Burgh Chambers—an uncertain future

Spotlight has fallen on the future of the Burgh Chambers in the last month, after the Community Council were forced to move their October public meeting and the Heritage Trust ended their attempts to have the building renovated and clock tower restored by Fife Council.

The building is used for Community Council meetings, Civic Receptions and by other groups, however the work to refurbish the ground floor premises has left the rest of the property with no heating.

It is a historic Common Good asset which should be properly looked after but faces an uncertain future as Fife Council appears to be exploring options for the Chambers.

Elected local Councillors and Fife Council officials are due to meet, and at the time of publication the *Buzz* awaits further developments on the building's future.

Meanwhile, the refurbished former local office on the ground floor of the Burgh Chambers building welcomes Burntisland's Banking Hub into its permanent location.

Cash Access UK has taken a ten-year lease with Fife Council and the new Hub branch will soon open its doors to customers.

The Hub will continue with its 9-to-5 Monday to Friday opening hours, offering the same services as previously in its old home in the old Police Station at 60 High Street. TSB, Royal Bank of Scotland and Bank of Scotland will offer community services on Tuesday, Wednesday and Friday respectively each week. Currently, no community bankers are present on Monday or Friday.

It has been mooted that Barclays and Virgin Money might take these slots, although this has yet to be confirmed by Cash Access UK. Manager Santosh Budarapu is keen to emphasize that both Barclays and Virgin Money services are currently available at the Cowdenbeath hub. Despite being staffed by Post Office personnel, PO services will not be available at the hub.

With prominent signage on the Chambers' historic facade and proper service counters within, it certainly looks the part.

Community Council Bullets......

Your Community Council holds its regular meetings on the third Tuesday of each month, at 7pm in the Burgh Chambers on the High Street.

Dates for the next meetings are: Tuesday 18th November, 16th December, and 20th January.

Members of the public are welcome to attend or to raise matters of interest. If possible, please email items you'd like discussed to the Secretary a week before the meeting so they can be more easily accommodated in the agenda.

As there is no step-free access to the venue, meetings are also available to join using Zoom videoconferencing—please contact the Secretary if you wish to join online via Zoom.

A summary of issues discussed during recent meetings is set out below. Full minutes are available on the Community Council website.

- Burgh Chambers: In October Fife Council cancelled the bookings for our public meetings and civic receptions at short notice with no explanation. They then emailed the CC and Burntisland Heritage a list of items they wish to clear from the building and put into Council storage. The heating system that previously serviced the whole building, now only services the new Banking Hub. After years of neglect by the Council, the Grade B listed building now needs funding to refurbish it. We suspect the Council wish to sell off this Common Good building. We have contacted the Council and will let you know when we have any update.
- The Banking Hub moves this month to the former High Street local office on the ground floor of the Burgh Chambers on a 10-year lease.
- John Rodger, recipient of the Community Award in 2005, passed away at the age of 85. We offer our sincere condolences to all his family and friends. John was well known in the town as a milkman for many years.
- Children's Scots Verse Competition: Fife Council have agreed we can hold the winners' presentations and reception in the Burgh Chambers as usual.
- Isla MacDonald has stepped down as Chair due to work commitments.
- The Links Splash Pad refurbishment should be complete by summer 2026.
 Fife Council shared a proposed design on their Facebook page.
 We understand this has been adapted following community feedback.
- The seawalls at the beach promenade were repaired and repainted by a Fife Council subcontractor in August. This was with the agreement of owners Network Rail. We gave permission to use the Burntisland Common Good Fund for this work. Separately, the War Memorial railings were also repainted in time for Remembrance Sunday.
- Railway Station: we continue to explore improvements at Burntisland station, especially step-free access. A station use survey is proposed.
- Flooding: Following an FOI request and calls for solutions to recurrent surface water flooding in the Haugh Rd/Dick Cres Park areas, Scottish Water responded, saying work is at an early stage and options for solutions are not expected until autumn 2026. They promised regular updates on progress.
- Harbour: Fife Council legal team did not support the Burntisland Harbour Access Trust (BHAT) interpretation of the legal position on restrictions on public access at the east harbour and breakwater. An attempt to amend the law in BHAT's favour at Scottish Parliament failed. We hope Fife Council, Forth Ports and BHAT can work together to improve public access. Forth Ports have no development news for Burntisland. The old BiFab shed was demolished revealing more derelict land and development opportunities. Fife Council should start work soon on the Active Travel Route extension through the east harbour. A new heritage interpretation panel, arranged by community groups and funded by Forth Ports, was erected near the station.
- We have voiced local concerns to Fife Council regarding public toilets and car parking, and to Police Scotland on antisocial behaviour. We thank Fife Coast and Countryside Trust for the new signage we requested at the public slipway, and Fife Council for the bigger waste bins on the Links.
- Christmas Lights: we thank all who support our fundraising, which this year has funded 8 new lights. A Fife Council grant helps subsidise annual costs.
- Fife Council will soon roll out 20mph speed limits to more of the town.

