2026 Community Award Winners

The recipient of this year's Individual award is **John Harrower**. This award recognises the hard work and dedication in helping to rejuvenate and then lead the Burntisland Bonfire & Fireworks Committee over the last two years. Following a hiatus after the Covid pandemic, the traditional and popular community event was again successfully held on the Links in 2024 and 2025.

Such an event requires much organisation, funding, and a team of volunteers. John stepped up in 2025 to lead the committee in their various tasks, including liaising with Fife Council, suppliers, volunteers; satisfying various permissions, health and safety requirements, and applying for grants and fundraising. Support and donations were

gratefully received from prominent local businesses such as Forth Ports, Scott Pallets, and Tom Courts, along with many generous local individuals.

John is a life-long 'Burntislander' with a passion for the town, its history, traditions and community. He knows that such an event really pulls people together. Locals of all ages were able to enjoy a fun evening safely. The local visitor economy also benefitted with some businesses deciding to open late for the crowds.

Receiving the award, John took the opportunity to thank the many volunteers on behalf of the committee, not just on the night but throughout the year.

The Group winner is the **Burntisland Community Suppers**. This award is in recognition of the volunteers who during the past four years have organised a weekly supper on Saturday evenings over the winter months.

They offer a warm two-course meal and a welcoming atmosphere each week at the Salvation Army Hall. The suppers are provided on a pay-as-you-can basis and are attractive to diners for many reasons: some come for the company; some for a hot meal they struggle to make or afford

themselves; and others attend to join a social event on a cold Saturday evening.

Additionally, the suppers provide experience and skills for the volunteers. Several diners have gone on to become volunteers, and one unemployed volunteer found employment in the catering industry. Volunteers are given the opportunity to complete first aid and food hygiene training and qualifications. Some young volunteers used their hours of volunteering to contribute to their Saltire Award.

The winners were presented with their awards by Burntisland Community Council at a reception prior to January's public meeting in the Burgh Chambers.

Community Council Bullets.....

Your Community Council holds its regular meetings on the third Tuesday of each month, at 7pm in the Burgh Chambers on the High Street. **Dates for the next meetings are: Tuesday 17th February, 17th March, and 21st April.**

Members of the public are welcome to attend or to raise matters of interest. If possible, please email items you'd like discussed to the Secretary a week before the meeting so they can be more easily accommodated in the agenda.

As there is no step-free access to the venue, meetings are also available to join using Zoom videoconferencing—please contact the Secretary if you wish to join online via Zoom.

A summary of issues discussed during recent meetings is set out below. Full minutes are available on the Community Council website.

- Community Award Winners: John Harrower (lead of the Bonfire & Fireworks committee) is Citizen of the Year, and Burntisland Community Suppers are the Group Award Winners. Presentations were made at the Burgh Chambers on 19th January followed by a small reception. Congratulations to you all!
- Rail Station issues: Representatives of Network Rail will attend our 17th March CC public meeting to present and discuss the results of their recent step-free access feasibility study. Come and hear what they have to say.
- Scots Verse Competition: Winners of the Primary School 1 to 6 classes were presented with their medals and cups prior to our November meeting by Cllrs Lesley Backhouse and Julie MacDougall. A small reception followed.
- Burntisland Common Good Fund (CGF) and assets: Your CC has written to the CEO of Fife Council to request a meeting to discuss management concerns. The CGF is supposed to be used for repairs and refurbishments to CG property. It can also be used to fund grants for Council works and to community groups. However, we are concerned that CG assets like the Burgh Chambers and Music Hall (Young Community Hall) have not been receiving the care they need over the years and are now showing signs of dilapidation. Meantime the cash available in the CGF has not kept pace with needs. We call for a halt on grants until there is a clear management plan for assets and revenue.
- Burgh Chambers: Fife Council has reassured us that this Common Good building is not for sale, despite appearing on the Graeme & Sibbald website for a short period. Trace heating has been provided to protect the building, and Fife Council are considering a new electric heating system to replace the one removed when the work was done to facilitate the banking hub. Further repairs are also required e.g. to the roof and tower cap. We are back using the building for our meetings and events with portable gas heaters in place. We have requested further discussions with Fife Council on a way forward to refurbish the building for better community use.
- Links Splash pad: Refurbishment works have started and hopefully water-play for all ages and abilities will be available again for this year's summer season—at last!
- Chair: We are still working without a chairperson but hope to have a new person in place for our February meeting.
- Christmas lights: We need new volunteers to help fundraise for our town's festive lights. Fife Council provides grant funding for recurrent costs but this no longer covers all our annual charges. We need to raise over £2,000 to cover this funding gap. Please contact us if you appreciate the lights and would like to volunteer to fundraise or to donate. Thank you to all our previous donors who helped with funds.
- New members: If you live in Burntisland and are aged over 16 and are on the local Electoral Roll, please consider joining our vibrant CC to volunteer your time for your community. Read more on our website and contact us if you are interested.

