ow is the time for action - In contrast to the fascinating photograph above, our community, like many others across the country, continues to be polluted by the careless and inconsiderate actions of a few through indiscriminate littering and allowing widespread dog fouling throughout our streets and green areas. This seems more prevalent in the winter months, but as the hours of daylight increase there is nowhere for these offenders to hide and it is up to every one of us to take positive action to discourage these disgusting habits.

The March meeting of the Community Council received a briefing from a leading member of the recently established "Safer Community Officers" who are committed to liaising closely with communities throughout Fife, and who will be directly responsible for enforcing regulations relating to littering and dog fouling. They will be operating round the clock and will respond to reports and information that they receive from the members of the public. Dog owners who allow their pets to foul public areas and litter louts, when caught, will be issued with an £80 fixed penalty ticket on the spot. However, in order that Officers can be effectively deployed, they must be made aware of where and when offences regularly occur. If you witness a dog owner failing to "pick up", don't just let off steam by having a rant on Facebook - report the details either by phone or email to the number or address below.

Littering is a slightly different problem. Firstly we should bin our own litter or take it home. We have recently had a successful beach clean up operation and "pick up equipment" has been strategically placed at either end of the prom for the use of the general public. If we see discarded plastic bottles, fast food containers or the like littering our public areas, why not pick it up and bin it? We have a town with impressive natural amenities which attract many visitors during the warmer months - the life blood of many of our High Street traders. Let us make a collective effort this year to keep our town clean and attractive so that our very welcome visitors will spread the word amongst their friends and leave with a fond desire to return to spend some quality, leisure time in a beautiful and pristine environment.

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Community Council Bullets......

The Community Council holds its regular meetings on the second Friday of each month at 7.00 pm in Burntisland Burgh Chambers. Members of the public are welcome to attend or to raise matters of interest to them. A summary of issues raised during the last two meetings is set out below.

- Police Scotland are responding to concerns about speeding by carrying out spot checks.
- Funding is now almost all in place for the inclusive play park at the East Links.
- Meetings are taking place with Scottish Water to help deal with the periodic flooding at Haugh Road.
- Former winners of the Community Award will all receive enamel badges bearing the Arms of the Community Council.
- The restoration of railings and paths at the Half Moon is well under way.
- We have appealed against the refusal to allow additional pharmacy services and are awaiting a final decision.
- We are exploring ways to bring the former Fife Council Locality Office back into use as part of a vibrant Burgh Chambers complex.
- Plans are in hand to hang more paintings by Andrew Young, which
 were recently gifted to Burntisland Heritage. They will be placed in the
 Burgh Chambers once blinds are in place to prevent damage from
 excessive light.
- New road signs will be erected at the entrances to the town to reflect the Royal Burgh status.
- Discussions have taken place to help develop a Neighbourhood Development Plan for Rossend.
- Conservation work is continuing on the Kirkton Church.
- There are now 34 Safer Community Officers throughout Fife with 16 available at any one time to respond to complaints about environmental or social nuisance.
- Requests for action which are posted on the Community Council's Facebook page are sometimes best dealt with by the elected members of Fife Council. We will try to redirect messages where appropriate.
- The problem of debris clogging the burn at the Toll Park has been resolved.
- A planning application has been submitted for the construction of 3 houses at Church Street on land which is currently occupied by garages.
- The Community Council has been made a provisional member of the Development Trusts Association Scotland. It will be a springboard from which a new, independent Development Trust can be created with additional stakeholders in order to take forward a variety of key projects.

have now been in post as the Community Inspector covering Burntisland since the beginning of the year and it gives me great pleasure to be given the opportunity to be part of this edition of the Burgh Buzz.

Buzz.

The identification of local priorities and the issues that affect the people who live, work and visit Burntisland are essential in the development of my yearly Area Plan and how they link with the Police Scotland Policing Plan. Delivering a local service to meet local requirements is paramount to how I

develop individual plans and priorities that tackle and deal with policing matters at a local level. The views of our communities are important to us and I am committed to using the information you provide to help me shape our policing priorities which we will deliver with the public and our partners. This information influences how we communicate and engage and how we make ourselves as accessible as possible to those looking to use our services. Listening to the views of the community we recently made changes to the Community Engagement Meeting (CEM) by having the meeting located centrally at the Burntisland Primary School. We invited partner agencies to attend and by changing the times we have opened it up to members of the community who previously could not attend. The first such meeting was well attended and is being reviewed as it develops and we will make changes if required.

