Burntisland Public Library reopened after a major refurbishment at 09.30 am on Tuesday 25th April.

Several libraries in Fife have recently been closed because they were assessed to have been underused and not giving value for money.

In this extended period of government austerity, it is essential that the Burntisland community makes maximum use of the public library and records a footfall which demonstrates its worth to the community. You can rest assured that the authorities will be monitoring its use:-

The Community Council holds its regular meetings on the second Friday of each month at 7.00 pm in Burntisland Burgh Chambers. Members of the public are welcome to attend or to raise matters of interest to them. A summary of issues raised during the last two meetings is set out below.

- Andy Smith has been welcomed as a full member of the Community Council. Some vacancies remain and anyone interested is very welcome to contact other members or the Chairman for more information.
- It is likely that both of the new play areas on the Links will be in full operation in time for the summer season. Recent grants from ExxonMobil and Shell at Mossmorran helped to ensure that the overall funding is now in place.
- Work is progressing on the Kirkton churchyard which is likely to be completed and opened to the public from late summer / early autumn, thanks to the combined efforts of the Community Council, Burntisland Heritage Trust and Historic Scotland.
- Plans are in hand for a beach clean by the Lloyds Bank Charity Team.
- Concern has been expressed about the signage and positioning of the traffic lights at the Kirkton. This topic will be included in a wider discussion about parking and possible 20 mph zones.
- A proposal for an additional pharmacy in Burntisland has been refused by the relevant NHS appeal panel and will not go ahead meantime.
- There are financial advantages for the Community Council if it
 were to become a charity. However, there are differences in
 terms of eligibility for Community Council membership and
 charity trusteeship. So alternative ways of gaining the benefit of
 charitable status will be explored.
- The Toll Burn has been cleaned by the Community Payback team and repairs to the fence are in hand.
- A campaign against litter and dog mess will be led by the Safer Communities team.

The reason for this letter therefore, is to make you aware of this activity. If anyone does appear on your doorstep

asking for sponsorship for charity events or soliciting cash for charities such as Cancer Research or Race for Life, you must check the collector's official registration certificate which will contain the person's full name and registration number. If in any doubt, refuse to donate.

Unfortunately, this shameful and unlawful practice denies genuine charities valuable funds and takes advantage of the many generous individuals in our community who donate to worthy causes.

Please take heed of this warning.

Museum of Communication

At the moment of writing, we are in the midst of preparations for the opening of our 2017 exhibition at the beginning of May – so things are a bit chaotic at 131 High Street, Burntisland.

This year, we've called our Exhibition "_REMEMBER WHEN......Looking Back 50 and 100 Years"

Because of very positive feedback, we are continuing to chart the course of WW1. By 1917, the war had reached absolute stalemate, with horrendous battles raging across mainland Europe, Africa and Asia, with little gain to anyone. The deadlock was broken exactly 100 years ago, in April 1917, when the USA declared war on Germany and the tide turned in favour of the Allies.

We thought it would be interesting to look back to 1967 and see just how much everyday life in Britain had been affected by two cataclysmic world wars (and many other lesser wars and conflicts), in the previous 50 years - Continuous Hardship? Poverty? Unemployment? Self- denial and Sacrifice?- Not a bit of it.

Fifty years ago, we were in the middle of the Swinging Sixties – and wow! Did they SWING! Gone was the drabness and gloom of yesteryear – this was a gaudy, noisy 'anything goes' time, when it was great to be young! The brash era of Flower-Power... Jobs were plentiful, so today's youth had lots of spending power, which fuelled a 'Permissive Society', doubtless assisted by recent media developments and the availability of drugs, as well as the introduction of the contraceptive pill.

However, there was a darker side to the sixties. It was a time of sharp contrasts.... Whilst the Flower Power folk preached love, harmony and peace, the equally dominant gangs of Mods and Rockers fought violent, murderous running battles in our streets. Whilst we organised huge Peace Marches and 'Ban the Bomb' Rallies, we spent our evenings watching footage of our American allies doing their utmost to obliterate Vietnam from the face of the Earth. We stressed the importance to our Planet of conserving depleting natural energy sources, whilst we burnt more fuel more than ever before and introduced bigger, better, gas-guzzling cars onto our streets.

