Despite the forecast rain it was fine sunny weather for the 371st staging of Burntisland Highland Games, on the third Monday in July.

The traditional "Exiles Reception" in the morning was hosted by Burntisland Community Council in the Burgh Chambers. Local dignitaries, invited guests and Civic Week's Royal Party led by the Summer King, were all welcomed by Fife Provost Jim Leishman.

Also in attendance to enjoy the hospitality were former Burntisland residents from Australia, England, and Sweden, as well as elsewhere in Fife.

Following the reception, Burntisland & District Pipe Band led the parade along the High Street to the games arena, where the event was officially opened at 12 noon by Honorary Chieftain George McLaughlin.

The traditional games day activities took place throughout the day with highland dancing, running, cycling, and heavy events for both men and women, on show for spectators.



The Binn Race saw its largest entry for a number of years as 21 local runners took on the challenge, the event was won by Scott Orrock in a time of 25:33 ahead of Robbie McAughey and John Cotton.

Thanks to all the volunteers and the organising committee for ensuring the second oldest Highland Games in the world successfully continues each year.











Burntisland's Banking Hub

Like countless communities across Scotland, Burntisland has witnessed the disappearance of its High Street banks in recent years, with the last, TSB, finally closing its doors some four years ago. To mitigate the loss of vital services in the town, Cash Access UK opened a banking hub in February, offering regular cash and everyday banking services to the community.

The hub is currently located in the Burntisland First Aid Services Trust premises at 60 High Street, otherwise known as the old police station. The plan is to secure a permanent home in the ground

floor of the Burgh Chambers building next to the library.

The Common Good Fund has provided £45,000 for essential maintenance and upgrades of the Burgh Chambers building. The hub's current nine-month lease expires in October, but there is little sign the former local office will be ready in time to receive its new tenant. Without further developments, the hub will likely have to extend its lease at its temporary premises, but for how long remains uncertain.

Cash Access UK is a non-profit company established by the high

street banks to bring shared banking services to communities. The counter is operated by the Post Office Monday to Friday 9am to 5pm, with personal and business banking, and bill payment services.

Community bankers are available on specific days to manage your accounts, payments and transfers. TSB has a representative on hand on Tuesday, RBS on Wednesday and Bank of Scotland on Thursday. Currently there are no community bankers available on Mondays and Fridays, but this may change once the hub moves to its new premises.

The hub is not a Post Office however, so you won't be able to send parcels or buy stamps.

Community Council Bullets......

Your Community Council holds its regular meetings on the third Tuesday of each month, at 7pm in the Burgh Chambers on the High Street.

Dates for the next meetings are: Tuesday 19th August, 16th September, and 21st October.

Members of the public are welcome to attend or to raise matters of interest. If possible, please email items you'd like discussed to the Secretary a week before the meeting so they can be more easily accommodated in the agenda.

As there is no step-free access to the venue, meetings are also available to join using Zoom videoconferencing—please contact the Secretary if you wish to join online via Zoom.

A summary of issues discussed during recent meetings is set out below. Full minutes are available on the Community Council website.

