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Sun Shines on Burntisland Games



n the third Monday of July, brilliant sunshine greeted residents and visitors alike who converged on the town to enjoy the many traditional activities associated with the staging of the 365th Burntisland Highland Games. Festivities started early with a civic reception in the Burgh Chambers, hosted by the Community Council.

This was attended by visiting exiles, the Provost of Fife, elected Fife Councillors, the Summer King & Queen, former and present Community Award winners and many invited guests. Community Council Chairman Alex MacDonald issued a warm welcome to all present who included former residents of Burntisland from as far afield as South Africa, Canada and Spain. He also used this special occasion to present a Lifetime Achievement Award to David Adamson for his long and dedicated service within the Burntisland Community (see page 11).

Following the reception, participants lined up behind Burntisland & District Pipe Band which included many juvenile pipers and drummers, and paraded to the games arena along a High Street lined with hundreds of excited onlookers. At 12 noon, the Honorary Chieftain of the Games Stuart Nicol, assisted by Provost Jim Leishman, officially opened proceedings. Throughout the afternoon spectators were regally entertained by highland dancers, runners and cyclists and the physically huge competitors in the heavy field events.

At 3pm the large field of 26 runners in the Binn Race, open to competitors who are residents of Burntisland, and boosted by many young competitors, took to their marks. They set off on the ascent of the Binn which was particularly gruelling in the very hot conditions. The race was eventually won by 15 year old Cameron Lewis who narrowly edged out last year's winner Stuart Tite in an excellent time of 25.03 minutes.

In the meantime the many hundreds of revellers enjoyed the fun of the fair ground and the numerous food and drinks outlets, particularly the ice cream vendors who did a roaring trade. (see page 12)

This summer, both Civic Week and the Highland Games have been blessed with good weather. The diverse series of events in the extensive Civic Week calendar were enjoyed by young and old - from the carnival atmosphere of the parade following the crowning of the summer King and Queen ceremony, to the nostalgic rendering of golden oldies by Des and the Dingoes to many more golden oldies present at the Star on the final Sunday afternoon.

The Highland Games and Fair Ground attractions were enjoyed by hundreds of visitors to the town on a gloriously sunny games day.

Although sunny weather contributes greatly, none of these events would happen without the dedicated efforts of the many volunteers who give of their spare time and considerable personal expertise in maintaining these traditions. We extend our grateful thanks to all who have assisted.

However, it would be wrong to assume that everything is perfect. The most obvious problem relates to parking. The placement of traffic cones on main road arteries and the deployment of overzealous traffic wardens on market day is not the answer. Temporary parking is required throughout the summer when visitors flock to the town to enjoy our natural amenities and permanent parking facilities are urgently needed in the vicinity of the railway station.

The creation of parking facilities on the waste ground behind the station has been proposed in the past and would result in an increase in the daily station footfall. This would contribute considerably towards the argument for disabled access to the north platform. As regards temporary parking, the old red pond at Ross Point is an obvious area but could have road safety and traffic flow implications. These are problems that can be overcome and which require the urgent attention of our newly elected Councillors.

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Community Council Bullets......

The Community Council holds its regular meetings on the second Friday of each month at 7.00 pm in Burntisland Burgh Chambers. Members of the public are welcome to attend or to raise matters of interest to them. A summary of issues raised during the last two meetings is set out below.

- With the recent election of two members to Fife Council our numbers are reduced, so we welcome expressions of interest from local people. It's essential to be on the electoral register for Burntisland and we recommend that potential members should first attend some of our meetings as members of the public. More information is available from the Chairman, Secretary or any other Community Council member.
- George McLauchlan has agreed to take on the role of interim Secretary, whilst Carole-Anne Paterson will be responsible for managing our Facebook page.
- The absence of a local post office continues to be of concern and we have formally advised Post Office Limited of our support for a new service in Burntisland.
- Together with volunteers from Lloyds Bank, a very successful beach clean took place on 10th May.
- Work on the Spider Park has now been completed, resulting in two new playparks on the Links for this summer.
- Anti-social behaviour and youth disorder remain a key concern. Police Scotland have emphasised that each incident should be reported to the police via 101 or 999, so that there is evidence to justify any increase in resources which might be allocated locally.
- A "Just Bin It" campaign started on 1st May, with the support of the Safer Communities team. Their hotline 03451 550022 should be used to report fly-tipping or similar behaviour.
- Fife Council are progressing repairs to the sea wall between Burntisland and Pettycur.
- Concerns over the condition and availability of public toilets have been referred to Fife Council.
- Work on conserving the Kirkton Church continues and will reach a key milestone at the end of July.
- Since our last meeting we have learned of a proposal to close the Kinghorn Loch Road for 24 weeks from early August. In the light of feedback from our own members and also from our Facebook page we have strongly opposed the proposal. A decision from Fife Council is awaited.
- We have received complaints about cars being driven irresponsibly on the Links and the complaints are being progressed through our newly elected members of Fife Council.

