A Jewel in the Town

An appeal from Burntisland and Kinghorn Church of Scotland

Isn't it wonderful when we stumble over something truly precious. In the course of our lifetimes we are often blessed to discover a memento of past times. A place of profound spiritual or emotional value.

Many in the town will recognise such a treasure hidden in plain sight. Equally there will be some who are unaware that such a sanctuary may be found here in Burntisland.

Burntisland Parish Church building (formerly known as St Columba's) is situated at the top of the Kirkgate, just off the High Street.

This is a church of great antiquity and history, a Grade A Listed Building. It was completed in 1596 and is unique in Scotland for its distinctive plan form and structure as well as its religious significance during the growth of the Church of Scotland following the Reformation.

As described by Fife Historic Buildings Trust:

⁶⁶From its inception, the interior was gradually fitted out throughout the next hundred years, with the ground floor pews dating to the mid-1700s. The many decorative interior features include a

Magistrates pew (1606), box pews ('pumfils'), two of which are dated 1725 and 1742; inverted anchor motifs in the stonework, painted panels depicting guilds along the balcony, and a Carnegie organ. An extensive restoration was completed in 1999.

Perhaps the most significant event in its history occurred in 1601 when, due to the plague being rife in Edinburgh and the King being unable to travel as far as St Andrews due to an injury, it hosted the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland, which led to the creation of the King James Bible in 1611.

Under the direction of the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland, last year Fife Presbytery set out a new viable model for future mission and ministry across the region and decided that this building will no longer be required as a place of worship after December 2027.

We are not looking to revisit the decision but, through working together with civic organisations, the community and any other interested parties, aspire to transfer legal title from Church of Scotland to community management through a coherent action plan.



This would ensure that public and community access and use is maintained. If this cannot be achieved this unique building will be let, sold or otherwise disposed of.

We are appealing to anyone who might be interested in joining us in a Working Group now or in the future. We believe that our legacy should be that Burntisland Church should be held safe in the arms of the Burntisland Community and nurtured in a manner commensurate with a vibrant and caring social infrastructure in the town. But we need help.

Community Council Bullets......

The Community Council holds its regular meetings on the third Tuesday of each month, at 7pm in Burntisland's Burgh Chambers. **Dates for the next meetings are: Tuesday 21st May, 18th June, and 20th August.** Please note there is no meeting in July.

Members of the public are welcome to attend or to raise matters of interest to them. Meetings are also available to join using Zoom videoconferencing—please contact the Secretary or Chair if you wish to join online via Zoom.

A summary of issues discussed during recent meetings is set out below. Full minutes can also be found on the Community Council website.

- We're happy to be represented on a working group to explore alternative
 uses and a continuing presence for the Parish Church building. It's listed as
 category A and is therefore of national significance. However, we can't lead
 that group so we await further news from the newly-combined Burntisland
 and Kinghorn Church of Scotland.
- We're very grateful to Fiona Watson for her excellent service as treasurer. She has now passed that role to Carol MacLeod and will continue to provide financial advice during a transitional period. Fiona has now stood down from the Community Council after five years. We welcome interest from local people who may want to join us as a full member.
- We are trying to ensure that a planned housing development at Grange old farm steading will respect rights of way and will ensure that accurate traffic flows are reflected in the overall safety assessment.
- The Scottish Environmental Protection Agency has decided not to designate Burntisland as a Potentially Vulnerable Area for flooding. We are objecting to that decision in the light of our local experience over many years.
- Plans remain at an early stage for the possible use of the Burgh Chambers ground floor as a banking hub, which will bring varied banking services to the town five days a week.
- Using Zoom for our ordinary business meetings has been very successful, with up to 14 people joining online for some topics. We are exploring an improvement to the microphone pick-up to cover a wider part of the Council Chamber.
- A draft of the Local Place Plan has now been completed and is available for review on our website. At nearly 40 pages it's a substantial document and will guide future plans and investment for Burntisland. It builds on the earlier Community Action Plan and identifies local preferences for countryside, town, coast and connectivity.
- We're very grateful to Compass Catering for their generosity in once again sponsoring the Exiles Reception on Games Day. We will be reviewing the plans for the summer fair with the Development Trust and the Showmen's Guild.