Burntisland Heritage Trust

Burntisland Burgh Chambers: Our Heritage at risk.

Background and Early Efforts

Since the first Community Action Plan in 2016, Burntisland Heritage, in partnership with the Community Council, has worked to keep the Burgh Chambers in community use. A 2019 Business Development Plan proposed redeveloping the ground floor commercially to support community use upstairs, but the multi-million-pound costs made the project unfeasible.

Transition to Burntisland Heritage Trust (SCIO)

In 2021, the Trust took over responsibility for the project, converting to a Scottish Charitable Incorporated Organisation (SCIO) to handle larger projects and funding. However, a bid for Levelling-Up funding later that year was unsuccessful, leaving the project without the necessary financial backing.

Reassessment and Changing Context

Following the pandemic, the Trust recognised the need to reassess the original business plan. Working with Fife Historic Buildings Trust (FHBT), an updated review and stakeholder consultation were



commissioned by Fife Council, continuing into 2024.

Council Reorganisation and Setbacks

Between 2021 and 2023, internal changes within Fife Council shifted management priorities, and the building's future in community ownership became uncertain. The 2024 plan for a new Banking Hub in the lower floor further complicated the Trust's redevelopment vision. The Banking Hub's £19.8k annual income starts in January 2027 and is insufficient for BHT or any local group to sustain the building.

Phased Approach and Spire Project

The Trust adopted a phased strategy, beginning with reinstating the building's spire. In early 2025, it secured £15,000 from

the Community Recovery Fund to appoint a project manager to advance the spire restoration and seek further funding. Although restoring the Clock Tower is a planning condition with political support, the Spire and Burgh Chambers are not part of the Fife Council Capital Plan. Politicians should ensure the Burgh Chambers redevelopment appears in the next update.

Current Situation

It is now clear that Fife Council has no plans to restore the clock tower or keep the building in public ownership. As an organisation, we lack both the resources and expertise to pursue this matter further. After ten years of effort, we have reluctantly decided to withdraw from advocating for public ownership. We hope that whoever buys the building will care for it and help bring prosperity and energy to our High Street.

Protecting Local Heritage

Without heating or water, stored artworks and artefacts are at risk; some, like ship models donated in 1950, have already been moved to Glenrothes, a move opposed by the Trust. The Trust argues that the Burgh Chambers' artefacts are integral to Burntisland's identity and should stay in town preserving the community heritage.

Public Bookcases around town

The Itty Bitty BookShack Brings Book Magic to Russell Grove

What started as one book lover's dream has become a little hub of joy for the local community. Inspired by the popular Little Bookhouse Fife on MacKinnon Place in Dunfermline, Auli and her partner Ross decided to create something similar right here in their own garden—and so, The Itty Bitty BookShack was born. A free book gifting library where anyone can come and help themselves to whatever novels take their fancy.

Located near the school at the end of Russell Grove, the BookShack was lovingly built in summer 2023 using entirely reused and recycled materials. The couple sourced wood from old pallets and leftover projects, while the roof felt and paint were kindly donated by locals. "Reduce, reuse, recycle" has been the key with Ross using his DIY skills to hand build the shack.

Sponsored by Ross's workplace, the Itty Bitty BookShack is now registered with the global Little Free Libraries network. Visitors don't need to leave a book to take one—everyone is welcome to share and enjoy



stories freely. When the shelves are full, Auli takes to the road, redistributing extra books to other local bookcases, nicknamed "Book Bumps" she bumps up the library's stock. So your donations are always redistributed to be given out for free.

Over the past two years, the pair have also brought extra fun to the community with festive book hunts around town at Christmas and Halloween. You can follow The Itty Bitty BookShack on Instagram to see new arrivals, community updates, and their latest book-hiding adventures.

Ferguson Place Free Library

Independently, another public bookcase appeared around the same time in 2023 with Susan Smith putting up the Free Library on Ferguson Place. It was built in the Men's Shed Kirkcaldy by her friend

Susan Thores, painted with the help of son Roan, and put up by all three together.

It is well used, with books for adults on the top and bottom shelves, and children's books in the middle.



The Book Exchange on Grange Road

A third, smaller, bookcase in the town appeared last year, located at the very top of Grange Road, past the old Distillery on the route to The Binn.



It came about after Jo Hadoke saw the others and wanted to share the love of books. All sorts get added, from people passing as well as her own, and Jo recycles most months with the Big Green Market.

There is also a free book shelf at the railway station waiting room and in the golf club.

Burntisland Sailing Club

Summer of progress at the sailing club.