My name is Elizabeth James and I would like to introduce myself as your new Community Ward Police Officer. I will replace Bryan Weir who has moved onto another area within the Division.

I have 18-years' service with Police Scotland having spent 12 years serving the community as a response officer in the Cowdenbeath and Benarty areas. I then moved to another area of policing that had a Fife wide remit.

For the last year I have been based in Kirkcaldy getting to know the local area, including the surrounding towns of Kinghorn and Burntisland.

As a result of the time I spent in Burntisland, I'm aware that there

are issues with speeding motorists and general anti-social behaviour which often involves youths.

As a local community officer I, along with my colleagues, will do our best to uphold the law and deal with those who offend. PC Masterton and I will continue to work with the local speed watch volunteers and with their assistance strive to educate those caught so that they can amend their driving habits.

However, should an area be known for having the same problems on a regular basis, we will increase the police presence and deal robustly with anyone caught, especially repeat offenders.



Anti social behaviour involving youths is often associated with consumption of alcohol. Police have recently been made aware that this may be due to some parents supplying their children with alcohol to consume when out and about. All parents should be aware that the Scottish Government has made it an offence to give alcohol or make it available to anyone that is underage for them to consume in a public place.

Along with PC Masterton I intend to continue the good work already in place by supporting our licensed premises and encouraging them to refuse the sale of alcohol to anybody who is or appears to be under 18 years of age or whom they suspect to be purchasing it on behalf of those who are underage.

However it is not only the responsibility of the police to ensure that we keep our children and young people safe. It is also that of other adults, especially parents, and we would urge you all to support us and the local community by reducing the availability of alcohol to our young people.

Burntisland is a beautiful, vibrant town with so much going for it. Lets all work together to keep it that way.

Fife Council's Safer Communities Officers recently stepped up patrols in Burntisland to support the Just Bin It campaign in an effort to target dog fouling problems within the area. Safer Communities Officers carried out a total of 108 patrols, which equated to over 80 hours dedicated to tackling dog fouling in Burntisland. Encouragingly, no offences were witnessed by officers as all dog owners observed during the patrols responsibly picked up after their pets. As a result, this meant that no Fixed Penalty Notices were issued. Despite this, Officers received positive feedback from numerous members of the public whilst patrolling that their frequent presence in problem areas had made a significant difference.

Award Winning Gardener Visits FAB Project by Scott Sweaton

ecently, ScotRail Ambassador John Yellowlees and Scottish Civic Trust Civic Champion Louis Wall visited Burntisland Station to view and advise on the progress of the Biodiversity project there. They were met by Bob Malcolm, Station Team Manager with Scotrail, and members and associates of Floral Action Burntisland.

Louis is the recipient of many awards for his work on stations in South West Scotland, including the Streets Ahead Best Community Initiative 2016. He was able to make recommendations to the group based on his long experience of floral planting in stations, and showed photographs of the 20 station gardens he is responsible for which included Dumfries, Largs and Ayr. These feature a 'Biblical' garden with figs and dates, an 'Incredible Edibles' garden and a 'Wedding' garden in Gretna.

Station Team Manager Bob Malcolm was on hand to advise the group on practicalities such as locating water butts and information signs, which local artist Leo du Feu will be painting specially for the project. Local wildlife-friendly gardener, Neil Madigan, has exciting plans to create a garden which will attract birds, butterflies and ladybirds. The biodiversity project, which attracted the highest funding awarded in Scotland under the Abellio/Keep Scotland Beautiful scheme, will be completed later this summer.