Disorder complaints within the division (calls from the public relating to antisocial behaviour in the form of public nuisance, disturbance, noise, neighbour dispute) have shown continuing reduction during 2014/15 and this now continues into 2015-16 with a 16.7% decrease in complaints for April – December 2015 versus the same period in the previous year.

I am aware of the current nuisance caused by antisocial behaviour in Burntisland and that alcohol is a major factor in this activity. Our local officers work closely with the Alcohol and Violence Reduction Unit, Community Safety Partnership, Drug and Alcohol Partnership, Community Wardens and with local authority analysts to seek a long term solution to the problem. Local officers are continually working hard to detect and deter crimes of vandalism and disorder utilising mobile CCTV and by seeking additional staff through the Campaign against Violence deployments. Offenders are robustly dealt with and prohibitions of their future movements in the town are sought through the court process. As always we seek assistance from the community in tackling this issue to help identify those involved.

Welcome to New Burntisland Post Office Operator

fter months of waiting, Burntisland has finally welcomed a new Post Office operator - Maria Nawaz.

The difficulties with the previous operator and the curtailed hours have been a long running cause for concern in the town and there have been many months of negotiation and discussion with Post Office to try to resolve the situation. Hopefully with the arrival of the new operator, that situation is now behind us.

The new store will stock stationary, lottery tickets and other products. In time, other services like passport photos will be offered, but the shop will not compete with other High Street traders to sell groceries.

Maria has moved to the town with her young family in order to devote her time and efforts to her new business venture. She intends to move to seven day opening hours as soon as is possible, meaning that Burntisland will enjoy a comprehensive postal service for the first time in ages.

"We have previously spend holidays here in Burntisland and we are now really enjoying living and working in the town," said Maria.

"We have waited a long time to resolve the issues with Burntisland post office," said Cllr Susan Leslie, "So it is great news to hear that Maria and her family are so committed to the town and providing a great service. I hope that Burntisland will support Maria and the post office."





he Kirkcaldy and Burntisland CAP centre (which also covers Methil, Leven and Glenrothes) has been very busy since Christmas. I thought I would give a wee overview of what we do, as a few people have been asking.

CAP provides free one to one debt counselling. Although the actual debt counselling is done at head office in Bradford, CAP partners with local churches (Burntisland Parish Church in our case) to provide the centres and the one to one support. Each centre has a manager/debt coach and more than one if in a big city. In our centre there is just me and some voluntary support workers, called befrienders. My job is to go to each client's home and collect information about their income, expenditure and the debts. I send this down to Bradford where a budget and a debt repayment plan are created. I take this budget out to the client and get the go ahead and the necessary signatures etc. The client then sends one weekly or

monthly payment to CAP and they distribute it between the client's creditors and also a wee savings pot for the client.

CAP's research has shown that debt is often a symptom of deeper issues and we take a holistic approach to what we do. We are encouraged to take clients out for coffee and spend time with them socially - often clients have shut themselves off from friends and family because they feel ashamed of their debt. CAP is all about giving people a new hope for the future and the befriending service does actually change lives. It's very humbling. When a client goes debt free, they celebrate at head office by blowing a harmonica – there are 250 folks at head office and an average of 65 people going debt free every week. That's a whole lot of noise! CAP have won awards in the credit industry for the way they work, and Martin Lewis, the money expert, always suggests CAP for debt problems, particularly if there are mental health issues. Not bad for a charity which began in 1996 with a man sitting at his kitchen table with a tenner in his hand.






Christian Aid **Coffee Morning**

BURNTISLAND'S NATURAL HERITAGE EXHIBITION

ext year the face of Mary Somerville who grew up in Burntisland will appear on the new Royal Bank of Scotland

Mary was known as the 19th century 'Queen of Science' and her permanent childhood home was Burntisland where she spent most of her formative years. She was a pioneering and eminent mathematician, astronomer and geographer. In her memoirs her description of the town as a small sea port sheltered by the Binn with the communal Links and

sandy bay is recognizable to residents and visitors today. One of the most distinctive features of Mary Somerville's work is her understanding of what we now accept as the cosystem. This she understood and knew more than two centuries ago from her own observations in her childhood home of Burntisland.

Appropriately the theme for the Burntisland Heritage 2016 summer exhibition is 'Our Natural Heritage'. It will focus on the wealth and diversity of the area's abundant and varied natural heritage.