In the sphere of home entertainment, 1967 was something of a breakthrough year...On July 1st , BBC2 became Europe's first colour TV broadcaster, with live coverage of the Wimbledon Championships – TV was never quite the same again.

Meanwhile, over on BBC Radio, big changes were also taking place in 1967.... The familiar BBC Light Programme was rebadged as Radio 2. The Third Programme became Radio 3 and the dear old Home Service, Radio 4.

The biggest change of all was the introduction of a new pop music channel, Radio 1. Pirate Radio, which broadcast from specially equipped vessels moored off the British coast, had been officially banned and the BBC 'head-hunted' their most popular and well known presenters to appear on their new Channel, many of whom went on to become some of the BBC's most popular (and probably) highest-paid earners!

This was indeed the Swinging Sixties and for many of us, of a certain age, the nostalgia is overwhelming!

Kirkton Church Restoration Continues Apace

ow that the long winter is drawing to a close work can resume on conservation of the Kirkton Church ruins. 'Phase two' is now underway and the contract for stonework has been awarded to Forth Stone Ltd. In 'phase one', the walls were stabilized and the wall-heads capped to prevent water penetration; 'phase two' will continue this work on the walls.

Work will also take place on landscaping and installation of the two benches kindly donated by Archway Metals. A Graveyard Consultant has been appointed to examine areas of interest within the graveyard and assist in the development of an educational pack.

A number of stones have been identified as being of interest, such as an old 'Thruch Stane' dating from 1626 belonging to John Kent, a Bailey of Burntisland, and also the family burial grounds of the Young family and the Aytouns. We are also fortunate in having a relatively rare cast iron slab grave marker from the early 1800s.

It is hoped that the main stonework will be completed by the end of June and landscaping and stabilization of gravestones completed shortly after. The Working Group would like to apologise to residents in Church Street for any disturbance



they experience during on-going work and also thanks to the staff of the Co-op for acting as key holders.

On completion this project will provide the town not only with a beautifully conserved medieval church ruin but an attractive space for quiet reflection.

A thruch or throwc stane is a flat or recumbent slab. They were in use in medieval Scotland and were popular in the sixteenth and seventeenth century. The inscription runs around the margin as well as on the central surface. A headstone reads like a page from a book You can walk round the recumbent slab reading the marginal inscription.

Living History comes to Kinghorn Loch! Defending Fife (1651) – 19th & 20th August 2017 Sponsored by Barn at the Loch



id you know that during the summer of 1651 Burntisland & Kinghorn and the whole of Fife was on the front line during the Wars of the Three Kingdoms?

In Scotland Oliver Cramwell with his 'New Model Army' was to the south of the River Forth & the Scotlish

In Scotland Oliver Cromwell with his 'New Model Army' was to the south of the River Forth & the Scottish Royalist forces were on the North shore. The main Royalist army was based in Stirling, which was a strong strategic position to hold the invaders at bay. Cromwell tried on a number of occasions to 'tempt' them out of their defensive positions to fight but to no avail. This left him with no alternative other than to try an amphibious landing somewhere in Fife. Attempts were made to land troops in Burntisland but were unsuccessful. His forces eventually established a bridgehead at Inverkeithing and after a brisk battle broke out he advanced on Perth. Fife was subdued and occupied for the next nine years.

The Erskine's First Captains Company (an experienced re-enactment group) who specialise in this time period will be visiting Craigencalt Farm in Kinghorn to represent a small company of Scots preparing for the invaders. The company operating from their camp beside Kinghorn loch will give visitors a feel for the life, uniform, weapons and drills of Scots soldiers whilst describing the events of the 1651 invasion. The team share an enthusiasm for Scotland's 17th century history but also each member has specific interests such as; domestic life: medical, uniforms, weapons, religious history and politics. This range of passions gives depth to the displays and delivers something for everyone to enjoy. The company's displays include a range of parades, pike and musket drills, living history camps, and combat.



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



First Aid Update

t's always nice to receive a letter of thanks when our members have given excellent service, and one such occasion followed a recent event in Stirling. Three

of our volunteers were covering an event when a lifethreatening accident occurred.