When did they do it? And how did they do it? Get the latest Burntisland primary updates, here. To all those people out there, we hope you have had a good year in Burntisland and hope that another school year will be good for us.

Nursery: The Nursery children have been taught about Health and Wellbeing which included how to stay healthy by learning to wash themselves properly. Amongst outside trips were visits local butchers and vegetable shops. They also visited the beach where they learnt about measuring weights and sizes using rocks and rulers. The Nursery children took part in BPS sports day and recently won an award for bringing and riding bikes to school which was featured in a local newspaper.

Primary 1: Last term, all four P1 classes studied the sea and the seashore, frequently visiting the beach and searching for small creatures in the sand and rock pools. Amongst their finds were many different types of sea life including crabs, small fish, anemones, mussels and a large variety of shells. Class P1 H/S even created their own sea creatures; "Jellytulls", part jellyfish, part sea horse, part anemone and part turtle. All P1 children enjoyed an exciting outing to Deep Sea World in North Queensferry. They also worked hard at Maths which included working with money and even set up their own shop in the classroom. They tried hard to improve their reading and writing, concentrating on punctuation. P1F particularly enjoyed reading The Lighthouse Keeper book collection and P1T pupils invited their parents to join them in class to discuss their favourite fairy tales. At the end of

term all pupils enjoyed taking part in a variety of events on Sports Day which included sprints, mini hurdles, egg and spoon and sack races.

Last but not least, at the end of this term Mrs Fox (teacher of P1F) is leaving. Mrs Fox has been working at Burntisland Primary School for 39 years and we think we should make this special for her. We all wish her a happy future ahead of her and a good life. She worked very hard and long just to be with us and we are going to support her all the way. From us here, and the whole of Burntisland Primary School, happy retirement.



Primary 2: The topic for this term was Food and Farming. All classes visited the seashore searching out seaproduce which can be eaten, such as mussels. They also had a visit from a local farmer who brought along "Bella the Coo", a plastic replica of a cow. Some pupils even attempted to milk her. They studied other farm animals and learned about crops and combine harvesters. Routine learning involved times-tables up to 9, fractions, money and learning numbers in French. Pupils also practiced joined up writing and were introduced to synonyms.

Primary 3: As a topic this term all P3 pupils studied Ancient Egypt which included Egyptian gods, the pyramids and mummies. They even made mummified apples. Other subjects included addition, subtraction, division and shapes in Maths. In Literacy they covered, punctuation, paragraphs and hand writing.

An important development in P3 has been the arrival of two new teachers – Mrs Busher in P3B and Mr Scott in P3S. Both have settled in well to the BPS environment.

Primary 4: Class topic this term has been The Environment. They have enjoyed making fidget spinner games in maths lessons. In a mock Dragons Den, they designed and made inventions to help the environment and have also carried out a science experiment with water jars and made the water evaporate (it was like something from Hogwarts).

Primary 5: The topic this term has been Healthy Living which pupils have enjoyed very much as they have been to the beach and visited Burntisland Heritage Centre. As a group P5 has enjoyed making smoothies, going on Rotary Rambles walks to Kinghorn Loch and through the Bluebell Woods on their "EXHAUSTING" way to the half way stop at Aberdour's Silver Sands beach.

Primary 6: Class topic this term has been 'Inventors and Inventions'. Pupils have worked hard on design challenges that have included designing lamps, chairs and a roller-coaster (we're

not sure they'll meet safety standards!). They have operated in pairs to research famous inventors but the thing that they have enjoyed the most was writing spookalishis, spooky ghost stories.

Primary 7: Finally the news from our fantastic **Primary 7** pupils, the top dogs of BPS soon to be the newbies of Balwearie High. The past weeks have been full of excitement, tears and preparation - from the induction days to the leavers show. Everyone looked tired (including the P7 teachers).

All in all, it has been a **VERY** successful year at BPS, many challenges have been conquered and many happy memoires have been made. oinciding with the start of Burntisland Civic Week, on Saturday 17th June Fife Kinship carers and their children gathered in Burntisland for their annual summer event.

This was organised by a partnership of Fife Council Kinship Care Support Team, Kirkcaldy Raith Rotary Club, Showman's Guild members in Burntisland and Exxon Mobil.