Black Rocks Rowing Club



BREAKING NEWS: The Club's 22-foot rowing boat is having its inaugural launch over the weekend of the 25 and 26 May.

New members are very welcome. You can join the club as an individual or join as a family. Membership is extremely affordable so we can get new people involved. Some of our club members are complete novices and some of us are very experienced. Scottish Coastal Rowing is a sport and community movement that has spread dramatically across the country in the past ten years. Starting from humble beginnings on the Firth of Forth in 2009, there are now well over 200 registered boats in the UK mostly Scotland - and others in the US, Canada, Australia, the Netherlands, France, South Africa and New Zealand.

The Black Rocks Rowing Club (BRRC) have been building our St Ayles Skiff for several years. The skiff is a versatile 22foot rowing boat typically crewed by four rowers with a cox steering and room for a passenger in the bow. While we row in open coastal waters, we have a safety first policy. Our club will provide all the equipment and training needed. Our boat will be kept at the Burntisland Sailing Club on a floating dock.

Local Place Plan

The new Scottish Government National Planning Framework (NPF4) includes a new opportunity for local people to put forward their views on future local development decisions. This is via a document called a Local Place Plan (LPP), which can be produced by Community Councils, and some other community bodies.

The LPP is submitted to the Local Authority e.g. Fife Council, and used to help inform the development of the Local Authority's Local Development Plan (LDP). LDPs guide future development decisions in the Local Authority area. The current Fife LDP is due for renewal in 2027 and will run to 2037.

In our Community Action Plan 2023–28 (the CAP), local people said they wanted "improved community consultation for major decisions on land use and changes to service provision".



Submitting a Burntisland LPP to Fife Council by their June deadline should give local people an opportunity to have their views taken into consideration on future land use decisions in our local area by contributing to the Fife LDP 2027–37.

We don't yet know how much influence Local Place Plans may have, as they are new. However, we know that Fife Council are obliged to take them into consideration when developing their new 10-year LDP.

Based on the CAP and subsequent community consultations this year, the

Royal Burgh of Burntisland Community Council, with support from Burntisland Community Development Trust, has produced a proposed Burntisland LPP for submission to Fife Council.

The proposed 39-page Burntisland LPP 2024 is set out in 31 policies in four policy areas: Countryside, Town, Coast & tourism, and Connectivity. It's about land use and places rather than services, containing maps and photos, charts and graphs. Each of the LPP policies reflects what and where the people of Burntisland said they wanted, or didn't want, development.

Well, we have some VERY exciting news to share with you this issue. Thanks to a grant from the Big Lottery Community Fund, our monthly pre-loved market is about to get even greener. With our additional funds, we're planning two really exciting projects:

Skills & Craft Workshop Programme

Over the past few months we've been trialling craft and skills workshops. Topics were varied – jewellery making and Japanese mending to basic sewing and repairs. Every workshop sold out quickly and wee had a brilliant response. Participants were so happy with the sessions:

Thanks to this trial, we now know there is a LOT of interest in workshops like this, so we're allocating some of our Lottery Grant to expanding the workshops. We plan to bring you a diverse (and accessible) workshop programme that will include skills such as sewing, jewellery making, crafts, and upcycling and so much more.

All of our workshops are designed to help people reuse excess market stock by mending or upcycling, with the ultimate goal of reducing landfill waste. Whether you're learning to repair a favourite item of clothing or turning old materials into something new and beautiful, our workshops help you develop the skills to give pre-loved items a second chance.

Young Community Hall

The Young Community Hall, better known as the Music Hall in Thistle Street, has until recently been under threat of closure due to the sad disbandment of the Burntisland Youth Theatre (BYT) group due to lack of interest and membership. BYT has been a pillar of the community for decades and it is hard to find a family in the town which hasn't some connection with or even just attended one of their legendary Christmas pantomimes.