The exhibition intends to showcase this with an extensive 40 panel informative display of local photography which will cover different zones and natural heritage aspects of the surrounding area. From the land at the summit and slopes of the Binn down through the built-up environment, the aim is to capture images that illustrate fascinating and spectacular plants, birds and animals that grow and live on our doorstep. The areas of interest will extend over the extensive foreshore and beyond to Inchkeith revealing the myriad of life that lives on the seabed and beneath the waves. Inchkeith will also be featured given its importance as a sanctuary in the spring and summer months for a variety of nesting seabirds. In the late autumn it is the birthplace of hundreds of grey seal pups. The exhibition is also an opportunity to raise awareness of the richness of the town's environment and encourage efforts to maintain and protect it. Over the years the trust has worked in partnership with the local primary school. This year, Burntisland Primary School has been given the opportunity to study the town's natural heritage. The Curriculum for Excellence allows the children to learn through investigation and exploration. Some of this work forms part of this exhibition in a scrapbook and sketchbook collection.

The exhibition is at Burntisland Heritage Centre, 4 Kirkgate, Burntisland (just round the corner from the main door of the Burgh Chambers in the High Street).

The 10 week exhibition will run from 18th June to 27th August inclusive, and will be open on Wednesdays from 1.00pm to 4.00pm and on Thursdays, Fridays and Saturdays from 11.00am to 4.00pm.

Kirkton Church Conservation Project

nyone passing down Church Street will see the ruins of Kirkton Church slowly emerge from its jacket of ivy. Stonemasons have been at work for a month removing the creepers which, it is hoped will not return. There is also an ongoing maintenance plan, which will ensure it remains ivy-free. Limited consolidation work will be carried out with loose masonry reset and any fallen stones gathered within the chancel.

Earlier last month AOC archaeology group started to record the ruins which includes scanning the buildings using powerful hi-tech laser scanners. The gathered information is then turned into 2D drawings and stunning 3D images. Some interesting features, often missed by



the naked eye have already been discovered in the scanning process. Phase one of the project will soon be completed and it is hoped that phase two, the main conservation and landscaping work will commence towards the end of May.

Andrew Davies of Archway Metals has approached the Heritage Trust with the very kind offer to assist with metal work to be used later in the project. The Working Group would also like to apologise to residents in Church Street for any disturbance they experience during on - going work and to thank the staff of the Co-op for acting as key holders.





Burntisland's Future - It's in your hands

It seems hardly any time since many hundreds of people took the time to give their views on what they want for Burntisland. At the September event alone, over 300 people considered countless options and helped to prioritise what should be done over the next 5 years or so.

Arising from that, the Community Council are about to publish a Community Action Plan. It will crystallise what matters most to local people across a variety of themed topics.

The data gathered from the original survey has already been used to excellent effect. For example, there is rock-solid evidence to support the need for new play facilities. The outcome is already clear, with nearly £70,000 raised for the inclusive play-park at the East Links and more on the way for the Spider Park at the West Links. Similarly, the survey evidence has been used to support the need for an additional pharmacy for the town.

In the background, the survey data has been refined and categorised by a steering group made up entirely of volunteers from the Community Council and other stakeholders. However, it's not just for the Community Council. The Community Action Plan provides the baseline for any local group which is ambitious enough to raise funds on a grand scale. It gives evidence of demand and shows the context within which significant fund-raising can take place.

However, two top priorities are already emerging. One is how best to make fuller use of the Burgh Chambers complex, whilst also restoring the clock tower and ensuring a sustainable business plan for many years ahead. It requires a mixture of ambition, initiative, entrepreneurship and due diligence. It's not an easy combination – or a quick outcome - but it could result in a vibrant, central hub in the middle of our High Street.

A second is the creation of a Community Development Trust for Burntisland, which has the potential to become an umbrella organisation in support of a huge range of community initiatives. The Community Council itself cannot legally become such a trust. So there is huge scope for community-minded individuals to come forward and form the nucleus of a completely new organisation.

The Community Council has already taken the initiative by joining the Development Trust Association Scotland. Over the coming months, we will take advice and invite interest from those local people who want to strive for a better, stronger and more active community for many years ahead.