Burntisland Sailing Club (BSC) has had an excellent summer season with members engaged in yacht racing both at home and with other clubs in the Forth, as well as making cruises along the East Coast of Scotland and England. Members have also been sailing North through to Loch Linhhe on the West Coast via the Moray Firth and Loch Ness and venturing South to the Farne Islands and Whitby.

A new workshop has been erected enabling members to carry out maintenance on equipment out of the weather.

Following the previous article in the Burgh Buzz, BSC had an excellent response, gaining 11 new members and can now report a full contingent of boat owners.

The search for non-boat owning members continues with an introductory crew membership being offered for up to 2





years, enabling participants to sail in a variety of yachts both for racing and cruising and to attend social events. They will also be able take advantage of a range of Knowledge Based Learning events on and off the water which will assist them in planning their own needs.

The pontoons in the East Basin now have a water supply and the fingers re-arranged to allow easier berthing for visitors. They are now full, however the moorings in the outer harbour are being overhauled and reset and it is possible that a few may be available for smaller vessels of less than 30 feet in length for the next season.

Bluebird, the club's Cheverton workboat, has been extensively refurbished and renewed. Further alterations to her are





planned over the winter to enable the moorings and race marks to be more easily handled and laid.

Finally, the season was marked by a wellattended Dinner and Prize Giving in November at the Sands Hotel, which was enjoyed by all.

Friends of Burntisland Old Parish Church

Join the movement and be part of the legacy!

In the previous edition of the Burgh Buzz, we told you that our iconic church building is listed for disposal by its owners at the end of 2027. This is despite it being used regularly by its congregation, Burntisland and Kinghorn Church of Scotland. The building is not owned by the congregation, but by the General Trustees of the Church of Scotland, based in Edinburgh.

Friends of Burntisland Old Parish Church (FoBOPC) is a community group formed recently to protect this unique 430-year-old building and its historic fixtures and fittings. We want to save it as a publicly accessible heritage asset for the foreseeable future and for the good of the community.

Historic Environment Scotland: In August, we hosted representatives Steven Robb and Mirra Kannan from Historic Environment Scotland (HES) and Andrew McMaster, the new Built Heritage Officer at Fife Council. They toured the church and were very impressed with its historical features and general condition. Claire Baker MSP continues to engage with HES on our behalf. However, despite recognising the building's importance, HES has not committed to taking over building ownership, saying its resources are limited.

Statement of Significance: Burntisland resident Peter Ryder is an independent historic buildings consultant. In October he completed a Statement of Significance for the building for us; something that is missing from the HES records. We will share this with HES and others who may be able to help preserve the building for the future.

The **General Trustees** said they will give a suitable community group preferred purchaser status. If the building can only be saved by a community group purchase, it's important to ensure that this is a feasible option long term. The building must remain useful to the community and financially viable.

Community views: In September, we held consultation events over two weekends to coincide with the 'Big Green Market' and 'Doors Open Days'. Over 225 people visited the church and told us what they think of the building and how they'd like it used in the future. Feedback was very positive.



Here are a couple of the comments made:

"This is my first visit... A lovely space that should be kept and cherished by the community. The heritage and history must be preserved."

"Amazing building. Very well preserved. History is outstanding..."

Community group: FoBOPC now has a constitution, a committee with office bearers, and a membership application form. The next steps for the group are to raise funding for a professional feasibility study. This will look at options for acquiring the building and the viability of managing it for community uses, as suggested in our recent consultation.

Should the group proceed to a community purchase, an updated constitution will be required and conversion to a legal entity e.g. a SCIO or a Company Limited by Guarantee.

As the skies cleared later in the week, we hiked up to a stunning viewpoint overlooking Flekkefjord, capturing group photos with the town nestled below. We also got to take part in an unforgettable kayaking trip along the river.



Our final day was a perfect send-off: a barbecue hosted by one of the families,

set against a breathtaking backdrop of a mountain and fjord. Everyone had a chance to try water skiing and had some fun in the water.

Oldest twinner update

Joan advises us that her sister Lena Cutler (née Mackie) who was the youth leader on Sandy's exchange in 1948 is still very much with us. Joan was able to confirm the full list of participants in 1948 as: Sandy Fraser, Jamie Ewan, John McLaughlan, Betty McCowat, Betty Bowman, May Scott, and Nancy McDermot. So it appears Lena had her work cut out for her looking after seven Burntisland youths on the journey when she herself was not much older than those she was accompanying! The young travellers back then made the journey by train and sea over several days. Much has changed in the intervening years but we are delighted the twinning continues to be an integral part of the fabric of Burntisland by providing our youth with the opportunity to experience the culture of Norway.