What is perhaps less well known was that they also formed the committee which ran the day to day management of the hall, in particular Karen Speirs who has done a sterling job over many of years including the Covid period which has proved to be disastrous not only for BYT but group memberships across the board.

As such, had a new committee not been found quickly, the hall was faced with

closure and Burntisland would have lost another asset to the community.

As a long time hall user my own group felt we could not let this happen. We have formed a new committee and have already entered into dialogue with Fife Council regarding repairs and additional funding to remedy some of the long term issues the hall has faced such as wheelchair / pushchair access and parking. The Council did make it clear that, whilst they were supportive of the hall and our ideas to take it forward long term, they needed to know there was sufficient use to justify the expenditure which is reasonable in the current times.

What we would hope to achieve is that the hall is used on an ongoing bases by groups within the community which could demonstrate to the Council that the town not only wants but needs such a facility.

As part of the management process, we have taken steps to upgrade the booking system which relied on poor Karen being contactable by phone and needed her to be in attendance for viewings etc. Fife Council have come forward with some good ideas on how to improve that booking method.

Our new committee has Sam, who is an IT programme designer, and he has been tasked with building a booking system that will linked to both the Burgh Buzz and the Burntisland Facebook page. Hopefully this should go live soon which will allow seamless booking management.

Burntisland Harbour Access Trust

By the time you read this our Grand Spring Raffle will have been drawn. Over 50 prizes have been so generously donated by local businesses and individuals. Many thanks to them all and to everyone who bought tickets – we hope you were lucky!

We're hoping that the funds raised by the raffle will be sufficient to settle our costs for the crucial legal opinion we received regarding public rights of access to the harbour.

As previously reported our lawyers' opinion is that rights have been established through more than 20 years' unfettered access by members of the public. It seems likely that rights under the "Right to Roam" legislation may also apply and additionally we've discovered that an obligation to provide community access applied when the foreshore and seabed were sold for the building of the East Dock and that these conditions still apply.

To bolster our claim of unfettered access we've been taking testimonies from some of the long-standing members of the community who offered to tell their own stories. To quote from a few of them, respondents stated closing the breakwater and harbour had:

- "significantly affected the amenity of the town"
- "robbed them of part of their heritage"
- "created a simmering anger towards Forth Ports for a perceived lack of any consultation or involvement with local community as to why this step was necessary"
- "given them a deep felt gratitude to the Burntisland Harbour Access Trust for taking up a cause which was so close to their heart"
- "led to an enduring sadness at the loss of such a wild, beautiful walk which


- uplifted their spirits and denied them meeting other people on the walk who shared their joy being so close to the sea"
- "led to a loss of one of the most scenic and unique walks which they enjoyed on a daily basis"
- "led to a loss of a certain spiritual freedom which only this walk provided."

We have established a dialogue with Forth Ports and their partners in the green freeport consortium and will continue to press for full consultation.

We're encouraged by the fact that Forth Ports' stance has moved from "We are not discussing the fence!" to "....we will fully engage with the local community, the Community Council and the Trust to ensure that wherever possible we can meet people's aspirations."

Fife Council Community Development Team

A new Community Education Worker for the Burntisland, Kinghorn and Auchtertool has recently been appointed to the Community Development Team.

Lynn Reynolds has been working in the area since May last year when she started on secondment and got the ball rolling on a couple of projects but is now looking to get local people involved in planning and developing new classes and projects.

There has been an adult learning course running in the Toll Centre, Crochet for Beginners which has been a great success





with 10 local people getting involved. The have learned the basics of crochet and have made scarves and blankets and are now moving onto reading patterns and learning more complex stitches which will assist them to have a lifelong skill. This course will end in June, and it is anticipated that if there are new learners identified, another course can be started in August.