- We welcomed Isla MacDonald as our new Chair earlier this year. New Community Councillors are Matthew Bradshaw and Lynne Worthington. Gemma Craigie-Sharland stepped down, but we hope she can rejoin us in the future.
- Following community pressure, Fife Council agreed to refurbish the Links Splash Pad. Funding streams have been identified by the Council, with community support from a Crowdfunder and a CC application for a grant from Fife Environmental Trust.
- The Banking Hub opened in the spring in temporary premises at 60 High Street. Counter services for cards and cash are available daily, 9am-5pm Monday to Friday. Private personal banking services are available on specific days for different banks. Fife Council agreed to renovate the old office at the Burgh Chambers complex in the High Street so that it can be leased to the banking hub more permanently.
- Road safety: Traffic calming measures are intended for Kinghorn Road at the railway pedestrian underpass near the cemetery. Fife Council proposes to extend the town 20mph speed limits to all the main access roads.
 Penalties for pavement parking are expected to be rolled out in September.
- Burntisland Community Action Plan 2023–28 was reviewed in June. A summary of results will be posted on the CC website in August. Thank you to all who gave feedback and to Burntisland Community Development Trust (BCDT) for hosting the online questionnaire and assisting with pop-up community engagement events.
- Railway station: After meetings with CC reps, Melanie Ward MP has been
 pressing the case at UK Government level for step free access. We await
 news from the Department of Transport on any Network Rail feasibility
 study. A re-designed station car parking survey is proposed for the autumn.
- Forth Ports met with community representatives to discuss reopening
 public access to the Shanks pier/western peninsula at the harbour.
 Burntisland Heritage and BCDT agreed to take forward projects at that site.
 Meantime, Burntisland Harbour Access Trust (BHAT) continue to press Fife
 Council on the legalities of the restricted public access to the fenced off
 east harbour and breakwater.
- Fife Council delayed planned repainting of the beach promenade seawall but agreed to complete work after the school summer holidays.
- Discussions with Fife Council on management of public greenspaces were helpful, and our partners at BCDT's Biodiversity Group and Floral Action Burntisland (FAB) will take forward ideas with further community consultations.
- Representatives of the CC and the Showmen's Guild met in June to discuss the summer Fair/Shows arrangements. Fife Council leases part of the Links to the Guild and licences the event. The Council does not include the CC in this planning.
- The revised Community Emergency Plan is available on the CC website.
- Flooding: The CC used a Freedom of Information (FOI) request to obtain information from Scottish Water on its response to recurrent surface water flooding in the Haugh Road / Dick Crescent park areas. We continue to press Scottish Water on flood prevention.

The Chambers also houses a large collection of paintings by Andrew Young which includes his 1923 masterpiece 'The Bridge of Life'. The painting is full of symbolism and incorporates portraits of 85 local Burntisland residents, each identified.

Below the Burgh Chambers in the Kirkgate the notice outside the Heritage Centre reads "300 Million Year Old Shark ... On View Inside ... Free Exhibition". This certainly caught the attention of our visitors and added to the numbers at our annual exhibition this summer! This showcases a collection of local fossils

gathered by Burntisland's own Sam McAuliffe. Growing up in Burntisland Sam was always fascinated by the local wildlife and geology. After finding beautiful fossil plants and fish this curiosity about what kind of world they had lived in started a lifelong interest in palaeontology.

The 'Our Natural Heritage' theme this year also displays an extensive collection of local photography, capturing the landscape from the summit of the Binn, through the built environment, and down to the shoreline. The exhibition is highly illustrated with spectacular images of the plants, birds, and animals that live right on our doorstep. It extends over the extensive foreshore and highlights the rich marine life beneath the waves.



Kuro Iwa Ryu Bujutsu, Burntisland Club

The Kuro Iwa Ryu bujutsu club held a dan grading in April. This was attended by members as far away as Ayrshire, Dundee, Edinburgh, Manchester and St. Andrews as well as the core membership who train in the Burntisland club.

All participants performed really well and members achieved various levels from Shodan (black belt first Dan) up to Godan (black belt 5th. Dan).

The group have trained in the Music Hall for over 20 years and consider the hall to be their home whilst reaching out to our KIR clubs in Minnesota, USA, and Manchester. A previous instructor who ran our Cambridge club has now located in Japan for the next year and is delivering the KIR syllabus there. Head coach Archie Higgins, Hachidan (8th. Dan) Kancho also regularly visits Ibiza, Spain and Florence, Italy to deliver seminars for sister groups.

The system has four strands of training, namely: koryu which is traditional Japanese battlefield techniques; modern jujitsu which actually dates from circa.1603 up to the early 20th century and the formation of the various modern Japanese martial arts; 21st. century street self defence; and traditional Japanese weaponry.



The KIR system can be learned by anyone irrespective of age, sex, or fitness levels as it utilizes bio mechanics and the strength of the attack to defeat the opponent. There are no rules, nor competitions, only training to improve mind, body and spirit.

