Historic Kirkton Churchyard Reopens



n a bright Palm Sunday afternoon and under clear, blue skies, a congregation of over 70 witnessed the official reopening of the old church and churchyard at the Kirkton. The ceremony took the form of a simple service conducted by the leaders of all four local churches before they led the faithful on their traditional Palm Sunday walk, visiting all the churches in the town.

This event was the culmination of a four year, joint project led by Burntisland Heritage Trust and involving Fife Council and Councillors, the local Community Council and local organisations. Under the guidance of Historic Environment Scotland, the project group has saved the ruins of the 13th century church from complete collapse.

The conservation project had involved considerable research of the entire site before removal of invasive vegetation from the church ruin and careful restoration using traditional materials and techniques. Gravestones have also been researched, repaired and rendered safe. The entire area has been completely transformed into an attractive amenity with new paths, interpretation panels and benches

kindly donated by local firm Archway Metal. It offers a comfortable and relaxing environment for visitors to explore this national monument of considerable historical interest.

The Heritage Trust has produced a very informative leaflet which graphically explains the site's history, identifies gravestones of particular interest and touches on the extent of the restoration programme. This leaflet will be distributed to all of the primary school families in the next term, is readily available in the Public Library, in the Cooperative Stores located in the High Street and in Church Street opposite the site.

Any prospective visitor is advised to consult beforehand, the Heritage Trust website http://www.kirktonoldchurch.org.uk which covers in great detail all aspects of this historic site.

The project team must be commended for completing this difficult, and at times, contentious project, which has not only preserved a most valuable historic monument, but has also transformed a dilapidated eyesore into yet another attractive amenity for our town.

From the Editor

I commence this editorial with an apology to the Romano family for failing to include an appropriate obituary for Sergio Romano in the Winter issue of the Buzz.

Although the Buzz does not have a regular obituary column, a tribute to Sergio was discussed at a meeting of the Editorial Committee on 14th November 2017. As the February issue of the Buzz would not be published for some three months, I considered that unless we received a request from the family, we would not include an obituary in that edition. Given the subsequent level of support from within the community to raise funds for a memorial bench, this was clearly an error of judgement on my part, for which I apologise.

In mitigation, I must point out that the Buzz editorial team is not made up of professional journalists chasing stories within the community. We are a small group of volunteers who every three months, spend many hours collating articles from regular and occasional contributors. We arrange distribution of the printed version throughout the town. Additionally, we seek advertisements, the revenue from which pays for the printing of the hard copy and expenses associated with the website. Any modest surplus is ploughed back into the community. We have resolved to continue to do so.

The principal aims of the Buzz are to promote community spirit, stimulate interest and debate on local issues, and to provide a free means of communication for local people and community organisations. I consider that my team in the main, achieves these objectives. We are always willing to publish letters of criticism provided the content is not offensive.

Speaking of which, my team did not deserve the negative and abusive rants that, in the weeks following the publication of our last issue, were posted on the Burntisland Facebook Group Page. Collectively as a committee, we can take these abuses on the chin. However, this episode has served to demonstrate how disrespectful and hurtful social media can be. The next occasion, and there will be one, may be directed against an individual who may not be so resilient.

Perhaps it is time for Admin of the Burntisland Facebook Group Page to review its standards.

On a more pleasant note, the Burntisland community is to be commended for the manner in which it collectively responded to the problems resulting from "The Beast from the East".

Neighbours looked after each other, particularly the elderly and vulnerable, and those with appropriate equipment and vehicles selflessly offered to help others. Walking routes to the school were cleared, though Fife decided to shut all schools. Although the town was virtually cut off for a few days - no buses or trains and few food deliveries - no major mishaps or tragedies occurred, due in part to our ability and willingness to help each other. Well done Burntisland.

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Community Council Bullets......

The Community Council holds its regular meetings on the second Friday of each month at 7.00 pm in Burntisland Burgh Chambers. Members of the public are welcome to attend or to raise matters of interest to them. A summary of issues raised during the last two meetings is set out below.