80th Anniversary plans

Calling all past twinners! We invite you to take part in celebrating 80 years of twinning with Flekkefjord in 2026! Our twinning was established in 1946 and is one of the oldest in the UK. This year the exchange will take place slightly earlier to coincide with the Games Day so tying in one of the oldest twinning arrangements with one of the oldest games days!

When the twinning celebrated its 50th anniversary a cairn was placed on the Links, (behind the public toilets), where it



still stands to this day. One proposal would be to rededicate the cairn with an additional plaque celebrating the links for an additional 30 years. We would like to do more and with a lasting legacy.

With the launching of our website this year we have been pulling together the history of the exchange, as no records had been kept of the previous visits. If you have any images or memories from previous exchanges, like Joan's and Lena's above, we would love to hear your story.

It's been our busiest summer since opening the rescue, where we've taken local hedgehogs in and also those from as far away as the Borders.

We've seen ailments such as hedgehogs caught in garden netting, dog bites, injuries from garden machinery and internal parasite burdens.



Our rehabilitation shed quickly turned into a maternity ward where we had Florence who gave birth to 5 hoglets, Gracie 2, Christie 2 (sadly one was stillborn) Bev 4—sadly two passed away due to the trauma they had all been through before arrival to the rescue.

We also had lots of mums and hoglets arriving from nest disturbances where sheds were being knocked down or decking pulled up. We provided a safe haven until mum and hoglets were ready to go back out into the world again.

We've had a lot of media interest and we were amazed and humbled to be a finalist for the BBC Make A Difference awards. It was a lovely afternoon spent at the BBC studios in Glasgow where we received a "Highly Commended" award in the Animal category for our work in the rescue.

We featured in an article on the BBC News site and we did a feature about hedgehogs for CBBC Newsround and we were recognised as "Heroes Of The Week" on Channel 5 News where they came and filmed in the rescue and interviewed us on what we do and why it matters.



We would like to thank all of our wonderful volunteers who go above and beyond helping in the rescue and also to our wonderful volunteer drivers both in Fife and Edinburgh as without them we wouldn't be able to get the hedgehogs here to receive the help they need.





Frequently Asked Questions about Burntisland Playgroup

Who are we?

We are an education provider providing childcare for children aged 2 years 10 months to 5 years old. We are an alternative to the school nursery. We receive funding and support from Fife Council and follow all the same guidance as the school nursery. We have been supported by locals for over 40 years who have chosen us to offer their child's first experiences of education.





We are a registered charity who work from a Committee raising funds to keep us sustainable. Unfortunately due to lack of knowledge that we are a service available in the town, we are looking for extra support this year and the coming years from local families to choose us for their child's education.

Who works for us?

We are a small team formed of our manager and senior practitioner – Rebecca McColm, our two full time Early Year Practitioners – Mandy Macpherson and Louise Donaldson. We have our part time Early Years Practitioner in Laura Rankine. We also have our personal cook – Karen Lorrain-Smith. We are supported by our relief staff Sarah Henderson and Emma Lorrain-Smith. We also have our visiting teacher from Fife Council Rachel Walker. We are all experienced in our roles as well as being mums to children of all ages.

Where are we based and what times are we open?

We are located in the Toll Community Centre. We have free flow play into the secure garden which is currently being redesigned for our future children.

We are open Monday–Friday term time from 8.45am until 2.45pm.

Does coming to playgroup affect getting a place at Nursery or in Primary 1?

NO! Accepting a place at playgroup does not affect your chances of getting into the nursery the following year or in at the school for Primary 1. All parents apply online through Fife Council website for school or a school nursery. We have never had a child being refused a space at Burntisland Primary when needed.

What do we do?

We follow the Curriculum for Excellence which all nursery provisions follow. We have a key worker systems which is one adult assigned to your child and they will follow their developmental progress and will develop close links with your child and family.

We utilise outdoor space and our town as much as possible. This year alone we have had lots of visits to the woods, beach, war memorial, railway station, fire station, police station, Links View Care Home, the Links, shops and regularly explore the Toll Park

Is there a waiting list?

We currently have no waiting list at all. You can apply at any time of the year for the coming intake or for future intakes. We have space for up to 24 children.

If you would like to find out more we are having an open day on 30th November from 1pm to 3pm. Come and see the setting, meet the staff and do some Christmas craft!

Burntisland Harbour Access Trust

The past 6 months have kept the Burntisland Harbour Access Trust busy.

In April, we thought we had a breakthrough with Fife Council showing an interest in our lawyers, BTO, opinion. The opinion stated that there were at least three reasons for believing that the community had a legal right of unrestricted access to the areas of the harbour fenced off in 2023. Fife Council interest ceased abruptly after the BHAT chair met with the Fife Access Officer to walk around the dock. Requests to see the Access Officer's report were refused and are now subject to a Freedom of Information appeal to the Scottish Information Commissioner.