Anyone who is interested can just drop in to the club training nights on Mondays starting at 7pm. In the Music Hall. You will be made most welcome. Please note we do not currently have a junior division. If there was sufficient interest it will certainly be considered.

Burntisland Sailing Club is going from strength to strength this year, with members racing on two evenings a week. The recently constructed second phase of pontoon berths is popular and has proved to be very robust. In addition, to allow for the larger yachts and stronger winds that are becoming normal, the moorings in the outer harbour are being revised and strengthened, with more space between boats.

A new membership category has been introduced, allowing those who wish to 'give it a go' to join as provisional members at a very modest fee of £70 pa. for 2 years. This allows them to access the club's Discover Sailing Programme and get out

on the water in a variety of yachts. A Crew Finder Whatsapp group has been implemented to match these new crews to skippers needing them and is proving very popular. Well attended stand alone mentoring sessions are also being held to help members gain insight into specific nautical topics such as radar and rights and responsibilities when afloat.

During Civic Week in June the Summer Queen and King Queen plus their entire Royal Party entourage visited the club to start the Civic Cup race and have a trip round the harbour. They proved to be interested, inquisitive, knowledgeable (and noisy!). Great fun was had by all. Many future members we hope!

The club's annual regatta and Commodore's sail past (pictured) was held on Saturday 19th July and well attended with music, a buffet and a lively buzz in the clubhouse countering the "Scottish Sunshine" out on the water.

Summer is here! Staff and children are having a well-deserved break after a super busy final term at BPS. I am writing this from the garden, enjoying some of the sunshine we have been blessed with in these last few weeks. Reflecting on the year gone by, I must pause and thank all the staff and children who make our school such a happy place to be.

We have a great deal of support from our Parent Council, who are still busy even after the end of term bell has rung and doors have been closed (although the 52 week nursery and our early entrants' provision are still going strong all summer!). They are supporting Café Inc with pre-loved uniform organisation and are in tidying our library and refreshing book stocks. We have raised a huge amount this session towards the playground upgrade and the Parent Council are still working on the paperwork side of this with council representatives into the summer period. Thank you all!

Our year started off with a bang this session, the first term seeing a visit from His Majesty's Inspectors to the school and nursery. They came along with the Care Inspectorate (who review the work of the nursery), with a focus particularly on learning, teaching and assessment and raising attainment / securing progress. We were delighted with the good ratings across the board for every measure and enjoyed reading the many positive aspects of the report, which very much confirmed the direction of travel in our school. In the second term we started on our commitment to ensure that all children in our school had a special trip outwith the town, as well as increasing our commitment to make use of our rich local heritage and natural environment for learning. Classes have enjoyed trips across the year to Aberdour, Pettycur, the Links, Museum of Communication, the Library, trains at the Parish church, the beach and the Binn. In later terms the Rotary have been an invaluable support to our outdoor learning days, a link we are strengthening currently. Thank you to all of the volunteers and parent helpers who allowed us to get out and about more often!

Outwith Burntisland classes have been visiting: Lochore Meadows, Hilton of Beath Farm, Dynamic Earth, Glenrothes Ten Pin Bowling and Laser Tag, Blair Drummond Safari Park, Dundee Science Centre, The Adam Smith Theatre and The Alhambra (in Dunfermline, not Granada!). We finished the term with a lovely Nativity play and the nursery Christmas singalong. P7 enjoyed a December residential to Ardroy Outdoor Education Centre, which was chilly but much enjoyed by all (next year we have booked for September and we are hoping the warmer weather doesn't include too many of the famous west coast midges!)

As the year has progressed it has been the turn of our Rotary and sports teams to make up our highlights Our Rotary quiz team, having won the Balwearie Cluster event, made it to joint second place in the Fife finals. This earned them a place at the national event, the first time BPS have made it to this stage, and our team travelled to Aberdeen with their families. It was not to be on the day as competition at this stage was, as you would expect, pretty fierce.