The Community Action Plan will be launched at a formal event – currently scheduled for late June – and it will be open to all local people to attend. From that point on, we will be very interested in hearing from those who would like to form the core of a Community Development Trust. It's not an easy option. We will be looking for people who are willing to take shared responsibility for some exciting projects, whilst putting in the hours required to get maximum benefit for our community.

More information about the launch event will be available shortly, so please watch out for the details and be ready to make a note in your diary.

This year, through the efforts of Rab Watson, and with the support of Councillor Kay, we will be holding Live on the Links, not only on the Links, but on the bandstand, where we started this in 1983.

It was early 1983, and we were rehearsing with our band Boxed Set, at the Unity Hall. The Cuinzie Neuk in Kinghorn, one of the few places which encouraged original music had closed. With no idea where we were going to play, I looked out of the window across the links at the bandstand and announced that I wanted to play there.

Scarlet Lies, one of the two other local bands organised the event, and we drew 350 people. Rab Watson's Troops of Tomorrow opened. We did it again in 1984 on the bandstand,

but not since.

The bandstand is ideally situated, high enough to let the sound go straight out to sea and shielded by the Big Knowe, hopefully minimising reflection back towards the town. It does lack a roof and electricity, and performing from the back of a lorry seemed a more compact option. However facing the town one year brought complaints.

Rab and others carried on the event intermittently, from 1985 until 2008, when we both realised that it had been 25 years since the first one. Having been offered an evening in the Civic Week Marquee, they teamed up with other bands to celebrate, and also in memory of our musician friends in particular, who could not be there to share the evening. Subsequently, to reduce cost, we have held our events at Pettycur Bay and the Smugglers, but despite our long history and our Facebook presence, it is amazing how many people in Burntisland just haven't heard of us.

This year it is Rab's hope that by sponsoring the extra costs of the outdoor event, we can begin to grow an event which will become an attraction in years to come, and of some benefit to the town. And as usual, our invitation is open to younger Burntisland bands and musicians to make themselves known to us for the future. In the meantime, we are proud to present a days free entertainment, featuring talent from Burntisland and Kinghorn with our friends from Kirkcaldy and other surrounding towns, comprising 8 acts. We need a sunny day and for you all to come.

The Club also has appeared in a new book 'Bowled Over' published by Played in Britain in 2015. It celebrated the heritage of lawn


bowls in the UK and Club's pavilion, recently renovated, was featured as one of a very few Grade B listed bowls pavilions in the UK.

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Burntisland's Gulls

Living in Burntisland means living with gulls. For a lot of the year they're not very noticeable but come springtime breeding season they become rather an issue. They can be extremely noisy in the early mornings, and when kids are trying to sleep at night. They might steal a bite of your lunch, or your whole sandwich. They certainly do swoop at us as we walk past - pretty scary!

It helps me to know why they do these things. The noises are about courtship, pair-bonding, keeping in touch with young, defending territory. As I learn better which calls belong to which gulls it becomes more interesting, less irritating, and I try to remember that it's only during the breeding season. We're pretty noisy too, with our cars, planes and mowers and three months of Shows on the Links!

The swooping is to protect their chicks. A swooping gull is shooing us from its nest area just as we shoo it from our garden or picnic. It isn't trying to kill us and couldn't if it tried. On the rare occasion when a gull actually hits it's worth knowing that it's their feet not their beak that impact with our head. When walking, as soon as we move beyond the gull's territory the swooping stops. They pester more if you're with a dog and they also swoop at cats. Cats have no problem getting away fast.

A good technique for passing nest areas without stress or fright is to walk calmly, waving a gloved hand or bit of stick over your head. They still swoop but can't fly close enough to hit you.

I learnt this technique on the Isle of May where I go to paint. Accessing the harbour means walking through the nesting ground of hundreds of terns - beautiful seabirds, like delicate gulls but with dagger-sharp beaks. The terns rise en masse and swirl above, dive-bombing constantly and making a terrible shrieking commotion. Unlike gulls, terns *do* try to hit you, and they draw blood! The waving-above-head method (plus hat to avoid droppings) works perfectly and the experience becomes rather special - how often do we get to be so close to a natural, wild, animal? The other technique is to walk beside the tallest member of your group, which unfortunately seems to be me.

After studying and learning more about gulls I find I really enjoy and admire them. They're slick, bright, characterful, and one of the easiest creatures to watch. They have such fascinating lives, returning to their breeding territory each spring from hundreds of miles away, usually mating for life, living up to 32 years! I'm interested to see which rooftops they return to and whether they use the same spots as last year.