In May, our Local Councillors placed a motion with the Fife Cabinet seeking a summary of the Council's position on access rights around the East Dock. The cabinet agreed and called for a report at their August meeting.



In August, BHAT staged a march and rally from the Beacon to Scott Pallets. Some 400 of you joined us. The objective was to raise awareness of the pending Cabinet meeting. The meeting was postponed to September.

In September, the Cabinet met. It rejected the BHAT request that Fife Council meet its responsibility to examine the BTO legal arguments for access, in favour of the oft-stated argument that Forth Ports are a statutory undertaker and, as such, have acted lawfully in enclosing the active

harbour area from unauthorised and/or public access.

In October, BHAT accepted an offer to assist two of our MSPs, David Torrance and Mark Ruskell, in drafting amendments to a new Land Reform Bill. These amendments are being discussed as the Buzz goes to press, with BHAT commenting:

"We are delighted at MSP's positive reception to improving community access to community assets, encouraged by the universal desire to address the shortcomings of existing legislation and to reform it, delighted to be invited to further debate, but disappointed that the specific Burntisland amendment was, to date, not taken. BHAT and its legal advisors are at the forefront of communities seeking reform and stronger action from the enabling agencies - local authorities. Await developments!"

Black Rocks Rowing Club



From Sunday 6th to Saturday 12th July, Black Rocks Rowing Club were delighted to join more than 2,000 other rowers from 78 clubs to be part of the **2025 SkiffieWorlds** in Stranraer. Held only once every 3 years, teams came from across Scotland, Ireland, England, the Netherlands, USA, Canada, South Africa and Australia to take part in this festival of rowing. It was our wee club's first visit to the SkiffieWorlds – and the first time for many of our rowers too.

Sunday's opening ceremony was curtailed a little by some rather windy weather but was still an impressive event. The winds were even stronger on Monday which unfortunately saw the first day's racing postponed however the weather improved considerably on Tuesday when we awoke to glorious sunshine and lovely light winds which stayed with us for the rest of the week.

The races all followed the same course – 1 kilometre in one direction, a 180-degree buoy turn to starboard, and then 1 kilometre back. There were 22 different classes of racing for rowers of all ages ranging from U17 right through to 280+ (average age in the boat 70). Most classes had Women's, Men's and Mixed categories, with up to 15 boats per heat. We were delighted that from our newly formed club we managed to enter crews in 12 of these classes. With this being a brand new experience for most of us there were clearly a few nerves before the racing started – however, it became clear from results in our early heats that in fact Black Rocks were going to be able to be 'in the mix' with other clubs of a similar size.

With no racing on Monday, Tuesday became a very busy day that saw us competing in 4 events. The sea was still pretty rough after Monday's stormy weather – especially earlier in the day – so it was a challenging day for all involved!

Our 40+ Women finished 8th in their heat, 40th overall.

Our 40+ Men's crew finished 6th in their heat, 36th overall.

Our 280+ Men's crew from Eastern finished 33rd overall – our top points-scoring event.

Our 50+ Mixed crew finished 8th in their heat, 43rd overall.

Our 60+ Men's crew finished their heat in 11th, 49th overall.

Our 40+ Mixed crew finished 7th in their heat, 48th overall.

Our 50+ Men finished their heat in 8th, 35th overall.

Our 50+ Women finished 13th in their heat and 61st overall.

The 60+ Mixed crew finished 12th in their heat, 57th overall.

Our Mixed Open team finished 8th in their heat and 41st overall. Our Men's Open team finished 9th in their heat and 28th overall. And finally, our Women's Open crew finished 7th in their heat and 37th overall.

Overall, we finished 57th out of a total of 78 participating teams and we are very pleased with that result—particularly considering the fact that we only launched our skiff last year! Indeed, despite our best efforts, none of our crews actually managed to get a full practice together before race day. It's been quite a shot in the arm to realise that we really are in the mix with longer-established clubs. We're seeing a surge of enthusiasm for competitive rowing that will no doubt be reflected in our future calendar.

This event was a steep learning curve for all involved but was, at the same time, hugely enjoyable. There's a wonderful sense of community within coastal rowing and it was lovely to experience that and to be a small part of it. Stranraer is an ideal venue and the organisers, and their army of willing volunteers, deserve huge praise. Together they ensured the whole event was just a spectacular success. We are already looking forward to SkiffieWorlds 2028!

As a 16-year-old in S5 at Balwearie High School, I am incredibly grateful to be one of fourteen to be selected from my school to join the Polar Academy team.

The Polar Academy is a charity with an inspiring drive to help push young people past their limits and reach their full potential. The charity's targets are to equip us with resilience and confidence within ourselves and our team, which gives us the courage and drive to believe in ourselves and achieve our dreams. This is a fantastic opportunity as many people selected are "invisible" in school systems and this results in us having a severe lack of belief in our abilities.