Our P6/7 boys football team reached the Fife Finals. They competed very well on the day, showing excellent sportsmanship.

We are saying goodbye to Miss Kirsty Doyle who is leaving us for a 23 month secondment to be head of Halbeath Nursery. In her place we will have Mrs Leanne Bain who is joining us as early years depute, having recently been working as the cluster principal teacher. Leanne knows the school and our children well already, having worked here on Thursdays supporting the improved teaching of writing and we are delighted to have her onboard.

By the time this article is published, we will be into the 2025–2026 school session. Let us hope it is every bit as fun and successful as the last year has been!

The BPS Parent Council have achieved a huge amount during this academic year. Incredibly, we have raised over £38,000 through events and fundraising initiatives including the Christmas Fayre, Asda Cashpot scheme for schools, the Big Green Market, our school lottery, a sponsored Bounceathon as well as being the lucky recipients of multiple grants/ donations.

We'd like to say a special thank you to Forth Ports for their donation of £4,000 and Mossmorran for £5,000 towards our playground upgrade. We really are blown away by their generosity, thank you!

With 5 bouncy castles and nonstop fun, our Bounceathon had every class bouncing through the day—complete with prizes for the top bouncers. Even the teachers got involved! The sun was shining, and the children's cheering and team spirit made it a truly special day.

We had further success with our application to both the You Decide Community Funding and a Local Community Planning Fund through Fife Council which has brought in a whopping £15,000 and £4,000 respectively. A big shout out to our local Councillors who voted in favour of our application!

All the money raised has allowed us to help the school in a variety of ways including the purchase of cooking equipment, plants for the garden, funds to support maintenance of the pitch, ties for the new Primary 1 children and information banners at all the school gates, including the Bungalow.

We collaborated with the Pupil Council to ensure our £4,000 library upgrade reflected what the children wanted. The result has been a huge success with large beanbags, woodland themed soft furnishings, rainbow -coloured chairs, listening stations, desks, kinder boxes, topic books and over 1000 new books which have been generously donated to the school by our community. This new space will allow children to comfortably disappear into the magical world that you can only reach by reading a book!

It is open to absolutely anyone, you can cancel at any time and importantly it helps support all the vital work we do.

We are thrilled to announce that our biggest project, the £35,000 playground upgrade is well and truly on its way. We have worked closely with the Pupil Council, Senior Leadership Team and are working tirelessly with Fife Council to progress this. We had initially hoped for it to be completed during the summer holidays but unfortunately this hasn't been possible to ensure all regulatory requirements are met. However, works will be booked in, hopefully by the time this goes to print!

The Parent Council's AGM will take place on 25th August at 7.30pm online. With many of the current members stepping down, we're eager to welcome new faces and fresh ideas. Details will be posted on our Facebook page and emailed out by the school nearer the time.

None of this would be possible without our fabulous Burntisland community so I'd like to say a huge, big thank you everyone who has donated, volunteered and cheered us on this year. You do so much to support us at every step and we appreciate it all!

Friends of Burntisland Old Parish Church

Burntisland has a new community group: the Friends of Burntisland Old Parish Church. FoBOPC formed after a public meeting in the church in February and is building on work started by the original Church working group.

Our Vision is: To ensure the conservation of the unique historic Burntisland Old Parish Church for the good of the community.

Our aims include: To ensure the long-term preservation of the structure and fabric of the church building and its historical contents, and to maintain long-term public access to the church.

The issue: The church building is currently owned by the General Trustees of the Church of Scotland. As the Church of Scotland is struggling financially, it has made the difficult decision to dispose of many of its properties. Among 700 Church properties up for disposal is our famous Burntisland church. The disposal date is the end of December 2027. We have less than two and a half years to save our historic Church from being sold on the open market. The sale price is at least £65,000. However, the building is valued for insurance at around £7,000,000. Although it is believed to be in good order, it costs around £8-10,000 annually to maintain it.