- We're delighted to welcome Phillip Atkinson as a new member of the Community Council.
- Healthy progress is being made in raising funds towards Christmas lights. A bingo night, coffee morning, raffles, counter collections and individual donations are all helping to bring the purchase of new lights a step closer.
- We're concerned at the lack of consistency from Police Scotland in their dealings with different Community Councils. We also regret the absence of meaningful information on crime prevention and detection. As advised by the Justice Secretary, we will be raising those concerns with senior officers.
- Local people responded superbly to the recent heavy snowfall by using social media to carry out good-Samaritan responses. Grateful thanks are extended to all who took part. In contrast, Fife Council officials did not trigger the local resilience plan which is in place for exactly that purpose. As a result, the well-being of vulnerable local people had been compromised. Basically, social media worked and the official channels didn't. Talks are in hand to prevent a recurrence.
- Flooding on Cowdenbeath Road and at Starleyburn is being investigated by Fife Council, the Community Council and other agencies in order that the best remedial action can be taken for the long term.
- We are awaiting sight of a proposal to develop part of the Roundhouse car park. It would mean losing even more seasonal parking spaces if it goes ahead and might also be an inappropriate development next to the Links Conservation Area.
- The project to conserve the Kirkton churchyard and re-open it to public access has now been concluded, with hugely positive responses allround.
- The prolonged closure of the Kinghorn Loch Road has caused major difficulty but little surprise. We have made it clear that the process has been badly managed from the outset and must not be repeated in any future development in or near to the town.
- Thanks to Hurd Rolland architects, we now have outline proposals to improve the environment at the Lammerlaws and to make it more accessible as a viewpoint. We will be inviting comments from residents in the vicinity before taking the proposal further.
- A partnership has been selected to carry out a feasibility study on the development, conservation and potential use of the Burgh Chambers complex. The work comprises a mixture of enterprise and architectural skills and will be carried out over the next few months.

ver the last few months we are pleased to report that there has been a reduction of reported crime in the Burntisland area. This equates to a 52% reduction in March 2018, compared with the same time last year. We shall not become complacent with this however and will continue with our daily patrols and dedicated ASBO patrols at weekends.



Speeding motorists are still a concern for the Burntisland area and we will endeavour to be out with the speed gun as often as we can, in areas that have been identified as problematic. From the spring onwards we will be assisted in this work by the Community Speed Watch Team and we are always looking for new volunteers if this is something that any of our local residents are interested in.

In the coming month we are hoping to have the first of our drop in clinics which are replacing the Community Engagement Meetings. These clinics will be held for an hour initially however if there is a requirement, we will expand the hours. Once we have confirmed the location we will post this information along with the times and date on our Twitter page and also put up notices around the town.

In March 2018, PC Black (school liaison) and Amber Watch from Kirkcaldy SFRS visited Burntisland Primary school and carried out a fire safety input with the Primary 7 classes. This was well received by the pupils who asked some pertinent questions.

Community Fund

hanks to generous seed funding from Tom Courts Burntisland Butchers, the Community Council can offer small grants to local groups whose activities help to benefit Burntisland. We've topped up the fund with a modest contribution from our own reserves, so here is what's possible.

- Grants of £25 to £150 are available, though most will be at the lower end of that range.
- Groups must be located in Burntisland.
- Applications must be made in writing either hard copy or e-mail to the Secretary of the Community Council.
- Applications can be for any purpose except for projects which have already been completed.
- Applications should show how the grant would make a difference.
- Grants will be normally decided at Spring and Autumn meetings of the Community Council.
- Grants will not normally be made for personal items.
- There will be a maximum of one grant per group per year.

We do want to make a difference, but clearly we're targeting small projects for groups which have limited reserves. Grants have already been made to the Over 70's Christmas Treat, Burntisland Heritage Trust, Town Twinning, Floral Action Burntisland, the Wednesday Club and Broomhill Community Garden Kids Club. So if your group has a small project in mind, we'd like to hear from you.

The next round of grants will be made in the autumn, so applications should please be with our Secretary by August.



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Scott Receives Community Award

n the evening of 20th February a civic reception was held in our historic Burgh Chambers in honour of the 2018 Civic Award winner Scott Sweaton. As the 37th recipient of the award, Scott was presented with the Citizen's Shield and a unique, personalised certificate crafted by local artist and calligrapher, Duncan Gillfillan. In his address to the large gathering of dignitaries and guests, Alex MacDonald, Chairman of the Community Council, expanded on the valuable contributions that Scott had made to improving the quality of life of the Burntisland community over a number of years. Scott's principal achievement has been the establishment of Floral Action Burntisland (FAB), through which he has galvanised many individuals and organisations into helping to make the environment more attractive. Although floral enhancement is FAB's principal aim, Scott has proved to be the inspiration and catalyst for schools, youth organisations, local traders and community organisations to take pride in and maintain the town's

natural amenities. Scott, a nurse by profession, was also the driving force behind the fund raising for the establishment of a defibrillator outside the local Primary School.