Each year, two schools are chosen to follow a year-long programme where the separate teams are put through intense physical and mental training such as weekly insanity training, a week away camping in the Cairngorms, and various long tyre hauls.

This prepares us physically and emotionally

for an authentic Arctic expedition in March 2026, where we will be leading our own expedition across the north of Finland. Out of the 14 chosen, 10 people are on the expedition team and 4 people are on the leadership team and stay behind, however they still have many opportunities such as the summer exchange and go through the same training as the expedition team.

Our Balwearie group also includes Spencer Davies and Connor Lamb from Burntisland.

Although my team and I didn't know each other at the beginning, we have grown a close bond and I have already noticed changes in myself in the sense that it has opened my eyes to so many opportunities that I thought never would be possible for me, and this makes me feel more hopeful and confident for my future. I know that I'm not the only one who is feeling like this.

The Polar Academy also helps many more children across Scotland than the few selected each year, as each team member must share our own personal, unique experience with at least 3,000 people, and so although the Polar Academy directly works with 14 people from our school, around 42,000 students around Scotland will indirectly have the chance to be motivated and encouraged due to The Polar Academy.

This life changing opportunity would not be possible without the hard work and devotion of Craig Mathieson, the founder of The Polar Academy, and everyone else who is involved. The trip costs £25,000 for each person to go, but Craig fundraises everything himself so there is no cost for the families. However, we do hold different events to help fundraise, support, and raise awareness of the charity's work.

We will end this calendar year with a great mixture of events. After a busy November we can wind down in December with a lovely carol service and 3 days of a new Christmas market. Our year is typically bookended with student events – 22 in all this year – but in between we have motorsport, horses, fairgrounds and agricultural shows. Overall, our diary has about 150 events and/or training activities per year, spread across 7 local authority areas.

That's a stretch for our volunteers but it's still so much easier now that we have our own premises at the former police station.

As we had hoped, we've able to extend the benefit of our new centre beyond our own

members. By providing a temporary home for the Banking Hub we've had lots of local people through the doors and helped to provide that service earlier than might otherwise have been possible.

We've also hosted occasional use by others, including the Civic Week committee and Sewing & Crafts group. We've leased one room back to Police Scotland for use by the community officers as and when needed.

For ourselves, we recently spent a lovely afternoon supporting the Kinross Road Runners in their half-marathon around beautiful but challenging terrain. Our own radios are good, but were no match for that combination of distance and topography. So we were delighted to work with Raynet (the radio amateurs emergency network), to help ensure that everything ran smoothly.

Right now, our prime focus is on developing our members' skills and welcoming new volunteers. We offer hands-on experience which can be invaluable in helping to decide future career

choices. Or own clinical skills are unrivalled in the voluntary sector and are honed by real life.



We do our best to schedule entry-level courses whenever there is enough demand. We're also happy to be flexible about dates, times and content. However, quality is non-negotiable. We want our candidates and our volunteers to be confident in applying the skills that we teach.

It has been a busy and positive start to the new school year at Starley Hall. Both young people and staff have enjoyed a full autumn term of learning, creativity and community connection.

Our Enrichment Week in August provided a supportive transition back to school life, inspired by the Five Ways to Wellbeing – Connect, Be Active, Take Notice, Keep Learning and Give. Activities included a visit to the National Museum of Scotland in Edinburgh, as well as outdoor art and sports challenges. Young people also prepared and shared homemade pizzas as part of the "Give" theme, helping to strengthen our sense of belonging and kindness across the school.





Many of our young people have been working towards a range of recognised qualifications, including SQA National Qualifications and ASDAN awards. One group carried out a personal hygiene survey in Dears Chemist as part of their ASDAN work, while another class has been studying Jekyll and Hyde, and exploring the atmosphere of horror and suspense in classic and modern spooky films. Alongside gaining formal accreditation, these experiences help young people develop confidence, communication and transferable skills that prepare them for life beyond school.

Special Visitors

We were pleased to welcome Alex MacDonald from Burntisland First Aid Services Trust for a practical and engaging first aid session. A small group of young people took part, learning key emergency response skills such as CPR, using a defibrillator and applying bandages. The session gave those involved the chance to build confidence and gain valuable knowledge that could make a real difference in an emergency.





We were also delighted to welcome Calum from Cool Creatures for a memorable animal handling session. Young people met a range of fascinating animals, including curious meerkats and Tank the armadillo, who quickly became a firm favourite. The visit sparked plenty of excitement and conversation, and was a real highlight of the

Enhancing our Environment

Our newly refreshed therapeutic base, The View, has also been brought to life through contributions from young people who helped to design and decorate the space. This area provides a calm environment for emotional regulation, reflection and wellbeing support. Both young people and staff continue to benefit from relaxation and yoga sessions. These are a valued part of our whole school approach to wellbeing.