FoBOPC would like Historic Environment Scotland (HES) to take ownership of the building i.e. to transfer it from Church ownership to the care of the State.

However, HES have said that although they recognise the importance of the church in

Scottish social and church history, and have given it category A status for its architectural importance, they do not have the resources to maintain it long-term. Unless this position changes, e.g. due to Scottish Government intervention, FoBOPC may have to consider taking community ownership of the building to save it from being sold privately. Private ownership could mean loss of public access, neglect, and potential dereliction. Our main problem is not the purchase price, but finding a way to generate enough annual income to maintain the building long-term, without altering the heritage features that the Friends wish to protect.

What makes Burntisland Old Parish Church so special?

It is thought to be the first church built in Scotland after the Reformation. In a break with tradition, it was built to a unique square design between 1592 and 1596. In the following centuries it acquired various unusual features that survive today e.g. pumfils and box pews like the so-called Magistrate's Pew, and galleries with painted panels of 17th century ships and sailors, and with the emblems of the various trade guilds. The guilds were like early trade unions and very important to the old Royal Burgh. In 1601, the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland met in Burntisland church in the presence of King James VI of Scotland. It was here that the new translation of the Bible was authorised—the world renowned 'King James Version'.

Over its 429 years it has seen many important events; been visited by many famous people; and hosted generations of families who have been baptised, married, or had their funerals at the church. The



church was originally built and paid for by the people of Burntisland, before eventually being taken into Church of Scotland ownership. It continues to be used for regular worship by its congregation, and for civic events like the crowning of the summer King and Queen in Civic Week. After the Church of Scotland disposes of the church, the congregation will worship elsewhere.

Burntisland is fortunate in having several heritage buildings and was previously voted Fife's favourite Conservation Area. The church is its 'crown jewel' and every year it attracts tourists and visitors who are shown round by volunteer guides.

If you care about Burntisland Old Parish Church and want it to continue to host events like the crowning of the Summer King and Queen; to use it for family events like weddings and funerals; to be inspired by the generations who have worshipped in the church before you; or just to be able to visit it, admire it, and learn about its history, please support FoBOPC.

Supporting Swifts

Swift action provided! Swifts are iconic birds of the urban summer, scything above the streets on long, swept-back wings, drawing attention with their screaming calls. Sadly, like much of our wildlife, they're in serious decline: the British Trust for Ornithology estimates that populations fell by a whopping 60% between 1995 & 2020.

Two of the main drivers of the decline are poor summer weather associated with climate change and the loss of nest-sites. Swifts nest in crevices high up in old buildings. Many traditional sites have been lost to demolition, upgrading of social housing and refurbishment of factories and warehouses to modern standards. Burntisland has a handful of breeding Swifts but accommodation is increasingly hard to come by. One effective way to help is to provide nest-boxes. A number of nest-box schemes throughout the UK and beyond have proved very successful.

Adult Swifts (at least two years old) start returning from Africa in early May and will use previous years' nest sites if they're still available. If they're not then the birds will be looking for alternatives. In June younger Swifts, not yet old enough to breed, turn up to start checking out potential nest sites for future years. To help all these home-seekers to locate the nest-boxes a

small speaker is attached to the box, linked to an MP3 player which plays Swift calls on a loop. It sounds crazy but it really attracts them!

In early Spring last year I set up a nest-box scheme in the town. A number of people volunteered to have a box erected on their houses and to play the calls twice a day. Suitable sites were found for nine double boxes (plus one in Kinghorn) and two triple boxes, providing a total of 26 superior Swift apartments. Birds have been seen investigating several of them through the summer, making fast passes to and fro as if practising their approach for the future. So, although this is a long-term project and we're not expecting instant results, we hope that some of our boxes will be occupied by families of Swifts before too long.

We say the same thing every year and are saying it again...what a quick year we've had! It has been filled with lots of fun and laughter, happiness and excitement.