We are so happy to see George back! **Sittercise** has returned every Monday from 12:30–1:30pm. This is a fantastic, gentle way to stay active and socialise, and we know many of you have missed these sessions.



We are also excited to announce we have a **Toddler group** running on Tuesday 9:15–10:15am. We have successfully secured funding to support this project until April 2027. If you have a child aged 0–4, we'd love to welcome you. If this sounds like something you would like to help out at, we'd also love to hear from you!

We have **Warm Spaces** running every Thursday from 11:30am–12:30pm and 6:30pm–7:30pm. These sessions are free for everyone to come along and enjoy a hot meal, a cuppa, and a warm welcome.

We recently conducted a **community consultation**, in which we had a great response of 117 participants. The key takeaways were a demand for more affordable and accessible activities, and

increased provision for adults, older people, and teenagers. We are already acting on this feedback with a new **Digital Drop-in** launching this April (funded by Fife Voluntary Action) to help with tech support and social connection.



We are hoping to run **Family Fun** over the Easter holidays again; please keep an eye on our Facebook page and website for further details closer to the time.

We also have a new **kickboxing class** starting on a Wednesday evening from 4th February at 6:30pm. The **Sewing Group** continues on Mondays at 6:30–8:30pm and the **Youth club (P5–7)** is on Tuesday 6:15–7:45pm.

The Burgh Polis

Welcome to the latest edition of Burgh Polis and I am aware that a few editions have passed since we last had an article.

Firstly, I would like to take this opportunity to introduce my new colleague, **PC Louis Evans** who has moved over to the community team replacing PC Stuart Horne who covered Burntisland for the last few years. Since his move, Louis and I have been out and about the town engaging with residents and visitors alike. These interactions have already proven invaluable in establishing what priorities we need to tackle.

It has come to our attention that the anti-social behaviour has escalated on the High Street and surrounding areas. Anti-social behaviour can have a real impact on how safe and comfortable people feel in their own neighbourhoods and as community officers we aim to work closely with residents, local businesses and partner agencies to try and address this issue.

In a previous article I made mention to seeking assistance from parents and with regards to tackling anti-social behaviour and I would like to reiterate our pleas as we ask to ensure that parents know of their young people's whereabouts and encourage them to avoid behaving in an anti-social manner when out and about.

Since teaming up with Louis we have focused on being visible in the community, engagement and preventing issues escalating. These regular patrols allow us to identify problem areas, speak directly with residents and challenge unacceptable behaviour.



Moving forward we have plans to establish a local surgery or drop in where we will be available to drop in and have a chat with us face to face where we can discuss any issues that people are experiencing or we are here even just to offer advice.

As always, we will take this opportunity to remind the public that there are various ways of reporting crime. Where persons are looking to remain anonymous, information can be provided via Crimestoppers using the details below:

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Step-free station access at Burntisland—is it feasible?

The UK Government launched the 'Access for All' programme in 2006 to allocate funding to create obstacle-free, accessible routes from station entrances to platforms, and between platforms. Despite support from our elected representatives, Burntisland station has consistently failed



to attract funding to ensure everyone can use our rail network. There is a ramp for the southbound (Edinburgh) platform, office, waiting area and ticket machine. The northbound (Kirkcaldy) platform only has flights of stairs. Anyone with significant mobility issues cannot get onto or off this platform. Those travelling with heavy bags or luggage, with small children or pushchairs, or with a bicycle, will also have a serious struggle to use this platform.