First person on scene (in seconds) was local member Gary Cummins. He expertly managed the conflicting demands of serious facial injuries and the patient's airway, whilst more kit was brought to the scene. Within minutes, the patient was on

high-flow oxygen and our three volunteers worked closely with an off-duty GP who was nearby. Transfer to the ambulance service was completed about 30 minutes later.

Commenting afterwards, the event organiser described their actions as being "superb" and also passed on the grateful thanks of the patient's family. We've been advised that although specialist surgery will be required the immediate threat to the patient's airway was averted, and longer-term complications were therefore avoided.

All in all it was a very satisfactory outcome to a challenging incident.

Date of Birth - Party Trick

Dorothy Brankin of the MOC, when raking through old material recently uncovered a formula originally formulated in the 1930s by Ernest Neill of Newcastle-upon-Tyne, for calculating the day of the week on which you were actually born - Try it – it actually works!

Step 1: Take the last two digits of the year of the birth.

Step 2: Add one quarter of this number (ignoring any remainder)

Step 3: Add the date of the month of the birth

Step 4: Add the following number, according to the month of birth:- January – 1 (or 0 in a leap year); February – 4 (or 0 in a leap year); March – 4; April – 0; May – 2; June – 5; July – 0; August – 3; September – 6; October – 1; November – 4; December – 6.

Step 5: For the 1700s add 4; 1800s add 2; 1900s add 0; 2000s add 6

Step 6: Divide the total by 7. The remainder gives the day of the week on which the person was born:-

Sunday = 1; Monday = 2; Tuesday = 3; Wednesday = 4; Thursday = 5; Friday = 6; Saturday = 0

Example..... Date of Birth: 30 June 1969

(1....69) + (2....17) + (3....30) + (4....5) + (5....0)

Total = 121 121 divided by 7 = 17 remainder 2....

..... so the person (Dorothy's daughter!) was born on a Monday – as indeed she was. - Amazing!

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

Make a micro-pond for nature by Leo du Feu

ne of the best things we can do to help nature in our gardens is to make a wildlife pond. Even if you have only the smallest of spaces it's quick and easy to make a micro-pond:

- 1 Get an old washing-up bowl/plastic box/any non-leaking container.
- 2 Dig container into ground or sit it on patio slabs or even put it up on a raised bed. I put a liner of old carpet under mine but that's not vital.
- **3** Use stones/planks to allow hedgehogs and other wildlife to get in and out without drowning.
- **4** Fill from your water butt or allow rainwater to fill it over time -
- "don't" use tap water as its high nutrient levels and chlorine,

although good for us, are harmful to freshwater wildlife and gradually encourage duckweed and algae to swamp out all other plant life.

Your reward will be birds and hopefully hedgehogs coming for a drink. It's likely that frogs/toads/newts will appear in your garden too, maybe even damselflies or dragonflies. The more of neighbours you encourage to put in wildlife ponds the more chance of all these species coming back to your area. If you're worried about children playing near ponds secure sturdy wire mesh over the top and consider siting pond in good view of the house.

ven though the running race season is only just starting to get into full swing, the Beacon Runners have not been idling on the couch watching Netflix during the winter months. As well as the ever popular Devils Burden Relay in the Lomond Hills at the start of year in which we entered 3 teams, the Beacon has also been represented in strength at the Glentress Marathon (3 runners), half Marathon (7) and 10k (1) back in February, the John Muir Way 50k Ultra on 1st April with 6 Beacon Runners – two doing the full distance and two pairs completing the course as a relay. As well as these longer distance events, Beaconers have

also taken part in the Devilla Forest 5k and 10k trail races, the Gartmorn 10k, numerous Park Runs and the Arbroath Smokies Ladies 10 mile race where ten Beacon women successfully completed the course. Future events at which the Beacon will be represented include the Highland Fling Ultra at the end of April, the inaugural Stirling Marathon in May (good luck to marathon first timers Clark Christie and Jennifer Winning) and the West Highland Way relay race in June. Nearer to home we are expecting a good turn out for the Black Rock 5 on 23rd June and the Donkey Brae Run on 30th July.

The Beacon Runners meet every Monday at 7.00pm at the Beacon Leisure Centre. We are a very mixed ability group of runners and new members are always welcome. So whether you are thinking of doing your first Park Run or are an experienced marathon runner we will be delighted to see you.