This time of year is filled with excitement as we prepare for the new and returning children to join us in the setting, along with a tinge of sadness as we lose some children heading to Primary 1 or the school nursery. It has been a joy to have them with us as part of their pre-school education and we thank the families of Burntisland and local towns that continue to choose Burntisland Playgroup as their early years setting.

This year we have been out and about exploring the town. We have visited the woods which is a firm favourite, the beach, travelled on the bus around the town, visited the railway station, the castle, the high street, the docks, the recycling centre. The list is endless. We continue to utilise the town to support our interests and learning wherever we can.

We have also received donations from Twinkl for garden resources and Total Energy after being nominated by Gerry Macpherson. As a community charity, we thank everyone for their support.

We participated in Civic Week as usual with this year's theme being "Halfway to Christmas". The children voted for what they wanted to dress up as, and they chose "Whoville and the Grinch"! Unfortunately we did not claim the top group prize but quite a few of our "grinches" were given a "golden ticket". Thank you to the Civic Week Committee who ensure this event continues.

We still have spaces available for the coming session from August 2025 to June 2026. We accept applications all year round for children from 2 years 10 months to the start of Primary 1 to attend our setting. Playgroup is open from 8.45am until 2.45pm term time.

Burntisland Hedgehog Haven

We are now well into our busiest time of the year here at the rescue. Lots of orphaned hoglets coming in where something has sadly happened to mum.

We are also being called out to a lot of nest disturbances where people are having work done in their gardens and have uncovered nests with babies in. Please be careful when carrying out any work even if you don't think you have hedgehogs visiting.

What to do if you uncover a hedgehog nest? Cover the nest back over. Please do not touch the hoglets until you have sought advice from a rescue. Sadly, mum can reject and even kill them if human scent is on them. If mum is nowhere to be seen please call us for advice. Don't just leave them.

We are also seeing some adult hedgehogs coming into the rescue who are poorly with various issues. Please be wary of using any pesticides in your gardens. Weedkiller can burn hedgehogs feet as can strong patio/ driveway cleaners. Leave a shallow bowl of water out for hedgehogs and other wildlife to drink from if you can.



Goal posts pose a real threat to hedgehogs so if you have one please lift it off the ground by a couple of feet at night or remove the net if not in use. Also garden netting needs to be off the ground as hedgehogs can become entangled in it.

We were recently the beneficiary of The Big Green Market for July. Thanks to everyone who came along or donated items for our tombola stall. Much appreciated and to receive £1,000 is just amazing especially with all the mouths to feed in the rescue just now.

Thank you to everyone who came to see us on our stall at

the Civic Week Parade day! It was a lovely day and Rosie our mascot enjoyed taking part in the parade!



We passed our last inspection with Fife Council with glowing colours and we are happy to report that we are now licensed to be able to take in 40 hedgehogs!

This is such great news for us as there are just so many needing help so it has been great to be in a position during our busy period to be able to take more in to give them the care and medical help they need.



Thank you to everyone who contributed to make this possible by supporting our fundraisers to help us raise funds to be able to build the new outbuilding.

Special thanks to the Co-op on choosing us to be one of the local community causes to receive funding again this year and a huge thank you to Luke Drummond for the many hours building our new rehabilitation shed.

We would also like to thank everyone who voted for us to receive the £1,500 we applied for in the You Decide, Kirkcaldy

funding. This has allowed us to pay for flooring and the electrics. The new building is now up and running and has become invaluable in helping a lot of pregnant females who have come to us unwell and then given birth successfully in a safe place while they continue their rehabilitation.

Last year we held a children's competition to design what they thought a hedgehog haven should look like. We had so many wonderful entries that we had a first. second and third winners.

The winning entry was from Holly aged 5 who included so many of the things which hedgehogs need to keep them happy and healthy. Fresh water, food, long grass to forage, a cosy home and the all important hole in the fence (hedgehog highway) so they can come and go. Well done Holly, we hope you loved the cuddly hedgehog and chocolate hedgehog you won and we hope you enjoy finally seeing your lovely hedgehog awareness poster in the Buzz.