There have been two youth workers appointed to start a junior youth club at the Toll Centre along with some of their volunteers, on Tuesday evenings for 8–11-year-olds. After training has taken place, it is hoped that the club will be able to start by mid to the end of May. When there is a definite date, the youth club will be advertised.

Unfortunately, it was not possible to appoint youth workers for a senior youth club however adverts will go out again over the summer months. This is a priority piece of work so if you or someone you know would be interested in working with high school aged young people, please get in touch with Lynn.

As well as adult learning classes and youth work, the Community Development Team

It's hard to believe that we have been open for over a year and we have had 122 hedgehogs through the door.

We are now also a fully licensed rescue with Fife Council so we have been able to increase the number of hedgehogs we can help which is great news!

We also had the exciting news that we are finalists for two Animal Star Awards—Voluntary Rescue Of The Year and UK Animal Charity Of The Year!

We are looking forward to attending the awards night in November.

Warmer days are here and thoughts turn to getting the garden up together.

PLEASE always check long grass thoroughly for hedgehogs before using any garden machinery like strimmers and mowers. Hedgehogs will not run from noise but will instead ball up and stay put.

Please avoid using pesticides in the garden this includes weed killer sprays. We see hedgehogs with awful chemical burns from these sprays.

Try to keep any holes in gardens covered. We had a hedgehog in recently from Kinghorn that had got herself trapped in a water filled hole and was exhausted and suffering from hyperthermia from not being able to get out. Thankfully she is recovering well from her ordeal.

If you have a pond please ensure you have something that hedgehogs are able to use to get out of it such as rocks at the side or

logs. They are great swimmers but will drown if they don't have easy access out.

If you want to help hedgehogs and other wildlife over the (hopefully) hot summer, please provide a shallow bowl of water daily. We see so many dehydrated hedgehogs over the summer months.

Please do not feed mealworms as these cause metabolic bone disease in hedgehogs. Even the calcified ones are no good and please no bread or milk. A bowl of good quality (high meat content) kitten biscuits is best to feed.

And remember Hedgehogs do not sunbathe! If you see one out in the day please contact the rescue for advice on 07577 000328

'The Changing Face of Our Town'

This year Burntisland Heritage celebrates its 30th anniversary of summer heritage exhibitions. Our exhibitions have been running every year with many different themes since 1994. This summer's exhibition has a strong focus on the High Street and illustrates some of the many



dramatic and nostalgic changes that have taken place in its landscape. It tells the poignant story of the town's architectural loss

It is quite remarkable the extent to which the townscape and surrounding countryside has changed over the last century and even in more recent times.

The exhibition includes many of the photographs used in the popular 'Changing Landscapes' exhibition we held in 2011. Re-photography is the photographing of a location which has been photographed in the past, perhaps many years ago. It is used to show "then and now" views of particular areas. This is another strong aspect of the exhibition.

Despite the limited space our collection of 22 model ships will remain on show during July and August. These include a battlecruiser, whalers, fishing boats, yachts, sailing ships and all vary in size from a Clyde Paddle Steamer and U-boat both 1.4 metres long to a small kit built aircraft carrier. The display is always a must see!

The exhibition opens at the start of Civic Week on Saturday 15th June. It will run to the 31st August at Burntisland Heritage Centre, 4 Kirkgate, situated just round the corner from the main door of the Burgh Chambers in the High Street. It will be open on Thursdays, Fridays and Saturdays from 11.00am to 4.00pm. Admission is free. We will also be open for Doors Open Day on 14/15th September.

During opening hours, visitors will also be able to view large collections of DVDs, scrapbooks and historical material relating to the town's fascinating history.

'It's About Time'

The Museum of Communication's new Exhibition, 'It's About Time', opened on 1st May and will be open on Wednesdays and Saturdays between 11 am and 4 pm until Saturday 28 September. Children are welcome and there will be hands-on exhibits

On Tuesday 18th June, during Civic Week, Jim Summers, a retired railway professional, will deliver a lecture on railway control systems that will include the control centre formerly based in Burntisland. Entry costs £5 per person. See the Museum's website for details of this and other lectures.