We have also invested in new outdoor play equipment, which is already having a positive impact on outdoor learning across the 24-hour curriculum. The upgraded space is designed to meet the diverse needs of our

young people, and reflects our commitment to providing a nurturing environment where everyone can feel good, connect with others and thrive.





It is an annual tradition for the young people and staff at Starley Hall School to create the Guy Fawkes for the Burntisland Bonfire and Fireworks Display. This year, the group were keen to give the Guy a greener focus, using charity shop finds and donated items that might otherwise have ended up in landfill. It was a team effort full of creativity, laughter and community spirit, especially when they got a few funny looks delivering him through town!

Spreading Cheer

This term also saw the launch of our Starley Hall Winter Collection, featuring Christmas cards, gift tags,



notebooks and mugs showcasing original artwork by one of our talented young artists. The collection was created as part of an enterprise initiative to raise funds for our annual Christmas present appeal.

Finally we can update you that the boards with history of our docks and town are now in place at Forth Place. This has been two years in the making but well worth all the work. A big thank you to our



project partners: Heritage Trust, Ian Somerville; BCDT, Flavia McIntosh; Gordon Langlands and Iain Ralph along with our funders and project managers Forth Ports, Lucy Harris and Andy Lamb.

An area that was neglected and in need of being cleaned up has been transformed in to a community garden, completed by Deek and his crew from the parks and open spaces team. We have sited an inclusive picnic bench to give the residents in the area a place to meet and enjoy the space in the better weather.

We are currently working with the housing officer looking at possibilities of where we can re-site bin storage for flats where currently they are kept on the street and stored under house windows. Not ideal and hopefully we can find a suitable alternative.

Dog poo bag dispensers sited on our High Street seem to be doing their job. The street seems cleaner. We would like to continue to offer free bags but require sponsorship to keep this going. Whether you want to donate poo bags (rolls to fit dispensers) or a few pounds then we can continue to offer this service.

We estimate that we require 800 bags a year which at Amazon prices equates to £276. Businesses and community if you can afford to donate no matter how small then please hand in your donation to On a Roll, High Street.

Burntisland & District Pipe Band have maintained their spree of success throughout the rest of the competition season. We have achieved great results in major, minor, and solo competitions, and have proudly represented the community of not just Burntisland, but the whole of Fife.

The European championships took place on 9th August in Perth and saw impressive results from all members of the band. Our grade 3A band achieved a fantastic 6th place, a result of the dedication from members and tutors, and the novice juvenile B band placed 7th, narrowly missing the top 6 due to ensemble preference. We are immensely proud of both bands. The drum majors also performed brilliantly; in the juvenile category, DM Logan Clark took 4th place, and DM Catherine Spears achieved 1st, becoming the new European champion! DM Graeme Wise also placed 5th in the adult category, securing a well-rounded success for all our competing drum majors.

Our highlight of the season was the World Championships. Performances of extremely high standards could be seen from 207 bands over the two-day period, and we are thrilled to declare that our bands were

amongst them. On Friday 15th August, our novice juvenile B band made it to the grade final, qualifying with a strong performance. They finished in 10th place and were lucky enough to compete in arena 1 for the final, a moment of great pride for the whole band. Our grade 3A band and drum majors competed on Saturday 16th August. After a successful heat, the band went on to place 3rd in the final, with the drum corps taking 1st place and being crowned champion of champions for the season! We are exceptionally proud of this standout result that conveys the hard work, dedication, and talent that makes up our band. Our drum majors also displayed outstanding performances in a very competitive field, with DM Catherine Spears placing 6th in the juvenile category.

Since then, the band have taken part in several other competitions and community events. Our competitors achieved great results from competitions in both Peebles and Pitlochry throughout September, even taking home a staggering 20 trophies from Peebles. These were great opportunities for our younger drum majors to have a chance of competing, and we are delighted to say that they all came home with plenty of trophies to be proud of. Alongside these

competitions, our bands had the honour of playing for the Fife flyers at one of their hockey games. They played crowds of supporters into the building as a band, and piper Nyree Howes did us all proud playing the national anthem solo to start the game. We are very grateful to have these opportunities and are always eager to represent the community in any way.

Many of our players excel in solo competitions as well as within the band, and the Burntisland and District Pipe Band solos in Beath High School gave us a chance to display this array of talent. The event took place on Thursday 5th October and was a huge success, with many pipers and drummers of all ages giving exceptional performances. We are immensely proud of all the competitors and want to thank all judges and volunteers for making a day like this possible. The world solo drumming championship was also an excellent opportunity for some of our drummers to compete against the world's best. Gregor Noble and Annalise Paterson both did us very proud, making it to their respective finals and finishing in the top 10 of very competitive categories. These are exceptional results, and we feel very lucky to have such talent within our band.