It was a memorable and emotional farewell night on Saturday 28th June, as the legendary Des and the Dingoes played their final gig at a sold out Golf Club during Civic Week.

Des is Des Linsley, now 85, founder of the band and frontman on guitar and vocals for 68 years. Performing since 1957 he has entertained generations with rock 'n' roll, getting the crowds up dancing and singing.

In the late 1950s, Des and six other lads banded together, practising in a garden shed in Kilmundy Drive, playing skiffle, the teen music of the day. They called themselves 'The Lonesome Hobos' for their first performance in the Parish Church hall and with only six songs and the audience calling for 'more' they had to increase their repertoire fast.

They became 'The Dingoes' but on the advice of Des's cousin the band's name was changed to 'Des and the Dingoes' in the early 1960s, copying the format of many singer/band groups of the day.

The Star (Cedar Inn) in Aberdour was their first residency, with Jimmy Kerr, Des, Ian Workman, and John Beavers (pictured). They also had a residency at the Crown and later the Milton.

There's been many 'Dingoes' in the years since, with the late Jimmy Robertson on drums the longest serving for over 50 years.

The group played in pubs, clubs and functions at venues throughout Fife and also in the town, more recently supporting Civic Week at the Toll, in the Links marquee and at The Star.

Wishing Des a happy retirement after all these years, he certainly deserves it!

Fife Ukulele Orchestra

Fun, Frets and Friends. Formed in 2011 in Burntisland, this community group was created to bring musical fun to the people of Fife and has been doing so with smiles and gusto ever since.

Having played in Burntisland's Sands Hotel for 12 years, the popularity of the Orchestra resulted in an ever-increasing membership until a larger venue had to be found. The group settled in Inverkeithing Civic Centre, where it meets every fortnight on a Monday with a brief break during the summer.

Whilst always intent on having fun, FUO has several strings to pluck. Members can engage in improvement activities which embrace beginners just enjoying a cheerful strum as well as those who wish to gain higher skills such as finger picking and reading tab.

Singing is a significant part of a ukulele performance and greatly adds to the enjoyment. Again, encouragement and support are available for those who may believe they cannot sing (almost everybody can by the way).

Instruments commonly played vary in size

from the smaller Soprano and Concert ukes, the more common Tenors up to larger Baritone and Bass ukuleles. Some members even make their own! There is a small Ukulele-Banjo section which also helps add to the musical mix and variety.

Part of each evening is put aside for everyone to play together, learning new numbers, rehearsing for the next gig or, quite often, just having a jam, trying out new tunes suggested or written by members. The music is wide ranging, from early favourites right through the 60s, 70s and 80s to the present day.

In support of the community, FUO plays as a complete orchestra for larger audiences as





well in smaller numbers for other local community groups, particularly those who support people with health conditions or impairments.

It also takes part in musical festivals around Scotland and has played in the Scottish Parliament and at the Royal Highland Show, so it is not just about playing and having fun but also about supporting our local community. Several charities are supported each year with fundraising activities and donations from club funds.


The club meets on the first and third Tuesday of the month, at the Kingswood Hotel, 10am to 12noon.

Within the TRA catchment, most residents have to park cars on the streets near their homes, as they do not have the luxury of allocated spaces. In summer, with the influx of visitors to the town, it makes this almost impossible. The CBTRA is supporting and working with Network Rail and Forth Ports to look at alternative car parking areas to help ease the congestion around the residential areas of central Burntisland.

We were delighted to receive £4,500 from the 'You Decide' fund to support making central Burntisland more attractive. You will see in the coming weeks more planters, flowers and benches in place, which benefit not only our area but the town as a whole, complementing the great work FAB do.

One of the new schemes we are involved with is the 'Story Box' project, commencing in August. A free project to develop young children and parents to become involved in reading and story interaction opportunities, and for you to bring your young children to this session, where, as a group, we will read stories and get involved in bringing the story to life. Art across Burntisland Primary School

Primary 1 have been learning all about patterns using lines and colour. They can recognise horizontal, diagonal and vertical lines and demonstrate this in their farming artwork. To create a tractor, they cut 2D shapes from card. Wax resist was a technique used to create the patterns and colours in fields.