The Exhibition shows that time has always been a key part of communications systems. The need to reduce the time taken to get a message from one place to another, and the time taken to get a reply, have been instrumental in driving new inventions and developments in the field of communications.

With today's modern high-speed communications, we can view events happening on the other side of the world as they unfold. But it was not always like this. Try to imagine a world where it took three days to get a message from Edinburgh to London, or battles such as New Orleans (1815) were fought in wars that had already ended.

Come along and see early visual systems before electricity. See the telegraph equipment that superseded them and led to the development of telephones, followed by radio and television systems and wartime developments such as Radar and Sonar. All of these systems involve accurate measurement of time. Satellite, internet and GPS rapidly followed, giving us today's interconnected world, where to talk to the other side of the world takes hardly any time at all.

It's about time you came to see these great displays!

Items in the exhibition include:

Nixie Cube Clock—1950s/60s digital clock with 'Nixie' tube display.

HMS Loch Killen—Model of HMS Loch Killen, built in Burntisland in 1943 (on loan from Fife Museums & Galleries).

School Bell—Automatic bell once common in schools, including Burntisland.

Teaching Clock—Clock for teaching how to tell the time on dial clocks.

The Ecology Centre

Spring has slowly returned after a wet and windy winter, with the passing of the seasons new life has been breathed back into existence. Both on land and sea, young plants and animals are starting to spout, flutter and swim.

Just before Spring could properly announce itself, the Ecology Centre teamed up with local volunteers from across Fife, to participate in the second seagrass sowing event, as part of Restoration Forth's ambitious programme to help restore this coastal marine plant.

On a blustery March morning, 30 intrepid Fifers armed with their seed filled caulking guns, took to Burntisland Sands to sow just over 30,000 common eelgrass seeds. Over March, 135,000 seagrass seeds were injected into the intertidal sediment across three restoration sites, by 95 local volunteers. We will keep a close eye out over these next few months to see how our new seedlings are doing.

Back on dry land, the Ecology Centre is offering an exciting opportunity for people between the ages of 16 and 65 with the chance to develop their ecological and outdoor education skill set, through our FOLA forest school level 4 qualification and volunteering placement.



Craigencalt Rural Community Trust

Our Spring Walking Festival this year spanned three weeks in March and April, so we thought surely there would be some nice warm days, but we were wrong! Everyone now knows that this spring the weather remained cold, wet, and windy, but nothing dampened the spirits of our walkers. Walkers turned up for each walk, good natured and smiling ready in boots and waterproofs.

A big part of the festival is meeting new people and trying new routes for walks. During walks we found places to shelter out of the wind and rain to enjoy snacks and chat together with many new companions. The walk leaders treated us to walks in Raith Woodland, East and West Wemyss, as well as countryside around Kinghorn and Burntisland. There were also interesting heritage walks around Craigencalt, Burntisland Harbour, and one in Aberdour

We would like to thank all our participants for making this event so much fun and not letting the conditions stifle the enjoyment. We appreciate that not everyone can manage to join us at our regular walk times so you can find a good selection of walks on our website for you to take at your leisure. It is good to get out when you can, to explore this beautiful area of Fife.

Often the Trust is asked about the barley straw rafts that float on Kinghorn Loch, and why they are there. In early spring the loch user groups hold a workday to pile barley straw on to the four rafts. This year, with two boats and plenty of help, the job was completed in record time. The bird life is always encouraged by this activity and always sees it as a sign to begin nesting in the straw.

An article on the 'history of the problem with algal blooms and its resolution' is available on the Trust website. It is written by Ron Edwards who has been involved in the recovery of the loch since 1980.

Nature at Kinghorn Loch remains the same abundance each year. Many birds are now nesting and the swallows and sand-martins are returning for another summer. The female swan has taken up residence just outside the bird hide so we will have a good view of her cygnets once they arrive.