Over 400 people enjoyed glorious summer weather in and around the marquee on the Links, sponsored by Exxon Mobil. They were looked after by Rotarians and Exxon Mobil volunteers and entertainment was provided by clowns, balloon artists, face painters and 'Bonnie Beasties', the reptile owners display team. Delicious lunches were supplemented by endless supplies of tea and coffee.

The highlight of the event for many was the access at a reduced rate to the rides at the fair, due to the generosity of the Showmen.

"It's great to have the support of the Showmen – I don't think we could do all of this without them!" said Louise Lamont, Senior Social Worker.

Across Scotland there are many thousands of children and young people being cared for by family members or people with whom they have had a pre-existing relationship; grandparents, aunts, uncles, brothers, sisters and friends.

This happens when parents are unable to care for the children themselves for a variety of reasons. These relatives and friends are known as 'Kinship Carers'.

Kinship Care may be formal arrangements, where the children are 'looked after' by the local authority, may be personal arrangements by way of a residency order or may be very informal. Every situation is unique. but all Kinship Carers face challenges by being different and feeling that they are the 'only ones'.



First Aid update by Alex. Macdonald.

Eleven hardy members are nearing the end of a challenging new course which will give them one of the most robust qualifications available to first aid volunteers. We have always set a very

high standard and it's something we will continue to do well into the future.

However, we know that everyone has to start at a simpler level. So our next public evening class – which starts in September – will lead to the equivalent of a 3-day certificate in First Aid at Work. It's widely recognised for employment purposes throughout the UK.

But all of those skills are useless unless they are put into practice. So since the last issue of the Burgh Buzz we have attended over 30 events in Errol, Bridge of Allan, Dunblane and Ingliston, as well as locations throughout Fife. We've dealt with physical injuries and medical conditions – including one person who stopped breathing until we intervened. Thankfully, however, most of our patients were less dramatic and their injuries could be resolved relatively easily.

More problematic – and mind-blowingly stupid – was the theft of our defibrillator from outside the Co-op. It's there for one purpose only and that is to re-start a heart which has stopped. It's completely useless to anyone whose heart is beating, but if it is to be used at all it must be within a very few minutes of a cardiac arrest. As a temporary measure the Scottish Ambulance Service has very kindly loaned a replacement defibrillator so there is still an immediate source of help in time of need.

The defibrillator was bought from a huge number of public donations so its loss has been felt throughout our community. Anyone with information should please share it with me or with the police, quoting incident number 2276.

On a happier note, we continue to be in great demand and already have bookings in our diary for June of next year. To some extent that makes up for the countless short-notice requests which we've had to turn down this year. It's a nice problem to have, but one which we can resolve only with more volunteers and more resources.

fter celebrating our 40th birthday last year the Toll Centre has reached another milestone this year by becoming a Scottish Charitable Incorporated Organisation, and the formal name for 'The Toll' is now the Toll Community Centre. The main priority for the Toll Community Centre this year is replacing the 41 year old, oil fired boiler and upgrading the radiators in the building so that heating can be better controlled. We will be seeking grant funding to help meet the sizeable cost of a new system, but first we need to raise around £6,000 ourselves. So far this year we've held a successful indoor car boot and craft sale, and a fabulous fitness fundraiser. Later in the

summer (Sunday 13th August) there will be a Family BBQ and the brilliant No1Sun are back in November – look out for tickets from the Toll Community Centre office. In addition we are lucky enough to have the support of the Co-op Community Fund – please make sure that you apply for and use a membership card every time you shop in the Co-op so that local charities can benefit.

We appreciate that some people want to support the Toll Community Centre but can't make it along to our fundraising events, so we have set up a MyDonate page to make it as easy as possible for people to contribute to the Boiler Fund and support us with this project, which will be essential for maintaining the Toll Community Centre for many years to come. Live on the Links 2017


fter the successful return of Live on the Links last year. we're back to do it once again on Saturday 12th August from 12–8 pm on the Links bandstand.



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

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Letters: Set out below is and abridged version of a letter to the CEO Edinburgh Airport by a Burntisland resident which was also given wide distribution to councillors and local and national press. This is a topic of considerable local interest and a response is eagerly awaited.

Dear Mr Dewar,

I urge you to please tell us the current situation regarding Edinburgh Airport flight path trials.

