth disorder calls due to the better weather coming in. However, these are not to levels that we've seen in previous years. As always these will be dealt with timeously.

As always, we will take this opportunity to remind the public that there are various ways of reporting crime.

Primary 1 have been doing an Under the Sea topic and are enjoying it very much! They have also been putting data into charts and have been working with money.

The P1s have also been improving writing sentences. They've been learning about their emotions and how to handle small situations. They took a look at World Bee Day and celebrated the bees and they have been building 3D boats.

Primary 2 have been learning about fractions. In writing they have been using creative language to make an imaginative story. P2 have also been looking at weather and in P.E. they have been focusing on ball skills.

For literacy, **Primary 4** have been basing their learning from their book Kensuki's Kingdom and learning about measurement. Some classes were also focusing on their topic, Living Things in other environments, with P4Si growing tomatoes and basil from seed. They have also been doing Japanese Hokusai Waves!

Primary 5 have been looking at the rainforests and were enjoying their topic very much. They had also been learning about fractions for numeracy and been practicing their note taking in literacy.

The Rotary Rambles were back for P5, all three classes had a fabulous time learning so much on the way over the Binn to and from Kinghorn Loch.

They also enjoyed a Celebrations Afternoon Tea using the money they had raised way back in Primary 3.



Primary 6 have been coding in ICT, using JavaScript, HTML and CSS. PE was all about gymnastics for them and for literacy they were working on persuasive writing and skimming and scanning in reading. Their topic has been 'Democracies' and they really enjoyed this topic

Finally, **Primary 7!** We have been busy with so many things, mental maths and algebra, as well as percentages. Building sustainable cities to do with our topic, Global Goals and developing our persuasive writing skills.



We were also super busy getting everything ready for moving up to High School. We had two great transition days, recorded a school leavers show and also had our parents in for our Leavers Service, on the very last day of term.

During our last week we made lots of final BPS memories by having a great Leavers Party with a Festival theme and we all headed out for tea at the Sands Hotel!

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Burrtisland Harbour Access Trust

After a lengthy period with nothing to report, there have been some very significant developments – and fantastic news! To recap, we have been working to register a community interest in the land that comprises Burrtisland’s East Dock. This would mean that the community would have first refusal in the event of any of the land coming up for sale. There are two landowners involved: Forth Ports, who own the land around the dock basin and Network Rail, who own the strip of land edged yellow on the plan.



We heard in July that Scottish Ministers have approved both of the Burrtisland Harbour Access Trust (BHAT) applications. We, the community, now have first refusal on both the Forth Ports and Network Rail areas of the East Dock. The current owners may appeal the decisions but the Ministers’ letters make it clear that we have made a convincing case. We have no doubt that the decision was made on its merits, but we are grateful for the support and interest that we have received from our elected members at every level of government and from all our supporters.

Our aim has been and remains retaining community access to the East Dock - breakwater, western peninsula (Shanks Pier) and the north quay. After the frustrations of failing to achieve it by

negotiation we sought ways to purchase the East Dock. We now have first refusal; this blocks the sale (but not a lease) of the East Dock to any other party, including a transfer to another company in the Forth Ports group, and may open the way to a compulsory purchase of the pieces of land which could be regarded as “wholly or mainly derelict or neglected”.

As you will probably know Forth Ports have submitted a bid to establish a Forth Green Freeport, with Burrtisland dock area being earmarked as a customs site. As we understand it this would involve a high security duty-free zone where value is added to imported goods before exporting them again. One of the conditions of approval for a freeport is that there are benefits for the local community. What these might entail we have no idea because we, the Burrtisland community, have been kept entirely in the dark. Given that Fife Council and the Scottish Government are partners in the Freeport venture, can we hope for more transparency and public accountability?

We’re now considering the next moves. In the meantime, as potential landlords, we will engage with the East Dock stakeholders to see how we might meet their aspirations. Armed with this information we will seek a wider community view on how to proceed. We have a long way to go but these early steps are encouraging. Meanwhile, and sadly, we’ve been advised that completion of the fencing is imminent. Maybe some repairs too: the top strand of barbed wire is already unravelling (a handy metaphor?)

BHAT now has 110 members. If you’d like to join us and have a say in the future of the harbour and surrounding land you can do so online or by picking up a membership form from Grain & Sustain on the High Street. It’s free and carries no obligation.

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Visitors, young and old, are in for a treat this year as given the town's close links with the sea, the summer exhibition will now comprise of three maritime themes.



Model Ship Collection

In total Burntisland Heritage Trust now has a collection of 23 model ships. These include a battlecruiser, whalers, fishing boats, yachts and sailing ships. All vary in size from a Clyde Paddle Steamer and U-boat both 1.4 metres long to a small kit built aircraft carrier. The display is a must see!