By the time you read this the annual 'Come and Try Day' event at Kinghorn Loch will have taken place. The loch may be small but it is full of activity all year round, with sailing, canoeing, rowing and radio-controlled yacht clubs. If you prefer a quieter pastime there is also bird watching or just enjoy a walk around with the dog.

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

Last edition I shared a list of all the bird species I encountered on a walk from school drop-off to Binn Pond. This time I head in the other direction, a walk from school to my station studio via the Lammerlaws. I always try to work at least a minute or two of nature into any route I take, anywhere.

Down Cromwell Road, from the hidden hilly woodland between nursery and old school a chiffchaff sang its name - "chiff chaff, chiff chiff chaff", repeat, repeat. House sparrows chirped from gardens which haven't yet ripped out their hedges. Starlings chattered on gutters. The mature trees leading onto the Links held magpies and a dozen or more jackdaws, "chack chack chack". Across the Links, picking up a bottle, a can, bits of wrappers to put in bins as I went. Under the tunnel and up the steps towards the skate park. A female blackbird (female blackbirds are brown) foraged under the unkempt (unkempt is *great*!) bushes alongside a scattering of house sparrows.

Walking the prom by swimming pool the tide was in so I couldn't go down the slippery steps to retrieve the Burger King cup and straw, the crisp packet, the chunk of polystyrene preparing to break into a thousand tiny white plastic balls for fish to swallow. In the bay, lesser black-backed gulls rested on the water and close enough for a really nice view through binoculars was a large group of redbreasted mergansers. Twenty-three I first counted but moments later it was forty as they did their mergansery thing of diving down, rising up, diving down... You'll be watching mergansers when suddenly all fifty have vanished beneath the waves and you wonder were they ever there at all. Moments later they're all back. I scanned to the right. A pair of black and white ducks, one with long upturning needle tail - long-tailed ducks! Beautiful birds which I more often see off Kinghorn beach.

Binoculars still to my eyes and a chunky javelin of white hurled down through my vision. A gannet. Lots of gannets, gliding, diving. And smaller whiter finer birds ballet dancing through the air before suddenly angling its dark line of bill and crest down to the waves, folding wings in as a gannet and arrowing into the water after their fishy prey. Terns are back! My first of the year. And eiders of course. Females in brown but so intricately patterned if you get to see one up close as I do when they nest on the Isle of May. Males are white, black patches on sides and tail, gorgeous soft blue-green on back of the head.

I was at the Lammerlaws by now and sitting nestled among rocks and shingle. I made a little watercolour sketch of two eiders. I saw turnstones camouflaged on the dark seaweedy tideline. A cormorant stood tall on the furthest point of rocks and when I lifted binoculars seven or more redshanks stood beside it, their orange legs (red shanks) shining out. Often shags perch there too, especially in winter. Not today. But out on Black Rock one held its wings wide, a dragon. I made another mini painting. Cormorant in the foreground, huge blue hulk of heavy-lift ship and rig in the background. Herring gulls flew past. Once a kittiwake. Once a crow.

I realised I was very cold, time to head to studio. Linnets flew up as they often do here on the Lammerlaws. Goldfinches too. Down the path below South View a wren sang so loud between the cliff walls. Woodpigeons were in the trees where crows usually nest. Feral pigeons clattered on sloping slate roofs and a blue tit sang in an elder. Through the 'waste' ground (i.e. excellent wildlife habitat) between Scott Pallets and Calypso were rabbits, dunnock, house sparrow, blackbird. Thousands of pale yellow primroses, so unassuming, so beautiful. Dog poo in tied bags here and there on top of them (why oh why). There should be chiffchaffs singing here too, and willow warblers about to arrive, but now that the Calypso woodland is destroyed the habitat they nested in is gone. A tree sparrow and a great tit were in the narrow bit of remaining hedgerow.

As I walked the final stretch between railway and The Fence a greenfinch sang ahead of me, a raspy wheezy song. I scanned the other side of the dock hoping for a heron or possibly small wading birds on the sloping harbour wall. Neither today. Twenty eight species on an hour and a half walk in our lovely town.