When we moved to Burntisland in Jan 2014 this town suffered little to no noise from passing aircraft. It was lovely, calm, peaceful... the sounds of birds and the sea.

Occasional aircraft noise started which I assumed were oneoff re-routings due to weather/air-traffic/etc but it soon became a frequent occurrence. I became aware through other residents that new flight paths were being trialled and it appeared that residents of Fife coastal towns had been kept in the dark by the airport authorities.

Since then there have been two public consultations. I have responded to both and still patiently await the outcome.

The 1st consultation indicated that a large number of people were concerned about aircraft noise. Your campaigns claim to seek and listen to public opinion yet if anything, noise from planes has increased here over the months.

Daytime aircraft noise became more frequent and as I wrote my response to the 1st consultation we experienced a passing plane approx. every 3-10 minutes - I noted each time. I work from home and this is extremely distracting and disturbing to my work and peace of mind.

Annoyance during the day was bad enough but more recently I have been wakened by planes at night, regularly hearing noise for a period of time from around midnight then again

from around 4am. Totally unacceptable. Additionally, there seems to be no pattern to those noisy overhead flights. We do not understand what is going on.

We have no information of what is happening or what is planned. Your lack of communication encourages us to think that views expressed during the consultations have been totally ignored and cast aside as insignificant.

The 2nd consultation was not as easy to respond to as you claimed. It was a complicated online exercise giving no obvious alternative for those less computer literate. A consultation of this magnitude should involve the circulation of relevant information by post to every affected household. Your consultation procedures were confusing and at times evasive.

Your plans to alter flight paths from Edinburgh Airport appear predetermined to benefit airport operations with total disregard for the adverse impact on residential areas of Fife. It is widely known that frequent and often intense noise can affect quality of life and mental health.

I urge you to enlighten our communities as to the decisions that are being made regarding long-term flight path operations from Edinburgh Airport.

I look forward to your response.

The day has arrived! The moment we have all been waiting for is here! The bridge will be open on the 30th August!! Economy Secretary Keith Brown revealed the date the Queensferry Crossing will open to traffic is on the August 30, 2017. This is a day we all in Fife have been looking forward to. In celebration, a 'Once in a Lifetime' opportunity is being given by

ballot to 50,000 people to walk over the new bridge on 2nd and 3rd of September. Within hours of the ballot opening, 50,000 people had applied from more than 25 countries. Congratulations to those who have been chosen.

Being a Civil/Structural Engineer prior to becoming a minister and living in Fife, I have enjoyed watching the bridge go up and have found some facts about it as listed below:

- Cost of the Bridge was £1.35bn.
- It is 1.7 miles long with its longest span being 650 metres (2,133 ft).
- It is a cable-stayed bridge and is the longest triple tower cablestayed bridge in the world.
- It has 23,000 miles of cabling that suspends the bridge from three towers - almost enough to wrap around the circumference of the earth.
- It is 207 metres above high tide; that's 50 metres higher than the Forth Road Bridge.
- Construction began in September 2011 and it took 6 years to complete.
- It is considered to be part of the motor way so motor way rules apply.
- It has a state-of-the-art Intelligent Transport System (ITS) which runs along the length of the Queensferry Crossing and connecting roads which is designed to increase the efficiency of the road, reduces congestion and improves road safety. So watch your Speed!

Throughout September in honour of the opening of the Queensferry Crossing the All Souls Churches (including St Serf's in Burntisland 9:00am) will be doing a series on Sunday Mornings entitled 'The Crossing.'

The Ecology Centre's Tool Shed – great sewing machine hunt!

The Ecology Centre in Kinghorn operates a Tool Shed, which is part of the fast growing Men's Sheds movement.

The Tool Shed runs three tool refurbishing workshops every week. These workshops are facilitated by a workshop supervisor and a fantastic group of volunteers. The Tool Shed primarily refurbish tools, but they also refurbish sewing machines. There's a shortage of Singer sewing machines just now, and the Tool Shed are on the hunt for any unused, unwanted or broken ones that could be refurbished and recycled.

The Tool Shed works with Global Concerns Trust, a Scottish based charity that aims to reduce poverty and empower vulnerable people through partnering organisations that implement sustainable grassroots development projects.

The refurbished sewing machines are shipped to Malawi and are used by Global Concern's partners MACOHA and KODO, to provide vocational tailoring training.