Primary 2 created rocket drawings recording a range of visual information and showed great control in their use of line. As a class they discussed the characteristics of rockets and created a large 3D junk model.







Primary 2/3 have exploring a range of media to create a lifelike representation of the Burntisland shops and cafes on the high street for their Sharing the Learning Assembly.





The Egyptians topic has given **Primary 3** the opportunity to explore many different types of media, including making a clay cartouche, painting an Egyptian landscape and creating a headdress from gold crepe paper. They used line, shape, colour and pattern to create the symmetrical scarab beetle.



Primary 4 designed and created wind turbines in teams as part of their Sustainability project, and were challenged with including moving parts within their 3D structures. They discussed animals endangered, creating their turtle artwork.



Primary 5's project Healthy Mind and Body has allowed them to explore both inside and outside the body, creating artworks using various media. Paul Cezanne' still lifes was a particular focus and investigating shading and light.







Titanic was the **Primary 6** topic for term 3 and they created various artworks. Observing and drawing the grand staircase and used mixed media to create 3D images of the Titanic. Primary 6 also looked at line, exploring the use of tone.



Primary 6/7 have observed and recorded what they might find in the forest and have been inspired by different artists, like Raewyn Harris. Fern fronds and mushrooms are a few of the natural forms they have tried to recreate using collage.







Primary 7 were learning about the life and work of Henry Moore, discussing similarities and differences in his work and other artists. After sketching in the style of Henry Moore they created mini sculptures inspired by his works.

A Binn Hill walk and a sketching class, experimenting with different media was part of **Primary 7**'s outdoor learning experience.

Payge contributed significantly to creating the display during her art sessions.

St Serf's Scottish Episcopal Church

Our churches in Burntisland are all different expressions of the Christian faith, and we relish those times when we all come together for worship and fellowship. On Pentecost Sunday 8th June we met together in the Erskine Church to celebrate that unity in a joint service.

We are always happy to collaborate with the other churches in the area, so our pastoral visiting team was delighted to accept the invitation from the BEK group to participate in their training sessions, organised by Taryn Minnie and led by the Reverend Eileen Miller, who has taken part in leading worship at St Serf's on several occasions. Caring for the whole community is very much at the heart of what your churches in Burntisland aim to do.

Other joint activities included a litter-pick and short forest church service with Beath and Cowdenbeath North Church of Scotland, who are fellow members of Ecocongregation Scotland. Our two churches share concerns about the environment and the urgent need to care for it.

The month of June was a special one for St Serf's, as we celebrated the 120th anniversary of the opening of the present building. So the bunting went up and the events began. We enjoyed several talks and presentations, including one on the


Reverend Henry Hardy, who was the driving force behind the building of the church, which was dedicated in 1905.

In keeping with our eco-credentials, Lesley Gordon raised our awareness of butterflies, and Ian Archibald spoke movingly about John Rae, the overlooked Arctic explorer.


Courtesy of Alasdair Blaikie, our in-house cinematographer, we watched the classic film "A Room with a View", which so perfectly reflects the attitudes and social expectations of Edwardian society. There was plenty to discuss afterwards over a glass of wine.

Peter Ryder reminded us of the many and varied sites associated with the early Christian saints in our area, figures surrounded by legend and myth who kept alive the flame of faith so long ago.

Serf, our patron, was one such. The historical facts surrounding his life are few but we know that he was the abbot of Culross, and that he is reputed to have rescued and cared for the infant Kentigern (Mungo) and his mother. His connection to Fife is strong, with sites on Loch Leven (St Serf's Inch), Dunning and Dysart (St Serf's cave). The first church in Burntisland at Kirkton was dedicated to him and St Adamnan. Serf is also known as Servanus (the servant), something that we as