Crossing the Forth

This part of the exhibition looks at journeys over the Forth from the days of the early pilgrims to the present day and the key role Burntisland has played over the centuries. The exhibition uses numerous images to illustrate the stories and many topics relating to battles, ill-fated romance, stormy passages, ferry crossings including the world's first roll-on roll-off ferry.

The Search for King Charles I Lost Treasure

It seems incredible to think that more than two decades have passed since the news of a search for a shipwreck first appeared in the local and national press. Where is the ferry boat that vanished in the summer storm on Wednesday the 10th of July in 1633 off the coast of Burntisland? And what happened to its royal cargo, half a ton of silver and the riches of a king?

In more recent times it is one of the longest running and most tantalising of treasure hunts. The search sparked off a huge amount of local interest and a support group was formed in the town in 1994. The mission to find the shipwreck was the stimulus for what was eventually to become Burntisland Heritage Trust.



Eventually the search itself was taken over and a project team formed by the Trust. The story of the shipwreck, the aftermath, and the quest to find the wreck of this tantalising saga is brought right up to date with very recent ongoing developments. It is a true life adventure story on our own doorstep.

In addition to the display there are numerous scrapbooks and a large collection of DVDs for viewing.

The exhibition is open during August on Thursday, Friday, and Saturday – 11am-4pm, at 4 Kirkgate. Admission free.

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The Ecology Centre

We have been busy as usual up at The Ecology Centre. The weather has been kind so far this summer and our volunteers are enjoying the good weather as they work on our beautiful Lochside site.

Restoration Forth Project

As we mentioned in the previous issue, Lyle, our Seagrass Officer, is part of Restoration Forth, an exciting new conservation project which has begun here in the Forth. The project endeavours to reintroduce 30,000 native oysters (*Ostrea edulis*) and restore 4 hectares of seagrass meadows by 2025. The bold new project intends to connect local communities with their marine and coastal environments. Through volunteer opportunities, interested individuals can witness conservation activities first hand and contribute to the restoration of these two habitats while developing their skills in conservation.

In the UK we have lost up to 92% of our seagrass meadows and 95% of our native oyster beds, it is vital that we first protect the areas where these habitats exist and secondly assist them where they have been damaged or lost. Seagrass and oysters are vital components of a healthy and resilient marine landscape which, when intact, provide essential services for our prosperity and wellbeing.

This project is headed up by the conservation charity WWF but is a collaborative project comprised of community organisations, scientists and volunteers. If you wish to enquire how you can get involved, please contact lyle@theecologycentre.org to find out more.

Beehives

There are now two beehives at The Ecology Centre. A variety of pollinator beneficial plants have been introduced to the site to help our new residents along. In one of the hives, a new queen is being developed – a young larvae is fed 'royal jelly' by the worker bees and develops into a queen.

So, if you see what looks like a spaceman on site, don't worry, it will be Lee tending to the bees. And, who knows, we might even be able to share some honey in the future.

Volunteers

Our ongoing 'Save Our Pond' project has been a success thanks to 450 hours of work from both staff and volunteers. The once stagnant pond now hosts a variety of aquatic life as well as 'Elvis' the duckling. A 1910 survey is now being used as guidance in the planting of over 700 missing or scarce plants. It will take time to revive the delicate marsh/pond ecosystem so we ask that visitors do not enter the marsh area at the moment.

We celebrated the achievements of some of our highly committed volunteers recently. Certificates were presented to Bob, Bill, Mark, Billy and Paul who, between them, have worked over 8,000 volunteer hours. Our volunteers are the heart and soul of The Ecology Centre. What would we do without you?!

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
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Burntisland Nature Watch

We recently got back from a wedding in Germany, the whole journey done by train (look up Flight Free Pledge and Man in Seat 61). I feel relieved that I have little desire to travel overseas, but each time I do go I get so much enjoyment from seeing what wildlife is there and from spotting species I don't know. I love trying to remember and jot down as much detail as possible then poring over bird books later (other wildlife is available). Also reading up on local wildlife in advance of going to a new place makes it even more exciting.

It reminds me of my early days of getting into wildlife, birds really, back in my late teens. The joy of those first months and years as I learned to recognise more and more and became more and more hooked. So much to learn and see. How many bird species do you think have been recorded in the wild in Britain? As of 1st January 2020 it's 619! This is known as the British List. The Scottish List is 516 and the Fife List to end of 2009 was 323. I wonder what the Burntisland List is.

What I'm saying is, wildlife, it's so great. Knowing and watching it enriches your life. If you're just getting started, I'm envious. If you haven't yet, I hope you soon will. Even if you've been at it for years there's always more to see, always something new to turn up. A Long-eared owl for example, there's been a recent report within a few miles of the town and seven or eight years ago I found the feathers of a predated one up beyond the Binn. Or that time when for a few days we saw lots of Little auks from the breakwater. Or a couple of years ago when someone watched an Osprey fly right over the town. You just never know.