In his acceptance speech, Scott explained that he had been involved in charity work since his early teens in Kirkcaldy and considered that his early experience with the Red Cross guided him towards a career in nursing. However, following graduation and having secured a permanent nursing post, this did not prevent him from continuing with his charitable work. He joined the Samaritans and rapidly became heavily involved in fund-raising and publicity. Eventually, pressure of work in a new nursing position forced him to give up voluntary work for a period. However, it was never far from his mind, as he settled down to raise his family in Burntisland some 11 years ago. Lo and Behold! - he was presented with an opportunity that he could not refuse when he attended a preparatory meeting of a floral enhancement group and was offered the chairmanship - this new appointment was easier to accept than to explain his acceptance of this new responsibility to his "very understanding" wife Leanne!

Scott humbly thanked those who had nominated him for the award but most of all his family and the very many members of FAB and the community at large, without whom he would have achieved nothing. Following the speeches, all attendees enjoyed a sumptuous finger buffet and light refreshments in an extremely happy and convivial atmosphere.

- Investigating the ownership and re-use for the good of the whole town, of the site on which the old Picture House once stood.



Proposals to Open Up the Lammerlaws

ver the years the Lammerlaws has become seriously neglected and overgrown. This once popular walk has been denied to all but the most fit and able.

The Community Council has proposed to open up the area whilst retaining its natural beauty. Our plans include reclaiming the vacant land opposite the Beacon Leisure Centre, currently used as a waste tip, to create a new car parking area and providing a 'gateway' to the Lammerlaws with interpretation boards, seating area and picnic tables. As can be seen from the attached plan, three pathways are envisaged replacing worn trails already present.

Pathway 1 (Yellow) Leading from the entrance at Victoria Cottage would terminate at the point (Clayness). This pathway would be suitable for wheelchairs and mobility scooters and lead to a viewing and seating area.

Pathway 2 (Red) This would allow access to the summit and would be a stepped pathway (not suitable for wheelchairs

or scooters), leading to a viewing platform and perhaps some visible landmark. This pathway would also lead down to pathway three at the breakwater via steps.

Pathway 3 (Blue) This would take the right-hand path at Victoria Cottage and lead gradually down to the breakwater. This is a badly neglected piece of land currently within the dock area.

These pathways will be interconnected and although not offering total access for those less able, will open up the area to many more people than at present.

These are tentative proposals and we are looking for comments and support before starting the difficult task of seeking funding. Our Rights Respecting Schools Steering Group are still busy working towards achieving our Level 1 Rights Respecting Schools Award. The group recently led a whole school campaign to collect donations for Kirkcaldy Foodbank. We were totally overwhelmed by the support for this project and really appreciated all donations.

Also this term, our great achievements in sport have continued with our senior Athletics Team having huge success in both the Fife and Regional finals. Primary 1

In Primary 1, the topic has been Fairyland and in Maths pupils have been learning to tell the time and have been subtracting from 20

In Literacy, they have been learning all about stories and using simple connectives.

In Primary 1/2, the class topic has been Superheroes and children have created superhero booklets with their peers.

Primary 2

Space has been the topic in Primary 2 and pupils have had a

visit from the NASA Space Academy. They have also used *My Hamster is an Astronaut* by Dave Lowe for imaginative writing in Literacy.

Primary 3

Ancient Egyptians has been the focus in P 3 this term. In Maths they have worked on Data Analysis and have been very creative in their lessons. For Literacy, they have just started to read their new class novel, *The Boy in the Dress*.

Primary 4

Primary 4 have been studying the Victorians and in Literacy, their work has focussed on using openers and interesting WOW words to make their writing more exciting. In Maths they have continued their work on multiplication and division.

Primary 5

In Primary 5 the topic has been the Titanic and pupils have built some truly fantastic 3D models, including some delicious cakes. What a talented and creative bunch. In Maths pupils have been working on fractions and how to find equivalent fractions. Their Literacy work has focused on reading *Kaspar*, *Prince of Cats* by Michael Morpurgo.

Primary 6

In Primary 6, the class topic has been the Caribbean in which pupils have researched the Caribbean reef. There is some stunning artwork to be seen across the P6 corridor – sometimes we feel we have been transported directly to the Caribbean. Some pupils have also entered competitions this term, including the 100 word Toy Story competition.

Primary 7

In Primary 7, pupils have been studying Conflict as their topic. Their focus has been on using more complex connectives and openers in their writing, which is making their written work really engaging and exciting. They have also enjoyed their Health and Wellbeing work at the Beacon which includes Step, Pilates and joining in at the gym.