It's amazing watching the eggs appear then a month later crack open to reveal stripy grey fluffballs which grow and grow until larger than their parents and ready to flap down to the ground for the first time. I love that funny stage when adults have had more than enough of parenthood but youngsters keep whining for more food, more food. I don't enjoy seeing the young chicks which are hit by our cars.

Worldwide there are over gull 50 species and in Britain we commonly have six: Herring gull; Common gull; Lesser black-backed gull; Great black-backed gull; Black-headed gull; Kittiwake. All of these can be seen in or from Burntisland.

Surprisingly, gulls aren't doing as well as we might think. Herring gull is on the *UK Birds of Conservation Concern* Red List. Lesser black-backed, amongst others, is Amber Listed. Between 2000 and 2013, breeding Herring gull numbers fell by 30% and Lesser black-backed by 48%. Scientists say that much more info must be gathered before any big decisions about "how, when and where, to control gulls are taken, while a thorough understanding of their ecology should underpin any measures taken." (British Trust for Ornithology [BTO] 'Gulls allowed?' online article.)

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

On Monday 11 April I walked along the prom to pick up my daughter from after school club at the Beacon. The water was crashing over the railings and it felt very cold in the wind. It reminded me that life can be stormy, even in the midst of all the natural positives we associate with spring-time's promise of new life and hope.

The Bible's wise advice is, "Be still and know that I am God" (Psalm 46.10), especially in such difficult conditions. I hope that the longer days to come bring you blessing and the precious gift that is peace of mind.



I was asked a few weeks ago if a person needs to go to church to connect with God? And of course the answer is NO and that is straight from a vicar's mouth! And the reason I can say that with confidence is because the first time I connected with God myself, at the age of 27, was not in a church but rather in my home when I simply asked, 'God if you are there could you let me

know?'

I am not alone with such simple prayers since in the UK six out of seven people still believe that prayers can be answered despite a dramatic drop in formal religious observance. And although not everyone considers themselves as religious or goes to church, yet...

You see for Prayer – it's not the place that matters – it's what's in your heart. It's an individual action or connection – between you and God. It is having a conversation with God. And the good news is, anyone can do this. But Prayer is not only speaking to God but more important Prayer is about listening to God too. It is said that Prayer

...is not a monologue, but a dialogue; God's voice is its most essential part. Listening to God's voice is the secret of the assurance that He will listen to mine.

Craigencalt Trust News

ow that the better weather is with us, and we can all enjoy being outside more, we would like to recommend that you try a walk along the new pathway that the Trust has made at Kinghorn Loch that is easy for disabled buggies and families to travel. Walking from the car park at the lochside, the path enters the woodland at Craigencalt Farm. It follows a gentle incline until it reaches a new picnic area as you leave the woodland, then crosses the field to join the farm track that runs along the north side of the loch. At this point, if you turn left the track takes you to the start of Rodanbraes Path or through the Loch Road for

Burntisland or Kinghorn. Go up Rodanbraes Path to visit its troll under the wooden bridge and along the ridge to the ruined cottages of Rodanbraes. This path has splendid views across the Forth Estuary. Alternatively, turning right at the junction with the farm track at the new path, takes you back around to the farm steading where the new 'Barn at the Loch' Cafe is now open. The food and welcome is highly recommended and if the weather is cool there is a cosy wood burning stove to warm you. The cafe is run by Bruce and Sarah Stuart who have the cafe "Food for Thought" in Burntisland, we are delighted that they have taken on the new cafe and farm shop at the loch.

The path is part of our lochside project which has been funded by, Awards for All, Fife Environmental Trust, with much assistance from Alcan and a hard working commitment from

volunteers of the Trust. Project funding has already been used to make four new barley straw rafts to float on the loch and ensure good water quality each year. The rafts were finished in February and the barley straw piled on top so that they were in place for the varied bird life to use for nesting in spring.

On Saturday 7th May, the Trust, along with the sports and leisure groups, will be holding a "Come and Try" day at Kinghorn Loch. The event is free and runs from 1 – 4pm. If you would like to take part bring a change of clothes just in case. There are lovely new toilets at the farm where you can change. The Trust also has a thriving Walking Group who meet the first and middle Wednesday of each month. Walks last two hours and the group meets at 10am in the layby car park just before the road down to Craigencalt Farm. All are welcome to come along and in May the group is going on a walk to Glassmount House gardens.