Network Rail is investing in electrification of the railway in Fife, but the plan for the section between Dalmeny and Kinghorn is for no overhead electric wires, with new battery-electric trains arriving on the Fife Circle Line in future to cover the gap.

So far, funding for accessible stations has prioritised new stations, the Edinburgh-Glasgow network, and electrified lines. While not being a rail-interchange or

having a dedicated station car park, Burntisland is a well-used railway station. How much better would it be used if it had step-free access?

Lack of investment in Burntisland station is holding back our economy and is a social injustice. Soon after our MP, Melanie Ward, was elected, Burntisland Community Council told her that our community consultations consistently showed that poor station access is a major issue for our community. She took the issue to Parliament and pressed Network Rail to undertake a feasibility study on how a step free Burntisland station might be provided.

Network Rail have agreed that their feasibility study will be made public at the Community Council meeting on 17th March at 7pm in the Burgh Chambers.

Horrible weather but work goes on!

Despite the continually inclement weather the hardy volunteers of Burntisland Sailing Club (BSC) have been making steady progress with a variety of projects.

Four previously loved pontoon fingers were purchased and have been refurbished to "as new" condition. These are waiting for the final pieces of decking to be completed before launch and fitting to the pontoon walkway in February. It is expected that these will remain in service for 20 years.

The old fingers have been moved to the west corner ready for removal and dismantling. This involved a lot of

forethought and planning because disconnected fingers are top heavy and immediately capsize so outrigger floats have to be fitted to enable them to be moved to the lifting area... (see photo)

The steady upgrade of Bluebird, our venerable but resilient Cheverton workboat, continues at pace. The bow roller and



windlass mooring handling arrangements have been rearranged, strengthened and improved, making operations simpler, easier and much safer.

The new workshop has been commissioned and is proving to be invaluable, allowing electrical and other maintenance to be carried out in warm and dry conditions.

BSC continues to recruit new non-boat owning members who wish to help sail members' yachts for both cruising and racing during the forthcoming season.

Why we feed pets as well as people

People may wonder why we include pet food on the 'shopping list' of things we request for the foodbank. Here's an explanation from one of our most experienced volunteers.

"Before we stocked pet food, we had a client who would feed his dog the meat we gave him from his food and he just ate the veg. Most other clients with cats and dogs would ask for extra tuna to feed their pets, and we realised we needed to start stocking pet food so that clients could eat the whole contents of their food parcels and know their pets were getting looked after too.

Many folk with mental health issues find having a pet helps enormously, and we can all appreciate that there are huge benefits both mentally and physically to taking the dog for a walk. Clients often bring their dogs to the foodbank and we have gotten to know them all. We try and keep a treat for them and the clients really appreciate that we care for their pets too."

A note on swimming terms:

If you are a new swimming family still getting used to all the acronyms and jargon, you are not alone! SASA, EDAGs, IM, PB, Qualification time, SNAGs... it's a lot! Here are a few oft-used terms to add to your pool-side vocab.

Short course: 25 metre swimming pool (Kirkcaldy, Burntisland, Michael Woods in Glenrothes).

Long course: 50 metre swimming pool (Royal Commonwealth Pool in Edinburgh, Aberdeen Aquatics Centre).

Individual Qualifying Time (QT): An entry time (based on event and age) which guarantees acceptance to more competitive meets like EDAGs.

Individual Consideration Time (CT): An entry time very close to a QT without the guarantee of acceptance to more competitive meets. In the case that the number of spaces for QTs is not filled, those with consideration times will be considered.

EDAGs (East District Age Groups): Short and long course competitions for clubs in the East of Scotland and the Borders. Only swimmers with an official QT (or successful official CT) are invited to compete.

SNAGs (Scottish National Age Groups): Long course competition for all clubs in Scotland. The same QT / CT rules apply. This

annual event is held at Aberdeen Aquatics Centre in April. BASC have a few swimmers snapping at the heels of these super speedy SNAG times, so watch this space.

Of course, it's not all about competition at Burntisland Amateur Swimming Club. Well done to all the swimmers working hard to perfect their dives and tumble turns, supporting their teammates, showing up for training with a smile, and simply enjoying participating in this wonderful life-long sport.