St Serf's Scottish Episcopal Church

The many weeks of the summer and autumn are known in the Episcopal Church as Ordinary Time; a time to take stock and move quietly along until Advent and Christmas. Ordinary time is transformed for the whole of September, however, as the Church celebrates the Season of Creation.

With environmental considerations as the focus of much that we do, St Serf's moved wholeheartedly into this season, choosing a different environmental theme for each of the four Sundays of September and bringing things to a colourful conclusion with our harvest festival on the first Sunday of October.

This year, in an attempt to raise awareness of the huge risk to marine life posed by the commercial exploitation of the sea, we showed David Attenborough's impressive and heart-wrenching film, Ocean. This was a strong reminder that unless we actively register our concerns about factory fishing and bottom trawling, coral reefs and the eco-systems of the seabed will be destroyed, perhaps for ever, having a catastrophic effect on the life of our planet.

There are plenty of opportunities online to express concern about these issues, and many of us felt moved to sign petitions urging our government to intervene to help prevent further exploitation of our natural resources.

We may feel that our concerns are recent but as long ago as the 13th century, Francis of Assisi was honouring and respecting every aspect of the created world, from the sun and the stars to the tiniest living creature, celebrating the life-cycle from birth to death. This autumn, I was fortunate to spend the feast of St Francis in his home town of Assisi, where the 800th Anniversary of his poem "The Canticle of the Creatures" was being celebrated. Brother Sun was much in evidence, and the area around the church of S. Damiano was filled with birdsong.

Coming home to St Serf's, I noticed how full of colour the garden is. Do come and look at it and enjoy the variety of plants and flowers.

The next season to be marked will be Remembrance, when all the churches come together with the pipe band, uniformed organisations and people of the town at the War memorial to honour those who gave their lives in war. Look out for the poppy displays which will be in evidence outside our places of worship.



And please remember, you are welcome to attend worship in any of the town's churches.

As I always remind you—St Serf's is an active and completely inclusive church. Visitors, enquirers or just the plain curious are always welcome in church on a Sunday morning. Our service of Holy Communion is at 10 am and there is always a chance to share a cup of tea or coffee and have a chat after the service. 

Craigencalt Rural Community Trust

The weather has played a significant part in our successes this year as the Trust is an organisation that encourages people to use the outdoors. The Walking Festival had wall to wall sunshine, and the Civic Week Walk across the beach from Burntisland to Kinghorn was the same. Our presentations have been well attended as was our vibrant summer barbecue, a beautiful evening.

Our final event of the year in November was another presentation on the Fife Coastal Path from Hamish Brown. No one knows this path better than Hamish who has written two books on the subject. He recommends that people do not simply walk the coastal path, but stop and notice the little extra things so easily missed with just walking.

Recently, the Trust has convened a communications group who hope to promote Facebook and our website more. They are also looking at some new ideas for activities in 2026, so if you would like to offer or suggest some, please get in touch.

For the first time in our existence, we recently had something stolen. The Rock Rest picnic area was created in a small stone quarry alongside the track on the north side of the loch near the farm allotments. It has grown into a lovely spot, used as a place for people to have a snack and chat. Walking further up into the quarry the Trust provided a granite stone bench, tucked into a rock alcove. It is a quiet place amongst the rocks to read or

just contemplate. This bench was funded by a generous bequest from a local family.

Recently we were stunned to find that someone had forcibly removed this bench. This was no quick, easy job, and the culprits must have known where to find it, as its location is not obvious. The flat, polished, granite seat was firmly fixed with epoxy resin and weighed 75kg. Whoever stole this needed tools to dislodge it, and help to carry it to a vehicle on the nearby track then transport it away. This happened in late September and despite both the press and the police showing a keen interest it is unlikely that the bench will be recovered.



The Trust has worked closely with the owners of Craigencalt Farm around Kinghorn Loch since its inception. The first project included a board showing a map of walks in the area for visitors, pockets for leaflets and booklets, and a place to put up our posters for forthcoming events and walking. Diana Neil and her son Richard

sold the farm six years ago on her retirement. Now, Two Skies Limited, the present owners of Craigencalt Farm have given us notice to remove all our property from their

all our property from their land. We have tried hard to dissuade them from this, as we do not want it to affect people's enjoyment of the area.

Next year will be different for the Trust but we look forward to some new beginnings as our remit covers such a large area. We leave Craigencalt Farm feeling pleased with all our achievements at the loch and knowing that our improvements at the jetty and the pathways we have constructed have brought great enjoyment to a lot of people. Meanwhile we wish everyone a lovely relaxing Christmas and a good New Year.