We're all very excited for the Summer Term, hoping it brings lots of sunshine and more fantastic learning.




They were really lovely and spent a great deal of time talking to our children and showing a real interest in where we had come from, how long it had taken us, what we'd thought of the service.

urntisland Heritage have been fortunate to have received a donation of 7 Andrew Young paintings to add to our existing collection of 4 paintings. Andrew Young (1854-1925) lived and worked in Burntisland and was a professional artist, photographer and local historian. The paintings were donated by Elizabeth Rodger who lives in



BURNTISLAND 1883 MODEL RAILWAY



North British Railway locomotive No. 224 and carriages approaches Burntisland Station in 1883

he Burntisland 1883 model railway is paying a return visit to Burntisland this Autumn. The railway shows many aspects of the railway in Burntisland as they were in 1883 before the Forth Bridge opened in 1890. The terminus station in Forth Place is featured along with the 'round house' engine shed with its huge conical roof opposite the Links. There are working models of a West Dock coal hoist and of the train ferry terminal link span ramp which was a world first in its day. The railway has probably one of the finest collections of Victorian period carriages and wagons as well as locomotives. One star is North British Railway No. 224 which was the engine that went down with the first Tay Bridge and was afterwards recovered from the Tay and put to work again. The award winning model extends over 13 metres and shows very clearly what a busy and important place Burntisland was in the 1880's.

Burntisland 1883 is presented by the East of Scotland 4mm Group and Burntisland Heritage and is open to the public at the Parish Church Main Hall on Saturday 6th and Sunday 7th October from 11.00am to 4.00pm on both days.

TOM COURTS - BURNTISLAND'S BUTCHER

lder residents may recall, that in 1973 Tom Courts Snr. opened his original butchers shop in the town. He moved his family to Burntisland in 1977 and his children (Lorna and Tom) grew up here. The young Tom Courts served as a policeman, during which time he was project manager for implementing the CCTV network that covers all the major town centres in Fife. He left the police force in 2003 due to his father suffering a bout of ill health. Young Tom then joined the family business, at that time centred in Cowdenbeath. A second outlet was added in Lochgelly in 2013. From the very beginning, Tom concentrated on quality rather than price and still uses the same suppliers as used by

Harrods and The Savoy Grill. In June 2015, Tom Courts Jnr. sold the two businesses, family illness having driven his decision.

It was no great surprise when Tom purchased a butcher's business in his home town. After a complete renovation in November 2016, there followed an astounding rise in turnover, which Tom puts down to having a great team at his side. Matthew is the Shop Manager, John Day, a runner up Young Butcher of the Year in 2011, Lorna Blake, Tom's sister runs the bakery side of the business which secured 'Best Sausage Roll in Scotland' in 2017 followed by a runner up second place in 'World Scotch Pie Championships' in 2018. Nephew Calum has taken time out from University to complete an apprenticeship in Craft Butchery. More recently, Tom's daughter Ellen has started on a part-time basis. The next major Rotary Event will be the annual Coffee Morning & Craft Fair on Saturday 5th May in Kinghorn Parish Church Hall.





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





through the Firth of Forth, stopping at many of the islands, to tell of their history and environment. The aerial views of the Bass Rock and Inchkeith allowed a unique insight into their shape and form. There were also many beautiful pictures of

the wildlife on each island, of gannets, guillemots and puffins; a reminder of what a special area we live in and how lucky we are to be able to enjoy it. The room was packed by nearly 60 people who all agreed it was a superb and well researched presentation.

Spring is a lovely time of the year at Kinghorn Loch, with coltsfoot, daffodils and the flowering gorse, all making a sunshine flurry. Frogs and toads are stirring to make their annual pilgrimage to the water (but somewhat delayed

this year), summer birds like swallows are returning, and ducks pairing off to search for nesting sites. The nesting platforms that the Trust volunteers have constructed over the winter are in place, ready for the water fowl to take up residence. Our female swan has a new partner and she is returning to her usual barley straw raft to make her nest. This year, Gerald Lincoln is doing a number of moth surveys at

Kinghorn Loch and has invited the Trust to help him. The first

survey was in April and more will follow during the summer months. It will be a lovely opportunity to discover and photograph the many different moths that frequent this area.