Back to Germany. What I had most hoped to see was Storks which nest close to where we stayed in Rodgau, near

Frankfurt. Sadly we didn't but we did see the much smaller and gorgeous Black redstart. One pair was nesting by a busy Frankfurt building site and another carrying insects to chicks under the guttering of a centuries-old building in the hill village of Kronberg, a half hour train ride from Frankfurt.



A lot of what you'll see across Europe is also in Scotland. Swifts seemed to be always above us, much more than here although there are three definite Burntisland nest sites that I know of - Cromwell Road, Castle Estate, Forth Place. Are there any others? There seem to be house sparrows in every European city square whereas in Britain they have been in decline for decades. And Wagtails. Our lovely little black and white Pied wagtail with its long bobbing tail running back and fore outside the High Street Co-op, it's a variation of the bird known in Europe as White wagtail. The White has a light grey back rather than the black of ours.

What else close to home? On the **Burntisland Wildlife and Woodlands Facebook group** (join us!) we've had Puffins off the Lammerlaws; Mating Soldier beetles (everywhere on these hot

July days); Hedgehogs in a happy number of gardens. We see them or their oily beetle-case-filled droppings in ours almost nightly, in fact I can hear hog huffing through the kitchen window as I type right now at 11.45pm. We put out non-fishy cat food for them, water in shallow bowls, the wildlife pond and washing-up-basin micro ponds. If you can please make them a wildlife micro pond, cut a hole in the base of your fence or gate, put down piles of leaves and sticks in an untidy corner of your garden.

There have been lots of stunning moth photos and a fair number of different butterflies though not in good numbers. Butterflies have included Meadow Brown, Ringlet, Small Tortoiseshell, Peacock, various Whites, Speckled Wood, Dark Green Fritillary, Common Blue, Northern Brown Argus. There have been Dolphins, Hares, young Stoats known as kits. Assorted Flies, Hoverflies, Ladybirds, Wasps, Bees. One Bat. Gannets diving. On which, you are probably aware that Avian Influenza ('avian / bird flu') is currently decimating seabird colonies and any dead or ill birds you find really must not be touched, nor dogs allowed near them. Search ' "avian flu" seabirds Scotland ' to know more of what is happening and what we must do.

Finally, House martins and Swallows. House martins are nesting under the eaves of houses up by high Coop (Co-Up) again. It's wonderful to see them swirling over our heads. Having them in the town is a privilege which may have to be fought for as nest sites are often destroyed during roof renovations, wall insulation etc. There are easy ways around this and councils and homeowners are usually very happy to adopt them. And Swallows, does anyone have any nesting? I've seen so few, I'd love to know if we have any town nests left.

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Craigencalt Rural Community Trust

The Trust's Walking Festival returned this Spring after a two year absence and remained as popular as ever. We were blessed with beautiful sunny weather and, as always, there was a great, friendly atmosphere. Everyone enjoyed the lovely scenery and the views. Every day of the two week event offered something different. Our excellent walk leaders made each walk so interesting, always much appreciated by everyone who took part.

The walk through the tranquillity of Otterston Loch was new to most, coupled with a trip to Laura's tower through lovely woodland. On another beautiful hot day, we walked out to Monks Cave and continued around the sandy coves near Braefoot Bay. It was a blend of the industry of the gas terminal, the heritage of two World wars and the seals and Eider Duck. It



was a treat. It is great to have this event back in our annual calendar.

Next came the 'Come and Try' day at Kinghorn Loch. This annual event has been running since 2007, and is a great way to try out a new activity, with experienced people on hand to advise and help. This year all the groups were available to take part; the coastal rowers, canoes and sailing dinghies were kept busy all afternoon.

Visitors could also watch the radio-controlled boats or just enjoy a stroll around the woodland paths. In addition, there was a moth expert on hand to show off the beautiful moths found during the regular surveys at Craigencalt. Unfortunately the weather was rather chilly on the day, but that did not quell the enthusiasm of everyone.

It was good to see the Civic Week back in Burntisland and we took a stall on the Links. The organisers did a great job, but they could not have predicted such a windy day. Our gazebo was held down with sandbags, and occasionally we held on tight as well! Most importantly we had plenty of visitors who especially liked the moth display and the exhibition of our many projects.

We decided to take the opportunity to seek a name for our troll who has sat beneath the bridge at Rodanbraes Path for some years now. We asked visitors, especially youngsters, which name they liked best. The favoured name was Frodi so we will put up a sign where he lives to let people

know. In the ancient sagas, Frodi was the name of a Viking Warrior Berserker who built up the spirits of the Vikings before going into battle. Our Frodi troll has retired from active service and sits quietly under the bridge. He is due a makeover, as his complexion has faded over the years. This will be done soon and he will be ready to greet many more visitors in the future. Children love to play "Three Billy Goats Gruff" on the bridge.