Community survey: Following successful community engagement events in September when 225 people visited the church and told us what they thought, we are now running a community survey. **Your views are vital to guide us.** Tap the QR code below to access the survey or follow the link from our Facebook page. Funding & feasibility: We now have a bank account. We applied for a Project Feasibility Grant to the Architectural Heritage Fund and should hear if we are successful or not by the middle of February. This means assessing the viability of all the ideas for alternative community uses, and to produce a business plan to ensure that long-term running costs are covered.

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


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Burntisland Hedgehog Haven

Beacon Runners



The first edition of the Buzz this year (and the first for a while from us) seems like a great time to look back. 2025 was a great year for the club which continues to go from strength to strength since coming back from Covid. We've got a great group of runners with a wide range of ages, genders, abilities and aspirations for their running—some run a little and come to keep fit, some run regularly and some use the club to train for races ranging from 5k to ultramarathons.

In November and December we took part in the Hartley Relays, a race organised by and for Fife and Tayside running clubs, which this year we had three teams competing in. We carried on our winter training schedule with everyone's favourite session—running out from Kinghorn to the Black Rock with only head torches to light the way!



We ended the year with our annual Xmas lights run, where we run around Burntisland visiting the towns best decorated houses to pick our favourite, who we present with a small prize the following day. That night ends with our mulled wine and prize giving event.

A record number of runners attended the night (36) which was fitting as we gave out prizes to the people who attended the most sessions in 2025 and this year the attendance prizes were all way up. Our winning runner attended an incredible 47 weeks!

The club does more than running though. Last year we regularly entered teams at The Sands monthly quiz, over the festive period we had our first (annual?) pub crawl run then our Christmas Night Out—a fantastic night of food, drink and dancing at The Sands.

January usually brings a relay race in the Lomond hills—the Devils Burdens—that we always enter teams in. Unfortunately it was cancelled this year... so we organised our own! Following a similar format, eighteen runners, two organisers and one dog spent a great morning running in the hills in a very competitive (but friendly) race which with both teams finishing 1m 40 secs apart after 4.5 hours of hill running.

Our runners are getting themselves ready for a great year of running in 2026 with lots of races booked already with more to come, parkrun tourist trips planned and maybe even a race or two of our own to host.

The Beacon Runners meet every Monday from 7–8pm in a variety of locations—mainly in Burntisland—for a planned session led by two of our coaches.

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Burntisland Harbour Access Trust

We recently held our fourth AGM at the Sands where, as well as regular business, a packed room heard from Professor Roddy Paisley of Aberdeen University, a renowned legal expert of Scottish land law. He laid out what seem to be very strong arguments for there being rights of public access to the harbour. We've now commissioned him to provide us with a formal opinion on the matter and have set up a legal "Fighting Fund" to pay for it. The fund really needs community support. It is accessible through our www.bhat.org.uk website or more directly at www.gofundme.com/f/burntisland-harbour-legal-fighting-fund and every donation helps.

We also have a number of anniversaries this winter...

Fifth Anniversary—on 12th March 2021. In a biting east wind 6 individuals, Covid aware, assembled in an open corner of the railway station. The two Forth Ports officers informed the four Burntisland residents, including a Community Councillor, that the intention to fence off the East Dock and its breakwater is to "reduce the Health and Safety Risk presented by the hazards of commercial activity and peripheral tidal water". No "ifs", no "buts".

Third Anniversary—on 3 February 2023. The East Dock fences are up and the gates locked.

Second Anniversaries—on 1st January 2024. Community Action Plan 2023-2028 published—Theme 1 Environment, Access and Recreation—first priority "reinstate public access to the harbour area and breakwater".

On 24th January 2024. The Burntisland Harbour Access Trust forwarded their lawyers' legal opinion to Forth Ports and Fife Council. This opinion challenges the legality of denying the public access to the breakwater and East Dock.

First Anniversary—on 30th January 2025. Forth Ports announced that they have no commercial plans for Shanks Pier (Western Peninsula) and invited the community to partner them in developing a recreational facility. The Burntisland Community Development Trust (BCDT) accepted the invitation. Access to Shank's pier, or 10% of the harbour, will be good news but the breakwater remains inaccessible and neglected.