The Trust held its fifth Walking Festival in April and continues its popularity. It was good to see both old and new faces signing up for walks. We cannot guarantee the weather to be sunny, but participants always enjoy the great company and

scenic views on walks. The family walk along Rodanbraes path was particularly well attended with 16 children and 21 adults accompanying them. The walk stopped at the troll bridge for stories and games, then on to the atmospheric Rodanbraes cottage for witch stories. A good time was had by all. Other walks went up Stoneyhall Hill, a visit to Glassmount House Gardens and a coastal walks from West Wemyss. It was a pleasant way to improve fitness levels after the long hard winter.

The Snow

Extreme winter weather as experienced this year brings conflicting emotions. Even just a few days of it will kill wildlife yet it's exciting because the urgency to feed makes animals tamer and means we might see species which normally stay away from gardens. In deep cold birds have to feed through all hours of light to gain enough fat to survive the night.

The first morning of snowfall I laid shallow containers of water round the garden, filled feeders, scraped snow from patches of grass and soil and sprinkled seeds, oats and raisins there and in safe spots under shrubs. Before I got back inside a song thrush was already on cleared lawn and a blackbird was drinking from a basin. Food *and water* in your garden really will save lives.

Over the next few days we hosted house sparrow, dunnock, bullfinch, chaffinch, wren, robin, starling, jackdaw, blue tit, great tit, coal tit, wood pigeon, feral pigeon, blackbird, song thrush, redwing, fieldfare. The last three - all thrushes, as are blackbirds - we've never had in this garden. Fieldfares and redwings quickly chomped every berry on our holly then spent the next three days working through the berries on our neighbours' hedging. The closest I've ever seen

fieldfares, I was able to sketch without binoculars. Thank you neighbours! Down on the Links starlings, oystercatchers, redshanks, assorted thrushes and a lone curlew probed for food in patches where snow had blown away. I watched a lapwing buffeted in over the railway wall in a commotion of paddle-shaped wings, the first I've seen in Burntisland.

May Nesting

Come May when Burgh Buzz drops through doors (let the editor know if you could deliver to your street) we'll be firmly into nesting season. Garden hedges, shrubs and trees have tits, finches, robins and sparrows nesting in them - don't trim or prune until the end of August unless you know for certain there's nothing there. Under eaves and gutters are starlings, swifts and more house sparrows and in porches and outbuildings are swallows and martins if you have any of these you're lucky, populations are declining rapidly so don't block them out. We love waking to the starling chicks inside our bedroom wall excitedly squealing each time their parents bring back yummy gooey grubs.

Down disused chimney pots jackdaws nest - if you're having work done secure wire mesh a few feet down inside to prevent sticks and chicks becoming trapped behind blocked-up fireplaces. Out of town, in the fields above the Binn skylarks, meadow pipits and a few lapwings breed, all ground-nesters so don't let dogs run loose until nesting is over.

Finally, ever controversial, on chimney stacks and flat roofs are herring and lesser black-backed gulls, two of six native British gulls. Their populations are dropping and rooftops can provide a relatively safe refuge as we build on and disturb more and more of their natural nesting ground. Both species might remain with one mate for most of their thirty years, returning to the exact same nest site each spring having spent winter apart and as far away as the Mediterranean or Morocco. If a chick falls from the roof before it's old enough to fly its best chance is to be put back up away from cars. Only do this if you know it's the right roof and you're confident you can do it with no risk to self.

I monitor local gull nests as well as any bird nests in our garden and any others I happen on whilst out and about. Volunteer nest-monitoring is extremely valuable and can be done legally by anyone following strict guidelines detailed by the British Trust for Ornithology (BTO). Marcelin's Story

Marcelin still hasn't recovered from Hurricane Matthew, which hit Haiti in September 2016,

destroying his home, possessions and livestock.

I lost pigs, goats, everything in the house. I have nothing left,' he says. He now lives in an old concrete shower block, a tiny space he shares with his teenage daughters. There are no windows or doors, and the only furniture is a single bed that the girls sleep on.

Marcelin has fought hard to raise his children alone but can no longer afford to send them all to school. He gets up at dawn each day to work the land, but the changing weather frequently destroys the food he grows and the family often go hungry. Marcelin fears his daughters' hunger could lead them to be exploited by predatory men in exchange for food.

How we are helping

Our local partner in Haiti is helping people prepare for

disasters. Ahead of Hurricane Matthew, we helped evacuate around 5,000 families, potentially saving many lives. We then gave out much-needed shelter kits, hygiene kits, food seeds and cash transfers.

We're building disaster-resistant homes to give people safe, secure places to live. There are still lots of people like Marcelin we haven't yet reached, and we need your help.