And now? At national level BHAT reflects on the two proposed amendments to the

"Land Reform (Scotland) Bill" put forward by our MSPs in October. The amendments proposed received widespread political support and drew encouraging promises from the Cabinet Secretary. Our BHAT voice was heard but the coming Scottish Parliament election is diverting political attention. At regional level Fife Council has set up a three party meeting in late February between Forth Ports, BHAT and itself with the intention of resolving the access issue.

Fife Council is responsible for enforcing the access legislation relating to the East Dock. Historically Fife Council has accepted the legal opinion so confidently put forward by Forth Ports. BHAT believes that this confidence is misplaced, which is why we are amassing expert legal opinion, supported by our fundraiser. Every donated £ is a step towards a walk along the breakwater!

The BHAT directors thank the community for being both patient and generous over the past five years. Who would have thought that righting a wrong could take so long?

are due to meet with Fife Council with a view to pushing to get as much upgrade work done as possible within really tight budget constraints.

The committee is always on the look out for people to either serve on the committee or who are willing to create something using the hall. We would really appreciate anyone who might want to start a new community choir or maybe a folk session but this is bound only by imagination, nothing is off the table at least in theory.

It has now become a venue for children's birthday parties which is such a nice thing to be able to do.

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
Burntisland First Aid Services Trust

OCR as it's known, is a sport where competitors traveling on foot must overcome physical challenges in the form of obstacles. Frequently in, over and sometimes under water! We've covered this event for ten years or so, often in the cold and wet, once on a January 2nd!

Black Rocks Rowing Club



Scottish Coastal Rowing is a sport and community movement that has spread dramatically across the country in the past ten years. Starting from humble beginnings on the Firth of Forth in 2009, there are now well over 200 registered boats in the UK (mostly Scotland) and others in the USA, Canada, Australia, New Zealand, France, the Netherlands, and South Africa.

In May 2024 The Black Rocks Rowing Club (BRRC) launched our beautiful St Ayles skiff, named Irene. The skiff is a versatile 22 foot rowing boat typically crewed by four rowers with a cox steering and room for a passenger in the bow. While we row in open coastal waters, we have a safety first policy. Our club will provide all the equipment and training needed. Our boat is kept at Burntisland Sailing Club on a floating dock.



Most of our rows are simply social in nature and allow us to enjoy the sights and sounds out on the Forth. We have social rows sometimes two to three times a week depending on weather and members availability.

For those who want to, we also take part in competitions, most recently the Frostbite Regatta at Kinghorn Loch (pictured) and soon the upcoming Fife Cup at Lochore Meadows on Sunday 29th March.

We're keen to recruit more members and we have "Come and Try" rows so you can see what it is like. Rowing is for all, no matter your level of fitness or experience.

with watching at the Altar of Repose until 9pm.


The Celebration of the Lord's Passion will take place at 3pm on Good Friday, with Stations of the Cross at 7pm.

Museum of Communication

The Museum of Communication has now been a prominent feature on Burntisland High Street for over twenty years and its volunteers are looking forward to another successful year.

The most recent development has been a new fire alarm system, designed and installed by Caledonia Fire and Safety Ltd of Kirkcaldy at a total cost of just over £12,000.

Raising this sum was a major challenge for the museum, which is run entirely by volunteers and depends for its income mainly on its members as well as visitors to its talks and exhibitions. The total was reached thanks to a grant of £9,000 awarded by Museums Galleries Scotland (MGS), the national development body for Scotland's museum sector, which supports museums and galleries through investment, advice, development, and advocacy.

The new system will detect the presence of smoke, heat or flames in the building and alert any occupants of a potential fire, thus protecting any occupants of the building as well as the Museum's unique and irreplaceable collection of historical communications equipment.

The Museum's dedicated volunteers are now laying plans for the 2026 Exhibition and for this year's lecture programme. Details will appear on the Museum's website. Simply search for 'Museum of Communication'.

The Museum is run solely by volunteers, who help in many and varied ways, some technical and others non-technical. Tasks include helping to design and build displays, carrying out repairs and restoration work, fund raising, organising events, publicising the museum, managing its collections, providing administrative and financial expertise and guiding visitors
